The Adult Education and Literacy providers serve adults in Vermont who need help with basic literacy skills in reading, writing and/or math and acquiring a high school credential. This opens up opportunities for students, including better jobs and having a better family life.

Our students are at the center of our work, and we know that success looks different for every student, which is why our programming and activities are specifically tailored to each student's unique needs and goals.

Christina, a single mother who earned her high school diploma from us at age thirty-two, is now a registered nurse in Rutland. Michael, a father from southern Vermont, earned his diploma last month and started a new job as a security guard as he prepares to apply to the Vermont Police Academy. Sarah, a successful entrepreneur, earned a diploma when she stepped away from her public high school's social group to protect her sobriety.
