#### **About WEC**

- Electric Cooperative Not for Profit
  - Established in 1939
  - Member owned
  - Created by and for those without power
    - investor owned utility would not extend lines to rural landscape
  - 100% renewable sourced power (85% in VT & 15% NY hydro)
- Size
  - Peak 16 MW (Winter)
    - State of VT ~ 1,000 MW Peak (Summer)
  - 70,000 MWH Retail Sales Annually
    - 1.3% of State Load
  - 11,700 meters/members
  - 41 towns 4 counties Central Vermont (Washington, Orange, Orleans, Caledonia)
    - 17% of Vermont Towns
  - 96% of our members residential
- Board of Directors
  - Nine Directors
  - Set Policy
  - All Members
  - Annual Meetings





#### WEC's Vision

- Universal Internet Access for WEC Members
- Symmetric Highspeed Service (100/100 Mbps down/up)
- Affordable Rates
- Solutions
  - Thumb on the scale to get highspeed internet service to WEC's under/unserved members
  - WEC wants to move ahead
  - Highspeed internet essential service
- Fast Build Out
  - Begin Late 2021
  - Finish less than 5 years
- Partnership(s)
  - CUDs
  - Mission Based Providers (Kingdom Fiber)

# Why WEC Here Today

- Tax Solution
- WEC Taxed on physical assets (poles, wires, substations, power plants, etc)
  - If WEC builds and adds fiber, it would be taxed
  - The tax estimate for fiber buildout significant (~\$500K per year)

# WEC Property Tax (2020)

- Lines, poles, substations \$1,323,492
- Generation Plants
  - Wrightsville \$33,006
  - Coventry \$208,472
- Total Property and Town Tax = \$1.56 M
- Paid out to 43 towns
- WEC's Proposal has No Change in Electric Property Tax Base

Lease rate of \$1400 per mile deemed too expensive by CUDs. We don't think this case is feasible for CUD to move ahead.

## Tax Exemption Needed

- Lease rate of \$1400 per mile deemed too expensive by CUDs
  - Not feasible for CUD to move ahead
  - No Savings for CUDs to pass on to Customers
  - CUD could build it without WEC
  - The advantage of lower interest rate with USDA loans is offset by taxes

### Tax Exemption Needed

- Levels the field with CUDs
- Allows WEC to Build Out Fiber using low cost funds from USDA
- Lease fee \$1,200 per mile feasible with tax exemption in place
  - Lower Cost than CUD can build
  - Allows CUD to pass on savings to consumers
- Impact to electric rates matter
  - \$1,200 case WEC has rate pressure but smaller
- Towns will still benefit with tax exemption on WEC Broadband equipment
  - If we build it, new tax base will come

## Tax Exemption Solution



- Avoid complicated tax laws
- Requesting Tax Exemption for <u>NEW</u>
   Broadband Infrastructure
  - ○Tax Estimated ~ \$500K
- Applied only to <u>NEW</u> broadband equipment
  - WEC continues to pay other taxes

## Tax Exemption

- Potential for towns to <u>increase</u> tax base with the tax exemption in place
  - Economic Development high speed internet needed for community growth
  - Availability of Highspeed Internet will result in
    - New Homes
    - New Businesses
    - ONew Tax base
    - Increased Home Values

## Comments Current Bill Language

Remove town vote for tax exemption

 Add language that allows tax exemption and any non-profit entity serving under/unserved consumers
