



Welcome to the Lamoille Valley Rail Trail!

- The original rail line was constructed in the mid 1860's and ran under changing ownership until 1994
- At 93.2 Miles long, it will be the longest rail trail in New England once completed
- Connects 18 different communities across 5 counties
- Vermont Association of Snow Travelers (VAST) is transforming the rail line into a recreation trail in partnership with Vermont Agency of Transportation (VTrans)
- Funding began with an earmark secured from the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) by Bernie Sanders
 - o \$5.2 million from FHWA
 - \$1.3 Million match from VAST
 - Due to ACT 250, the project was delayed for ten years and cost nearly a million dollars to VAST just to go through ACT 250 and finally to settle on a release from it. The LVRT is the only rail trail in Vermont that was ever subject to ACT 250. Because of the project delay, increase of costs over the past decade VAST itself has spent over 6 million dollars on the LVRT as only one user group of the trail. To date other private donations and grants have added up to under \$350,000.
- The trail is a year-round, multi-use recreation path and alternate transportation facility
 - o 100% ADA Accessible
 - Walking, Running, Biking, Horseback Riding, Snoweshoeing, X-C Skiing, Snowmobiling, and Dog Sledding are allowed
- Provides many benefits to communities and Vermont as whole:
 - Increased tourism and patronage of local businesses
 - o Community health benefits
 - Safe routes for local commuters
 - Educational opportunities
 - Historic landmarks
- The first sections were rehabbed in 2014-2015
 - o 15.35 Miles St. Johnsbury to Danville
 - 17.42 Mile Morristown, Hyde park, Johnson, and Cambridge
- The remaining trail is estimated to cost \$15 Million to complete
