## **Program Overview**

The Farm to School and Early Childhood program was established in 2007. It is funded through an annual allocation from the State's general fund. Through a combination of grants and technical assistance, the program helps Vermont schools and childcare providers achieve a variety of goals related to sourcing local food, expanding ag and nutrition education, and strengthening community connections

## **Executive Summary**

The 2021 grant year was one marked by adaptations. As schools and early childhood providers struggled to respond to the impacts of the pandemic, the VT Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (AAFM) retooled the farm to school and early childhood program to meet their evolving needs.

AAFM introduced two new grant programs in 2021, the CSA Grant and the Farm to School Vision Grant, both of which saw demand far exceed the available funding. AAFM also partnered with Shelburne Farms to establish a Farm to Early Childhood state-wide coalition. And finally, with funding from a 2020 USDA grant, AAFM provided support to the new Local Purchasing Incentive by helping schools track and report their local food purchases.

## Annual Funding



In fiscal year 2021, the farm to school and early childhood program provided over \$100,000 in grants to 9 schools and 30 FCFs throughout the state. The remainder of the program funds were awarded to nonprofit partners and grant coaches, who provide critical support to grantees through mentorship and technical assistance.





The FTSEC grant is the program's flagship funding opportunity. In addition to their financial award, grantees receive a suite of technical assistance. This combination of money, mentorship and expert assistance supports the development of holistic and sustainable programs.



In 2021, AAFM received 14 applications for the FTSEC grant, with a total request of \$145,000. Five applicants were awarded grants, including one supervisory union, one elementary school, and three early childhood education providers. In total, grantees received \$55,000 in grant funds and \$43,000 worth of coaching and technical assistance. The CSA grant subsidizes the cost of CSA or farm shares for early childhood education providers. Thirty grants were awarded in 2021, which benefited over 1,000 children and 23 Vermont farms. The CSA grant replaced AAFM's Infrastructure Grant, which in 2020 received 21 applications

The intent of the Farm to School Vision Grant is to support innovative and impactful ideas in farm to school programming that can be scaled and/or replicated. Out of ten highly competitive applications, AAFM awarded the 2021 Vision Grant (\$37,800) to South Hero Land Trust.

### **Project Summary**

The focus of South Hero Land Trust's project is to explore the integration of anti-racist education with farm to school and nature-based programs at Folsom Educational and Community Center. Using the lenses of storytelling, art, music, agriculture, food, and land stewardship, students and teachers will engage with the stories and experiences of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color in Vermont.



## Farm to Early Childhood

In 2020, AAFM and Shelburne Farms received a grant of \$90,900 to begin the work of building a farm to early childhood coalition in the state. This work is part of a broader effort to provide more support to early educators and Vermont's youngest citizens. Ages 0-5 are critical periods for brain development and exposure to nutritious local food and healthy eating habits at these young ages can have lifelong impacts. That fact is one of the reasons AAFM decided to offer the CSA grant. It's also behind AAFM's financial support for the Farm to Early Childhood Workshop Series.

## Local Purchasing Incentive Support

AAFM received a grant from the US Department of Agriculture in 2020 to help Vermont schools improve their ability to track and report their local food purchases. This active grant continues to provide critical support to the State's new Local Purchasing Incentive Grant by helping address issues of equity, and reducing the overall burden on schools.

## Farm to School Institute Support

Five Vermont schools who attended VT FEED's Northeast Farm to School Institute received support from AAFM in 2021. Each received a \$5,000 grant after completing the institute, as well as help from a farm to school coach who will support them throughout the year.
