21 vehicle under the influence of alcohol or other substance in violation of

2 and stalking in violation of section 1062 of this title. “Predicate offense” shall

16 § 7602. EXPUNGEMENT AND SEALING OF RECORD,  
17 POSTCONVICTION; PROCEDURE

18 (a)(1) A person may file a petition with the court requesting expungement  
19 or sealing of the criminal history record related to the conviction if:

20 (A) the person was convicted of a qualifying crime or qualifying  
21 crimes arising out of the same incident or occurrence;



1 (B) the person was convicted of an offense for which the underlying  
2 conduct is no longer prohibited by law or designated as a criminal offense;

3 (C) pursuant to the conditions set forth in subsection (g) of this  
4 section, the person was convicted of a violation of 23 V.S.A. § 1201(a) related  
5 to operating under the influence of alcohol or other substance, excluding a  
6 violation of that section resulting in serious bodily injury or death to any  
7 person other than the operator, or related to operating a school bus with a blood  
8 alcohol concentration of 0.02 or more or operating a commercial vehicle with a  
9 blood alcohol concentration of 0.04 or more; or

10 (D) pursuant to the conditions set forth in subsection (h) of this  
11 section, the person was convicted under 1201(c)(3)(A) of a violation of  
12 subdivision 1201(a) of this title related to burglary when the person was  
13 25 years of age or younger, and the person did not carry a dangerous or deadly  
14 weapon during commission of the offense.

15 (2) The State's Attorney or Attorney General shall be the respondent in  
16 the matter. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, if a person petitions to  
17 seal or expunge a criminal history record prior to the date the offense is  
18 eligible for sealing or expungement as provided in this section, only the office  
19 that prosecuted the offense that is the subject of the sealing or expungement  
20 petition may stipulate to that petition. The office that prosecuted the offense  
21 may waive this requirement to allow for another prosecutorial office to

1 stipulate to a petition filed prior to the date the offense is eligible for sealing or  
2 expungement.

3 (3) The court shall grant the petition without hearing if the petitioner  
4 and the respondent stipulate to the granting of the petition. The respondent  
5 shall file the stipulation with the court, and the court shall issue the petitioner  
6 an order of expungement and provide notice of the order in accordance with  
7 this section.

8 (4) This section shall not apply to an individual licensed as a  
9 commercial driver pursuant to 23 V.S.A. chapter 39 seeking to seal or expunge  
10 a record of a conviction for a felony offense committed in a motor vehicle as  
11 defined in 23 V.S.A. § 4.

12 (5) A person convicted of a qualifying offense for which the person has  
13 served a term of probation with payment of restitution as a condition of that  
14 probation may petition for sealing or expungement of that offense upon

3           record of a nonpredicate misdemeanor offense or a violation of 18 V.S.A.  
4           § 4230(a), 4231(a), 4232(a), 4233(a), 4234(a), 4234a(a), 4234b(a), 4235(b), or  
5           4235a(a):

6           (1) The court shall grant the petition and order that the criminal history  
7           record be expunged pursuant to section 7606 of this title if the following  
8           conditions are met:

6 (2) The court shall grant the petition and order that all or part of the

9 the court finds that:

6 (B) the person has not been convicted of a ~~crime arising out of a new~~  
7 ~~incident or occurrence~~ subsequent offense since the person was convicted of a

9 (3) Any restitution ordered by the court has been paid in full.

10 (4) The court finds that sealing of the criminal history record serves the

12 (h) Certain burglary offenses. For petitions filed pursuant to subdivision

14 would not be in the interests of justice, the court shall grant the petition and  
15 order that the criminal history record be expunged or sealed in accordance with  
16 section 7606 or 7607 of this title if the following conditions are met:

17 (1) At least 15 years have elapsed since the date on which the person

4           (3) Any restitution ordered by the court has been paid in full.

5           (4) The court finds that expungement or sealing of the criminal history  
6 record serves the interests of justice.

7           (i) Qualifying felony property offenses and selling, dispensing, or  
8 transporting regulated substances offenses. For petitions filed to expunge or  
9 seal a criminal history record of a qualifying felony property offense or a  
10 violation of 18 V.S.A. § 4230(b), 4231(b), 4232(b), 4233(b), 4234(b),  
11 4234a(b), 4234b(b), 4235(c), or 4235a(b):

12           (1) The court shall grant the petition and order that the criminal history  
13 record be sealed pursuant to section 7607 of this title if the following  
14 conditions are met:

15           (A) At least eight years have elapsed since:

16           (i) the date on which the person satisfied the judgment for the  
17 conviction; or

18           (ii) if the person committed a subsequent offense, the date on  
19 which the person satisfied the judgment for the subsequent offense, whichever  
20 is later.



1           (B) Any restitution ordered by the court for any crime of which the  
2           person has been convicted has been paid in full.

3           (C) After considering the particular nature of any subsequent offense,  
4           the court finds that sealing of the criminal history record for the qualifying  
5           crime serves the interests of justice.

6           (2) A criminal history record sealed pursuant to this subsection (i) shall  
7           be eligible for expungement pursuant to section 7606 of this title eight years  
8           after the date on which the sealing order is issued if the person does not  
9           commit any criminal offense subsequent to the sealed offense.

10          (3) If the respondent stipulates to a petition filed prior to, on, or after the  
11          date the offense is eligible for sealing as provided in this subsection, the court  
12          may grant the petition to seal or expunge without a hearing.

13          (j) Qualifying felonies. For petitions filed to expunge or seal a criminal  
14          history record of any other qualifying felony offense not specified in  
15          subsection (f), (h), or (i) of this section:

16          (1) The court shall grant the petition and order that the criminal history  
17          record be sealed pursuant to section 7607 of this title if the following  
18          conditions are met:

19                (A) At least 10 years have elapsed since the date on which the person  
20                satisfied the judgment for the conviction or, if the person committed a

1 subsequent offense, 10 years from the date on which the person satisfied the  
2 judgment for the subsequent offense, whichever is later.

3 (B) Any restitution ordered by the court for any crime of which the  
4 person has been convicted has been paid in full.

5 (2) A criminal history record sealed pursuant to this subsection (j) shall  
6 not be eligible for expungement pursuant to section 7606 of this title unless the  
7 respondent stipulates to the expungement.

8 (3) If the respondent stipulates to a petition to seal filed prior to, on, or  
9 after the date the offense is eligible for sealing as provided in this subsection,  
10 the court may grant the petition to seal without a hearing.

12 § 7607. EFFECT OF SEALING

13 (a) Order and notice. Upon entry of an order to seal, the order shall be  
14 legally effective immediately and the person whose record is sealed shall be  
15 treated in all respects as if he or she had never been arrested, convicted, or  
16 sentenced for the offense and that its effect is to annul the record of arrest,  
17 conviction, and sentence. The court shall provide notice of the sealing to the  
18 respondent, Vermont Crime Information Center (VCIC), the arresting agency,  
19 and any other entity that may have a record related to the order to seal. The  
20 court shall also make a reasonable effort to notify the person whose record is  
21 sealed that, pursuant to section 7602 of this title, he or she may be eligible for a

1 subsequent expungement after a required waiting period. “Reasonable effort”  
2 means attempting to contact the person by first-class mail at the person’s last  
3 known address and by telephone at the person’s last known phone number.

4 The VCIC shall provide notice of the sealing to the Federal Bureau of  
5 Investigation’s National Crime Information Center.

10 (e)(1) Except as provided in subdivision (2) of this subsection, upon the  
11 entry of an order sealing such files and records under this section, the  
12 proceedings in the matter ~~under this act~~ shall be considered never to have  
13 occurred, all general index references ~~thereto~~ to the sealed record shall be  
14 deleted, and the person, the court, and law enforcement officers and  
15 departments shall reply to any request for information that no record exists  
16 with respect to such person upon inquiry in any matter. Copies of the order  
17 shall be sent to each agency or official named in the order.

18 (2)(A) Any court, agency, or department that seals a record pursuant to  
19 an order under this section may keep a special index of files and records that  
20 have been sealed. This index shall only list the name and date of birth of the  
21 subject of the sealed files and records and the docket number of the proceeding

1 ~~which~~ that was the subject of the sealing. The special index shall be  
2 confidential and may be accessed only for purposes for which a department or  
3 agency may request to unseal a file or record pursuant to subsection (f) of this

7 (i) the commissioner and general counsel of any administrative  
8 department;

9 (ii) the secretary and general counsel of any administrative

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(g) On application of a person who has pleaded guilty to or has been convicted of the commission of a crime under the laws of this State ~~which that~~ the person committed prior to attaining ~~the age of 21~~ 25 years of age, or on the motion of the court having jurisdiction over such a person, after notice to all parties of record and hearing, the court shall order the sealing of all files and records related to the proceeding if it finds:

(1) two years have elapsed since the final discharge of the person;

(2) the person has not been convicted of a listed crime as defined in 13 V.S.A. § 5301 or adjudicated delinquent for such an offense ~~after the initial conviction~~ for 10 years prior to the application or motion, and no new proceeding is pending seeking such conviction or adjudication; and

(3) the person’s rehabilitation has been attained to the satisfaction of the court.

§ 2303. EXPUNGEMENT OF VIOLATION RECORDS

(a) Expungement. Two years following the satisfaction of a judgment resulting from an adjudication or conviction of a violation identified in this subsection the Judicial Bureau shall make an entry of “expunged” and notify the Department of Motor Vehicles of such action consistent with the data

1 transfer policy between the Judicial Bureau and the Department. The data  
2 transfer to the Department shall include the name, date of birth, ticket number,  
3 offense, license number, and personal identifying number. The Judicial  
4 Bureau shall make the expungement entry pursuant to this section for the  
5 following violations:

6 (1) section 301 of this title (operating an unregistered vehicle);

7 (2) subsection 307(a) of this title (failing to possess registration);

8 (3) section 611 of this title (failing to possess license);

9 (4) subsection 676(a) of this title (operating after suspension);

10 (5) section 601 of this title (operating without a license);

11 (6) section 800 of this title (operating without insurance); and

12 (7) subsection 1222(c) of this title (operating an uninspected vehicle).

13 (b) Effect of expungement.

14 (1) Upon entry of an expungement order, the order shall be legally  
15 effective immediately and the individual whose record is expunged shall be  
16 treated in all respects as if he or she had never been convicted or adjudicated of  
17 the violation. This includes the expungement of any points accumulated  
18 pursuant to chapter 25 of this title.

19 (2) Upon an entry of expunged, the case will be accessible only by the  
20 Clerk of the Court for the Judicial Bureau or the Clerk's designee. Convictions  
21 or adjudications that have been expunged shall not appear in the results of any

1 Judicial Bureau database search by name, date of birth, driver’s license  
2 number, or any other data identifying the defendant. Any documents or other  
3 records related to an expunged conviction or adjudication that are maintained  
4 outside the Judicial Bureau’s case management system shall be destroyed.

5 (3) Upon receiving an inquiry from any person regarding an expunged  
6 record, the Judicial Bureau and Department of Motor Vehicles shall respond  
7 that “NO RECORD EXISTS.”

8 (c) Policies for implementation. The Court Administrator shall establish  
9 policies for implementing this section.

10 Sec. 8. VERMONT SENTENCING COMMISSION; EXPUNGEMENT  
11 AND SEALING REPORT

12 During the 2021 legislative interim, the Vermont Sentencing Commission  
13 shall consider how to simplify and automate the process of expungement and  
14 sealing of criminal history records and develop a comprehensive policy that  
15 provides an avenue for expungement or sealing of all offenses except those  
16 listed in 33 V.S.A. § 5204(a). On or before November 1, 2021, the  
17 Commission shall report to the Joint Legislative Justice Oversight Committee  
18 regarding its recommendations on:

19 (1) a policy to make all criminal history records eligible for sealing or  
20 expungement, except for records of convictions of the offenses listed in 33  
21 V.S.A. § 5204(a);

1           (2) the individuals or entities that should have access to sealed criminal  
2 history records;

3           (3) whether Vermont should continue to employ a two-track system that  
4 provides for sealing or expungement of criminal history records based on the  
5 nature of the offense, or whether Vermont should employ a one-track system  
6 that provides for either sealing or expungement for all eligible offenses;

7           (4) implementing an automated process, not requiring a petition, to seal  
8 and expunge criminal conviction records that provides for notice to the  
9 prosecuting office and an opportunity for the prosecutor to oppose the sealing  
10 or expungement.

12           This act shall take effect on July 1, 2021.
