16	(a) Any committee of the General Assembly may, by a majority vote of its
17	membership, issue a legislative subpoena to summon witnesses or call for the
18	production of papers or other evidence. A committee's legislative subpoena
19	power under this subsection may be exercised when the General Assembly is
20	in session and during adjournment.

1	(b) If a person does not comply with a legislative subpoena, a Superior
2	Court may compel the attendance of the person, the giving of testimony, and
3	the production of papers or other evidence, as required by the subpoena.
4	(b)(c) A person may refuse to comply with a legislative subpoena on the
5	grounds of a valid privilege.
6	(e)(d) The General Assembly, by a majority vote of those present in either
7	house, or any committee of the General Assembly having subpoena authority
8	by a majority vote of its membership, may initiate proceedings under this
9	section by filing a complaint with the court asking that the witness be so
10	compelled.
11	(d)(e) The failure of any witness to comply with an order of the court
12	issued under this section shall constitute contempt of court.
