As of 4/8 the supply chain is in good shape outside of bath tissue, sanitizer, cleaning products, and prepared/boxed food which remain strained.</li> <li>The Human Services Branch is working with FEMA, the VT Food Bank, and Community Action Agencies to determine a statewide feeding plan. Needs and sources have been identified, and the organizations are in the process of identifying gaps. Contracts for feeding are being pursued within Buildings and General Services.</li> <li>AHS is pursuing new lease agreements for isolation/recovery sites in Rutland with beds available for skilled nursing.</li> </ul>	Key Information

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• 28 Medical Reserve Corps volunteers are deployed at 4 sites: a VDH call center, the SNS warehouse, the VDH Epi team, and the HOC. • University of Vermont Medical Center (UVMMC) is trying out two new COVID-19 testing systems today. Testing is available at the following locations: hospitals statewide, the Island Pond Health Center, the Champlain Islands Health Center, and the Wells River Health Center. BGS has leased four temporary mortuaries and is working with the **Current Situation** points of contact from each site to operationalize. BGS is currently working to install ramps and arrange for security. Medical The Alternate Care Sites in Essex, Rutland, Burlington, Barre, and St. Albans are ready to accept patients when needed. • UVMMC has received four VPro Decon units, allowing for the decontamination of N95 masks in-state, four more units are Health and inbound. The units will be installed at additional hospital sites for healthcare and first responder use. The state continues to pursue the out-of-state Battelle system as a back-up. · VDH issued the first weekly survey to EMS districts, assessing their COVID-19 response needs and preparation. • The Logistics Branch is working with the Vermont Department of Health on a facility disinfection plan as part of a statewide <sup>-</sup>uture procedure for future demobilization of sites. · Buildings and General Services is establishing contracts with hotels for isolation housing for healthcare and emergency workers, if needed. • The Department of Labor unofficially estimates unemployment in Vermont to be above 20%. • The Agency of Education (AOE) has gone live with a case management system for stakeholder questions and comments. 1,700 registrants signed up to volunteer on the state portal: **Current Situation** https://www.vermont.gov/volunteer. ACCD sent out an initial communication. **Other Lifelines**  ACCD has scheduled several kickoff meetings for the Governor's Economic Mitigation and Recovery Task Force. ACCD reports the Small Business Administration (SBA) is overwhelmed by the volume of applications and is running low on funding. • The Department of Labor predicts that unemployment in the state could rise to 30%.

### Key Updates:

 The SEOC sent clarification to Emergency Management Directors and Responders today regarding the option to provide non-congregate housing to healthcare workers and first responders who are at a reasonable risk of being exposed to or infected with COVID-19.

### Executive Order Measures:

- Gov. Scott issued Addendum 9 to Executive Order 01-02 on 4/10/20 to extend the State of Emergency declared 3/13/20 and issue other COVID-19 related directives and clarifications.
- The Executive Order and all Directives and Addenda including the Stay Home, Stay Safe order - are extended until midnight on 5/15/20.
- Lodging establishments can now accept reservations for stays and events occurring on or after 6/15/20. However this date could be extended as needed.
- Clarified that the suspension of in-person real estate transactions includes those for sale by owner.
- Motor vehicle inspections (except for school buses and motor buses) due in April 2020 are extended for 60 days.
- Health care facilities, providers, and volunteers are immune from civil liability for any death, injury, or loss resulting from COVID-19 related emergency management services or response activities, except in the case of willful misconduct or gross negligence.
