Asset Building

- **1727** Vermonters received coaching to build assets and increase financial skills
- 751 enrolled in Financial capability classes
- Vermont business micro-businesses received help from the E.M.B.R.A.C.E Program led by BROC Community Action and federal funding
- **\$2,100,000** was distributed through **E.M.B.R.A.C.E** to over **436** micro-businesses assisted in the midst of a pandemic when business was faltering and Vermont entrepreneurs with low income were struggling
- 3,919 Vermonters received tax assistance
- **\$ 5,564,686** in tax refunds were returned to the Vermont economy through the VITA Program with an additional **\$2,432,993** in tax credits
- 163 Vermonters Increased their Savings
- 4 54 New Americans at CVOEO participated in Financial Coaching, House Parties and classes

Children and Families

- **1267** Vermont children were served
- 1243 home visits were made
- 590 Vermont children received dental assessments and 655 children received physicals
- 824 Vermont parents improved family functioning skills
- 590 Vermont families attended parenting classes addressing barriers to stability
- 848 Vermont children became ready for kindergarten

Community Building

- 962 Vermonters attended Fair Housing workshops to learn about housing discrimination
- 413 Vermonters found low/no cost clothing, furniture and household items by NEKCA, SEVCA and BROC
- 300 Vermonters received training in the BROC Community Action's Community Justice Program
- 184 Vermonters avoided evictions
- 330 Vermonters improved their leadership skills through engagement in Community Action Programs
- 534 Vermonters improved self-employment skills to provide for themselves and their families
- **395** Vermonters found safety in domestic and sexual assault intervention programs at CVOEO
- **507 hours** of hotline support was provided support to New American community members for help accessing vital resources

Health and Well Being

- 1.68 million meals were prepared and distributed through VT Everyone Eats (VEE) under the leadership of SEVCA. VEE distributed over \$25 million worth of emergency food relief, injecting \$20 million directly into Vermont's restaurant and food producing economy. 260 participating restaurants are on track to purchase \$1.8 million worth of food from more than 300 Vermont farms and food producers, with 27% of the ingredients for VEE meals being sourced from Vermont.
- Community Kitchen Academy employed past graduates to feed the hungry during the pandemic
- **5,627** Vermonters were assisted in applying for SNAP benefits
- **59,948** hot meals were made and distributed to those who are food insecure
- 48,779 boxes/bags of groceries were distributed

Housing Assistance, Homeless Housing

- ↓ VCAP Agencies provided services to the homeless in hotel settings. CVOEO has a Street Outreach Team and is operating a Community Resource Center
- 743 experiencing homelessness were provided temporary housing
- 4 1,301 individuals experiencing homelessness were helped to find permanent housing
- 1,584 Vermonters received support to find housing
- **599** Vermonters received security deposits and **671** Vermonters received rental assistance

Weatherization, Climate Action, Emergency Home Heating, Crisis Fuel, Warmth

- **727** units/homes were weatherized by Community Action Agencies
- \$903,092 was spent on labor, materials and replacement systems, through the Emergency Heating Repair and Replacement program
- **2,225** Vermonters are safer and warmer because of the work of Weatherization
- **2,270** Vermont households have improved energy efficiency and energy burden reduction
- There is a zero deferral policy in Weatherization because of funding to include heat pumps, wood and pellet stoves with an over view to energy savings
- ◆ VCAP Agencies are engaged in the effort to make our climate and world safer and more sustainable under the leadership of Capstone Community Action
- ♣ The purchase of Electric/Hybrid Vehicles (Mileage Smart with 189 cars purchased) and home heating and appliance technologies that replace fossil fuel-based equipment is aligned with the Financial and Energy Coach Initiative to strengthen goals of the VT Climate Council
- 3,414 Vermonters were served through the Crisis fuel Program for short term emergency assistance
- \$746,269 was raised in the heating season for the Warmth Program which is a sustained entirely by donations
