

## Legislative Intent

It is the intent of the General Assembly to ensure that every person who lives and works in the State of Vermont retains the right to free and unfettered access to justice under the law. No person should be denied access to justice because they fear being subject to civil arrest when attending a court hearing or traveling to or from a courthouse. All Vermonters regardless of income, race, religion, or immigration status should have the opportunity to use the court system to advocate for themselves and their interests. Prohibiting civil arrests at a courthouse prevents disruption of court proceedings, protects the proper functioning of courts, provides a safe and secure location for the resolution of disputes, and promotes public safety by ensuring that victims and witnesses are not discouraged from attending court proceedings. It is the intent of the General Assembly, consistent with long-established common law, to prohibit civil arrests of individuals at courthouses or traveling to and from a courthouse to uphold the principle set forth in Article 4 of the Vermont Constitution that provides, in part, that “every person within this state ought to find a certain remedy, by having recourse to our laws, for all injuries and wrongs,” and that “every person ought to obtain [that] right freely . . . completely and without denial . . . [or] delay.”
