

1 **TASK FORCE FOR UNIVERSAL AFTERSCHOOL ACCESS**

3 Sec. 1. FINDINGS

4 (a) Children who participate in afterschool activities and programs do
5 better in school and in life generally than children without these options.

6 (b) Access to universal afterschool programs expands equity and choices
7 for children and families and supports working parents by reducing the
8 logistical and financial burden of afterschool care.

9 (c) Current research demonstrates that involvement in high-quality
10 afterschool programs decreases a child’s risk for substance abuse. For
11 example, a 2018 McDowell Group report for the Alaska Afterschool Network
12 found that high school students who participated in afterschool programs were
13 39 percent less likely to experiment with marijuana.

14 Sec. 2. TASK FORCE FOR UNIVERSAL AFTERSCHOOL ACCESS

15 (a) Creation. There is created the Task Force for Universal Afterschool
16 Access to consider and make recommendations on the framework for, the costs
17 of, and related long-term funding sources for access to universal afterschool
18 programs.

19 (b) Membership. The Task Force shall be composed of the following
20 15 members:

- 1 (1) one current member of the House of Representatives, who shall be
2 appointed by the Speaker of the House;
- 3 (2) one current member of the Senate, who shall be appointed by the
4 Committee on Committees;
- 5 (3) the Secretary of Education or designee;
- 6 (4) the Secretary of Human Services or designee;
- 7 (5) the Executive Director of the Vermont Superintendents Association
8 or designee;
- 9 (6) the Executive Director of the Vermont School Boards Association or
10 designee;
- 11 (7) the Executive Director of the Vermont Council of Special Education
12 Administrators or designee;
- 13 (8) the Executive Director of the Vermont Principals' Association or
14 designee;
- 15 (9) the Chair of the Vermont Council of Independent Schools or
16 designee;
- 17 (10) a representative of Vermont home study programs, appointed by the
18 Governor;
- 19 (11) a representative of Vermont Boys and Girls Clubs, appointed by the
20 Governor;

1 (12) three representatives of afterschool programs who represent the
2 breadth of geographic areas within the State, appointed by the Governor; and

3 (13) the Executive Director of Vermont Afterschool, Inc. or designee.

4 (c) Powers and duties. The Task Force shall consider and make
5 recommendations on the framework for, the costs of, and related long-term
6 funding sources for access to universal afterschool programs.

7 (1) The Task Force shall map existing afterschool programs and
8 highlight gaps in access and equity, including equity for Vermonters with
9 disabilities.

10 (2) The Task Force shall recommend, as part of the framework, best
11 practices and key evidence-based strategies to maximize health and substance
12 abuse prevention and shall consult with the Substance Misuse Prevention and
13 Advisory Council.

14 (3) The Task Force shall consider the report entitled “Closing the Gap in
15 Vermont: The Expanded Learning Opportunities (ELO) Special Fund,” dated
16 November 2015, issued by the Working Group on Expanded Learning
17 Opportunities of Vermont’s PreK–16 Council.

18 (4) The Task Force shall review the status and results of the Afterschool
19 for All Grant Program administered by the Department for Children and
20 Families.

1 (5) In exploring funding sources, the Task Force shall prefer solutions
2 that do not draw upon the State's Education Fund and shall explore the
3 possibility of using potential revenue from the taxation and regulation of
4 cannabis.

5 (6) The Task Force may recommend legislative language to enact its
6 recommendations.

7 (d) Assistance. The Task Force shall have the administrative, technical,
8 and legal assistance of the Agency of Education.

9 (e) Meetings.

10 (1) The Governor shall call the first meeting of the Task Force to occur
11 on or before June 30, 2020.

12 (2) The Task Force shall select a chair from among its members at the
13 first meeting.

14 (3) A majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.

15 (4) The Task Force shall cease to exist on December 16, 2020.

16 (f) Reports. On or before December 15, 2020, the Task Force shall submit
17 a written report to the Governor and the House and Senate Committees on
18 Education with its findings and recommendations.

19 (g) Reimbursement.

20 (1) For attendance at meetings during adjournment of the General
21 Assembly, a legislative member of the Task Force serving in his or her

1 capacity as a legislator shall be entitled to per diem compensation and
2 reimbursement of expenses pursuant to 2 V.S.A. § 406 for not more than six
3 meetings.

4 (2) Members of the Task Force who are not employees of the State of
5 Vermont and who are not otherwise compensated or reimbursed for their
6 attendance shall be entitled to per diem compensation and reimbursement of
7 expenses pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 1010 for not more than six meetings.

8 (h) Appropriation. The sum of \$7,200.00 is appropriated for fiscal year
9 2021 from the General Fund to the Agency of Administration to provide
10 funding for per diem compensation and reimbursement under subsection (g) of
11 this section.

12 Sec. 3. EFFECTIVE DATE

13 This act shall take effect on passage.
