Overview of Board of Liquor and Lottery and Alcohol Licensing

## The Board of Liquor and Lottery

- Five members, who serve for staggered three-year terms.
- Appointed by Governor, with advice and consent of the Senate
- Members may serve no more than two consecutive terms
- Usually meets 1-2 times per month
- Jurisdiction over:
- Laws relating to alcoholic beverages
- Sale of tobacco products
- State Lottery
- The Board's duties include:
- Licensing the manufacture, distribution, and sale of alcoholic beverages
- Licensing tobacco sales
- Licensing State Lottery agents
- Adopting rules to carry out the laws with the Board's jurisdiction
- Enforcing laws related to alcoholic beverages, tobacco, and State Lottery
- Oversee the opening and operation of State liquor agencies
- Oversee the operation of the State Lottery


## The Licensing Process for Retail Alcohol Sales

- Board reviews and issues all licenses relating to manufacture, distribution, and sale of alcoholic beverages
- First-class and second-class retail licenses require local and State approval - Applicant files application and fees with local control commission
- Local control commission is the municipal selectboard or city council
- Upon receiving local approval, application is forwarded to the Board of Liquor and Lottery for review
- Board reviews application and:
- Corporate documents (articles of incorporation, list of directors, certificate of incorporation)
- Trade name registration
- Copy of lease, rental agreement, or deed
- Rooms and meals tax number
- Federal tax number
- Lodging number (if applicant is a hotel)
- Health license (for first-class licensees)
- Compliance with training requirements
- Whether applicant is in good standing with respect to Vermont taxes and unemployment insurance contributions
- License is good until April 30 of the following year
