THURSDAY, JUNE 16, 2005

In accordance with the call for a Special Session by His Excellency, the Governor, the members of the House of Representatives convened at the State House in Montpelier on the sixteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord, two thousand and five.

House Resolution Adopted

H.R. 1

Reps. Partridge of Windham and Flory of Pittsford offered a House resolution, entitled

House resolution relating to adoption of rules to govern the Special Session of 2005:

Resolved by the House of Representatives:

That the Rules of the House of Representatives in effect on June 4, 2005, be the rules of this Special Session of 2005 except for the following additions thereto:

Rule 40A. Bills and resolutions to be placed on the Calendar for notice and subsequent action shall comprise solely those bills and resolutions consisting of new matters introduced during the Special Session. Bills or resolutions may be introduced during this Special Session only with the consent of the Committee on Rules. Upon adjournment sine die of the Special Session all such matters contained in these new bills and resolutions not enacted into law shall terminate automatically and be of no further force and effect and shall not be pending upon the convening of the General Assembly in January, 2006, for the continuation of the 2005 biennial session.

Joint Resolution Amended and Adopted

J.R.H. 1

Joint resolution, entitled

Joint resolution relating to the Vermont State Colleges;

Offered by: Committee on Rules

Whereas, the protracted labor negotiations between the faculty and the administration at the Vermont State Colleges (VSC) have suggested concerns about the future of the colleges, the communications between the faculty and the administration, the role of the faculty in planning and curriculum development, and the goals and directions of these important institutions to the young people and citizens of Vermont, and

Whereas, these issues ought to be examined and reviewed objectively, and recommendations should be developed for the renewed growth and enhancement of the state college system, outside the context of a contentious labor dispute, and

Whereas, the strength and well-being of the Vermont State Colleges must be maintained as the system provides unique and vital opportunities to Vermont's citizens; fully 66 percent of the Vermont students are in the first generation of their families to attend college, now therefore be it:

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That a Legislative Committee on the Vermont State Colleges is established to be composed of four members of the House appointed by the Speaker, not all from the same political party; four members of the Senate appointed by the Committee on Committees, not all from the same political party; one member to represent higher education in the state, not affiliated with the Vermont State Colleges, appointed by the Commissioner of Education; one member representing the business and industry sector who regularly contract for training programs and/or employ VSC graduates selected by the Vermont Business Roundtable; and one member representing labor interests, not affiliated with the Vermont State Colleges, appointed by the Vermont State Labor Council; and none of these last three members shall have been active participants in any of the political or other activities related to the VSC labor dispute, and be it further

Resolved: That the committee shall examine and make recommendations, if appropriate, to the concerns raised by the Faculty Assemblies of the four state colleges in their votes of no confidence in the chancellor, including, but not limited to, historical trends related to the allocation of system resources for administrative salaries relative to faculty salaries, use of part time and full time faculty, participation by the faculty in curriculum development and strategic planning at the colleges and across the system, communications among and between the college campuses and between the faculty and the administration, and the on-going working relationships within the VSC community, and be it further

Resolved: That the committee also review and calculate the past and future financial contributions of those current faculty who will not be eligible to participate in the early retirement program as a result of the recent labor negotiations, and recommend any appropriate means, including viable funding sources, to mitigate the personal and systemic losses to the faculty, and review and calculate the annual cost to VSC for the current early retirees until such time as the cohort all reaches age 65, and estimate an annual cost for those eligible for early retirement through 2010 until they reach age 65, be it further

Resolved: That the Committee may meet no more than six times during adjournment of the 2005 session, and for attendance at meetings, legislative members shall be entitled to compensation for services and reimbursement of expenses pursuant to 2 V.S.A. §406 and nonlegislative members shall be entitled to compensation and reimbursement as provided members of boards under 32 V.S.A. §1010, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Committee may have the assistance of the staff of the Joint Fiscal Office, the Legislative Council, and the Vermont State Colleges administration, faculty, and staff, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Committee shall submit its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly on or before January 15, 2006.

Was taken up and pending the question, Shall the House adopt the resolution? **Rep. Koch of Barre Town** moved to amend the resolution as follows:

In the first resolved clause, by deleting the words "one member representing the business and industry sector who regularly contract for training programs and/or employ VSC graduates selected by the Vermont Business Roundtable;" and inserting in lieu thereof, the following:

one member, selected by the Vermont Business Roundtable, to represent the business and industry sectors who regularly contract for training programs or employ VSC graduates;

Which was agreed to and the resolution was adopted as amended.

Rep. Houston of Ferrisburgh explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

The reason we are here today is because the language concerning the Vermont State collective bargaining agreement does not belong in the appropriations bill."

Rep. Milkey of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

According to the dictionary I found on my desk this morning, the first definition of "compromise" is "an agreement over a dispute reached by each side changing or giving up some demands".

While there is no compromise in this bill, I voted "yes" because of the language in the resolution we passed prior to this bill. I will look for the proof of the compromise in the results of the study by the legislative committee on the Vermont State Colleges."

Rep. Westman of Cambridge explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

You can't listen to the debate on this issue and say it is isolated.

The politics in this legislature has become the politics of confrontation not accommodation on issues like this and health care."

Rep. Young of Orwell explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I vote yes. The foregoing heated partisan debate proves but one thing to me. Collective bargaining never should have come before this body, and never should.... Hence the need for H. 1."

Rep. Zuckerman of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

Keeping your word and promises is "the Vermont way". It used to be your word, than a handshake, then a contract, then a law and now even that does not count anymore."
