- Agencies & Departments that received an appropriation must receive approval of proposed CRF grant program prior to receipt of applications.
- Developed a grant program questionnaire to understand details of each program to help warrant compliance with CRF guidance & regulation.
 - Risk assessment of the program
 - Items include:
 - COVID-19 related costs
 - Revenue losses
 - How administer?
- Each questionnaire is reviewed by AOA & Guidehouse.
- A formal response is issued to agencies & departments prior to moving forward.
