






What is Ranked Choice Voting?

More Voice **Eliminates Vote-Splitting Less Negative** More Choice Majority Consensus **Instant Runoff Voting** Non-partisan







Voters Attitudes

- 85% were "very familiar" or "familiar" with Ranked Choice Voting
- 84% found Ranked Choice Voting "very easy" or "easy" to use


Elections Results

- 95% of voters ranked more than one candidate
- 7.5% increase in voter turnout from last competitive gubernatorial primary
- 0.003% of ballots were "spoiled" (comparable to first-past-the-post)

Voters Attitudes

- 74% found Ranked Choice Voting was "very easy" or "easy" to use
- 62% thought that majority winners in elections are "very important"

Elections Results

- 95% of voters participated all the way through to in the final round
- 0.001% of ballots were "spoiled" (comparable to first-past-the-post)

Why does Ranked Choice Voting matter?

Why RCV?

- RCV restores majority rule
 - Candidates who are opposed by a majority can never win
 - RCV is the most cost-effective and efficient way to conduct a runoff election
- RCV gives voters the freedom to vote for the candidate they like the best without worrying that they will help to elect the candidate they like least
 - You never have to vote for the "lesser of two evils" over another candidate you really like
 - You never have to feel like your vote is "wasted"
- RCV encourages more positive, issue-focused campaigns
 - Candidate are encouraged to reach beyond their base and appeal more broadly for support
 - Negative campaigning can backfire when voters have the power to rank their choices
