A 24-Year History

1998

Commission on Higher Education Funding established (CHEF) and authored first "Compact for Higher Education"

1999

Legislature adopted Compact recommendations for increased postsecondary funding

2009

Government and higher education leaders signed second CHEF compact which set goal to increase college attainment to 60 percent by 2019

2010

Act 133 established the PreK-16 Council to reach a new statewide goal that "at least 60 percent of the adult population will have earned an associate's or higher-level degree by 2020"

Act 80 codified state attainment goal and related policy agenda

2019

Governor Phil Scott endorsed 70 by 2025 goal

2017

Cross-sector convening selected 70 percent by 2025 goal; is inclusive of credentials and college degrees

2016

Legislature passed Flexible Pathways Act to increase early college, dual enrollment, and work-based learning opportunities

2013

Act 80 Policy Priorities to Achieve Goal



Promote awareness of career pathways and the value of postsecondary education and training



Expand access to postsecondary education and training to students of all ages



Increase completion of postsecondary education and training programs by ensuring Vermonters have the supports they need to succeed



Maximize partnerships across and within sectors to achieve State workforce development and education goals

Advance the civic and economic vitality of Vermont by:

- Growing the number of Vermonters with education and training after high school
- Increasing equity in educational attainment
- Strengthening connections between education, training, and employment.



Our Work



CHANGE THE NARRATIVE

Build awareness of the importance of postsecondary education and training, and the diversity of education and career pathways.



ADVOCATE

Promote equitable policy and programming that expands access to and the completion of postsecondary education and training for students of all ages and backgrounds.



CONVENE

Mobilize stakeholders to achieve systems-level change by increasing communication, coordination, and sharing of knowledge and best practices.



MEASURE

Track progress toward Vermont's postsecondary attainment goal, identify where equity-related gaps exist, and share state- and national- level, data, research, and trends.

H. 377 Overview

- Creates partnership with Advance Vermont to support progress toward the state attainment goal
- Brings transparency and clarity to post-high school credential marketplace through creation of credential registry
- Requires biennial reports to the legislature recommending priorities to increase attainment
- Appropriates \$350k

Why Partner with Advance Vermont?

- No entity charged by state explicitly to drive attainment efforts
- States have seen success partnering with capacity building organizations
- Building Bright Futures is a successful model in Vermont



What will Advance Vermont do?

- Formulate policy recommendations to boost attainment
- Monitor and share data regarding attainment
- Create and maintain public communications and resources, like MyFutureVT, to change perceptions about post high school education and training
- Convene key players for shared learning and collaboration
- Support regional attainment initiatives
- Lead credential transparency efforts

Proliferation of Credentials

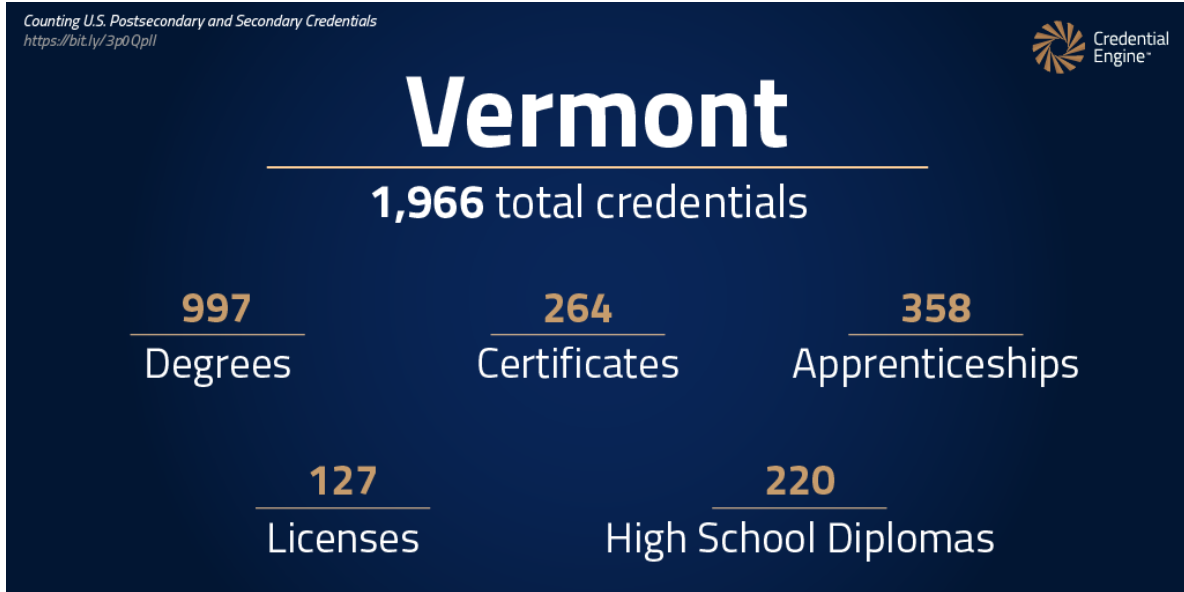
Nationally :

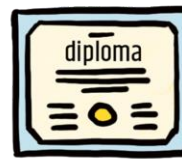
