

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
Benefits to Vermont of NEBHE's Regional Student Program, Tuition Break

The New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE), agency of the federally authorized, state-created Compact, provides resource-sharing and cost-saving programs for the six New England states.

- NEBHE's longest-standing program, the Regional Student Program (RSP) Tuition Break, has delivered more than \$1 billion in college tuition savings to New England students and families since 1958.
- The region's public colleges and universities collaborate to offer specialized academic programs at reduced tuition, providing affordable access to eligible out-of-state residents within the region.
- Tuition Break is a strategic enrollment management tool for participating public higher education institutions, and helps prepare the region's future workforce in specialized and high-demand fields.



- Vermont residents save millions of dollars in tuition while having access to more than 1,500 tuition-discounted degree programs at public colleges and universities in the five other New England states—including specialized fields of study not offered by Vermont public colleges and universities.
- Vermont public institutions receive millions of dollars in tuition revenue from eligible RSP students, who are residents of the other five New England states.



NEBHE State Assessment and Return on Investment (ROI)

NEBHE state assessments support operations of the RSP Tuition Break, including:

- Managing participation of more than 9,000 annual participating students
- Engaging 80 public colleges and universities in offering eligible programs and enrollment data collection
- Annual certification of more than 2,000 undergraduate and graduate programs
- Promotion of the public colleges and universities and eligible program offerings through extensive outreach and communications, including to school counselors, legislators, students and families.

Benefit to the Vermont Public Colleges and Universities of Participation in NEBHE's Regional Student Program (RSP) Tuition Break: FY 2021

Students from the other five New England states, who were eligible through NEBHE's program, paid an estimated \$9.6 million in tuition revenue and \$854,000 in fee revenue in FY 2021 while enrolled at Vermont public higher education institutions.

Benefit of NEBHE's Regional Student Program (RSP) Tuition Break to Vermont Residents

The New England Board of Higher Education's (NEBHE) Regional Student Program (RSP) Tuition Break enables Vermont residents to save millions of dollars in tuition each year while having access to more than 1,000 tuition-discounted degree programs at public colleges and universities in the five other New England states –including specialized fields of study not offered by Vermont public colleges and universities.

In FY 2021, a total of 465 Vermont residents enrolled under the RSP Tuition Break and saved an estimated \$2.7 million on their annual out-of-state tuition bills. A full-time student saved an average of \$7,200.

NEW ENGLAND STATE AUTHORIZATION RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT (SARA)

Nationwide, the number of students who access postsecondary education opportunities online continues to grow.

As institutions seek to offer their programs to a broader market, particularly to out-of-state students via online and distance learning, they may be required to seek "authorization" in as many as 54 U.S. States and territories.

This process, called "State Authorization", is required for participation in Title IV programs and can be an onerous, costly and time-consuming process for institutions to navigate.

FUTURE OF DISTANCE EDUCATION

In 2020, higher education institutions rapidly deployed online course delivery at an unprecedented scale in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In fact, during the fall 2020 semester, **92% of New England postsecondary institutions** opted to continue offering remote learning to lessen disruption to students who were unable to return to campus.

This distance education boom pushed the importance of the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) into a new light as many institutions found themselves suddenly operating across state lines. Since March 2020, **43 New England institutions** have sought SARA participation for the first time.

NEBHE'S STATE AUTHORIZATION RECIPROCITY AGREEMENT (SARA)

SARA provides an effective and efficient state-level authorization process for the delivery of postsecondary distance education.

An institution demonstrates to its SARA Home State Portal Entity (SPE) that it meets standard criteria through the submission of an application. With their State's approval, the institution may operate outside of its State under the policies and procedures of the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA) in 52 participating U.S. Member States and Territories.

Institutions benefit through access to a streamlined authorization approach and significant cost savings on state authorization fees. Students benefit from significantly expanded access to programs that best fit their needs and goals.

NEBHE oversees the membership of the six New England States, plus New Jersey and New York in conjunction with NC-SARA.

The **New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE)** serves as the regional leader of the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA), a voluntary agreement among member states and U.S. territories that establishes comparable national standards for the high-quality interstate delivery of postsecondary distance education.

Participation in SARA reduces the costs of delivering online learning—resulting from inconsistent, complicated and expensive regulatory processes—*saving Vermont institutions approximately \$1.3 million in initial state authorization fees and nearly \$500K in annual renewal fees—while helping create access for students to high-quality online programs to meet the needs of their busy lives.

The Vermont Agency of Education (VT AoE) serves as the "SARA State Portal Entity" in the State of Vermont. The agency works closely with the **New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE)** and the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA) as a vital partner to implement the agreement in the state.

VT AoE verifies compliance with SARA standards and oversees the online and distance learning activities of the currently **15 participating institutions** in Vermont under SARA.

Planning Grant Details

The initiative is funded by the Arthur Vining Davis Foundation and the Teagle Foundation through an eight-month \$50,000 planning grant. The grant will run from July 2021 through February 2022. Subject to the success of the planning grant, NEBHE plans to submit a three-year implementation proposal in the spring of 2022.

About the New England Transfer Guarantee

Through the New England College Transfer Guarantee (the Guarantee), the New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE) has developed systematic transfer pathways in Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island for eligible associates holding community college graduates into four-year independent institutions. In July 2021, NEBHE received funding to begin exploring the feasibility of scaling the Guarantee to the northern New England states.

In the northern New England states the Guarantee aims to unify state transfer and expand opportunities for the northern region's community college student population at public and independent institutions. The four key goals of Scaling the Guarantee are to:

- 1. Build stronger partnerships between community colleges and four-year public and independent institutions in the three states.
- 2. Develop a unified guaranteed admission transfer system for community college students.
- 3. Promote transfer into liberal arts programs.
- 4. Increase the number of community college transfer students who earn a bachelor's degree.

Roles and Responsibilities

New England Board of Higher Education

The NEBHE facilitators are responsible for the implementation of the activities, organization, and goal fulfillment outlined in the planning grant proposal. Emily Decatur will serve as the overall project director, along with the support of Stafford Peat. NEBHE will execute the grant deliverables outlined in the "Planning Grant Activities" section below.

New England College Transfer Guarantee Vermont Partners

NEBHE partners will play a critical role in advising and shepherding the scaling of the Guarantee by providing crucial input and advice in order to effectively implement the Guarantee. NEBHE's partners will:

- 1. Sign Letters of Support and Intent to Participate (non-binding) in the scaling of the Guarantee.
- 2. Provide guidance for state convening, including helping to identify participating institutions.
- 3. Review and provide input on the Guarantee Foundational Design and Guiding Principles.
- 4. Verify the accuracy of the NEBHE prepared scan of existing articulation agreements, pathways, and other transfer agreements or programs.
- 5. Serve as a resource in responding to questions related to transfer, including general education requirements, articulation agreements and institutional transfer policy.
- 6. Serve as a communications bridge with member institutions by informing institutional administrative staff and faculty about the initiative and key goals of the planning grant.

Planning Grant Activities

The eight-month planning phase will serve to explore the feasibility of scaling and cultivate buyin from community colleges and independent and higher education systems. NEBHE will execute the following activities under the planning grant:

- 1. Host state-specific convening on December 15, 2021
 - Include independent institutional participants college presidents, provosts, deans of enrollment management, transfer admissions representatives, community college transfer advisors, registrars, and liberal arts faculty from twoyear and independent four-year institutions.
 - Promote buy-in of the Guarantee transfer methodology and Guiding Principles.
- 2. Seek active support from institutional presidents through signing a Letter of Intent to Participate post convening.
- 3. Complete a transfer policy and practice self-assessment for institutions that have signed commitment letters.
- 4. Initiate development of a state-specific Foundational Design and Guiding Principles.
- 5. Identify general education (block) requirements including the number of credits and courses for each state.
- 6. Identify existing liberal arts and other transfer pathways including articulation agreements.
- 7. Identify steering committee members for each state.

Success Metrics

In order to develop a sustainable unified transfer system, NEBHE's primary targets include an initial commitment of participation from:

- 1. 50% of independent four-year institutions in Vermont.
- 2. Community College of Vermont participation.

High Value Credentials for New England: Vermont Update

Through the leadership of Advance Vermont, over the past several months, Vermont has made great progress in building out the statewide Credential Registry. To date, all public colleges and universities as well as four private colleges have submitted credential information to the Registry. Moreover, Vermont is one of the first states to publish its credential program information in a user friendly, public facing tool with Advance VT's career and education resource hub, MyFutureVT. Vermont will also be on the leading edge of states to publish CTE program data. Other updates include:

Legislative/State-level

- Advance Vermont has made good progress educating executive and legislative officials on credential transparency
- Representative Kathleen James introduced legislation (H.377) that puts Vermont on a path to credential transparency.
- Recognizing the importance of MyFutureVT and the Vermont Credential Transparency
 Project, the State appropriated FY22 funds to Advance VT to support this work. Advance
 VT also secured a contract with Vermont VocRehab to ensure these resources are
 available to its staff and the clients they serve.
