On behalf of the Advanced Practice Registered Nurse (APRN) associations listed above, we oppose the unreasonably exorbitant proposed increases to the APRN fees in the Fee Bill.

APRNs in Vermont, as in many states, are required to pay both the APRN license fee, in addition to the Registered Nurse (RN)I license fee. Under the current fee structure, APRNs are required to pay the following biannual renewal fees:

Registered Nurse	\$140
Advanced practice registered nurses	\$ 75
Total	\$215

Under the proposed increase, APRN will be required to pay the following biannual renewal fees:

Registered Nurse \$200
Advanced practice registered nurses \$225
Total \$425

The Fee Bill is proposing a 43% increase in the RN renewal fee and a 200% increase in the ARPN renewal fees, both of which will be incurred by the APRNs.

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN) is an independent, not-for-profit organization through which nursing regulatory bodies act and counsel together on matters of common interest and concern. The NCSBN prepared a 2017 report on nursing licensure throughout the country. P.71 of the report shows that Vermont's APRN renewal licensing fees, as they currently stand (before the proposed increase) are significantly higher than most other states/territories – in fact, they join only 3 other states/territories as the *highest APRN renewal fees* in the nation.

Such a significant fee increase, which is out-of-step with the rest of the nation, will be a deterrent for APRNs to seek licensure in Vermont, resulting in an even greater health care provider shortage than currently exists in Vermont.
