4	Sec. X. PARENT-CHILD CONTACT IN CHINS CASES DURING
5	COVID-19 EMERGENCY
6	Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, for the duration of
7	any gubernatorial declared state of emergency related to COVID-19, any
8	provision of an executive order related to the state of emergency, including an
9	addendum to or directive of such order, that restricts activities outside the
10	home or place of residence shall be taken into consideration by the court when
11	issuing orders pursuant to 33 V.S.A. § 5319 relating to parent-child contact for
12	children in need of care or supervision. The court shall consider the totality of
13	the circumstances regarding the risks inherent with compliance with the
14	original order during a pandemic. The court shall consider any
15	recommendations of the Vermont Department of Health regarding social
16	distancing, isolating at home, and refraining from all nonessential contact
17	outside the home for the purpose of decreasing the spread of the contagion;
18	whether a child living in a foster home is at risk or puts others at risk of
19	contracting or spreading the contagion by in-person contact with others who
20	are not in the foster home household; and the inability or unwillingness of any
21	party to a parent-child contact order to comply with the Vermont Department

1 of Health's specific recommendations to reduce the spread of the contagion. 2 The court may order in-person parent-child contact in compliance with the 3 original order or modify the order to protect the health and welfare of the child, 4 family, or community on a case-by-case basis. Any order issued or modified 5 during the state of emergency shall mandate that parties comply with the most recently issued guidance from the Department of Health. Parties shall 6 7 endeavor to make reasonable accommodations to continue parent-child contact 8 via electronic communication during the emergency. The court may order in-9 person parent-child contact in compliance with the original order or modify the 10 order to protect the health and welfare of the child, family, or community on a 11 case-by-case basis. No person shall be held in contempt for failing to provide in-person parent-child contact as part of a good faith effort to comply with this 12 13 section.
