AGO Funded Services – Court Diversion and Pretrial Services

Court Diversion Program 3 V.S.A §§ 163 and 164(b)(1)

This restorative justice program is for youth with a delinquency petition and adults charged with a crime. Prosecutors may refer before or after preliminary hearing/arraignment.

Court Diversion case managers work with those referred who are willing to take responsibility for their actions and engage in a restorative process aimed at repairing the harm. Service needs related to the delinquency petition/charge are addressed in a restorative agreement. Completion of the Diversion Program results in dismissal of the delinquency/ criminal charge. Automatic expungement follows two years after dismissal.

Tamarack Program 3 v.s.A § 164(b)(2)

This restorative justice program is for adults and youth aged 18 and older charged with a crime or delinquency who have a substance use or mental health treatment need regardless of their criminal history. Prosecutors may refer before or after arraignment.

Staff quickly connect program participants to substance use, mental health, and other supportive community-based services. Participants must be willing to take responsibility for their actions and engage in a restorative process aimed at repairing the harm. Service needs related to the charge are addressed in a restorative agreement. Completion of the Diversion Program results in a dismissal of the delinquency/ criminal charge. Automatic expungement follows two years after dismissal.

Pretrial Services 13 V.S.A. § 7554c

This service is for adults and youth aged 18 and older with substance use or mental health treatment needs who are going through the court process and awaiting final case resolution. The Court may order a defendant to meet with a Coordinator, participate in a needs screening or clinical assessment and follow the recommendations of the treatment provider. Individuals may also choose to engage with pretrial services. A person's refusal to engage cannot result in a violation of conditions of release.

Pretrial Service Coordinators screen people for treatment needs, help people make and keep appointments for clinical assessments and treatment, connect defendants to recovery supports and other services. They only report to the Court, prosecutor, and defense attorney whether clinical assessment or treatment is indicated, a person completed an assessment, and if further engagement with PTS is recommended.

Youth Substance Awareness Safety Program 7 V.S.A. § 656; 18 V.S.A. § 4230b

The Youth Substance Awareness Safety Program (YSASP) provides an alternative to the civil court process for youth who violate Vermont's underage alcohol, cannabis, or buprenorphine laws. YSASP helps young people to understand the impact on themselves and others of using substances and to lower their risk of future use, while connecting those identified as using at high-risk levels to professional substance use clinicians. Vermont statutes direct law enforcement to refer youth to YSASP.

DLS Diversion program Act 147 (2011 Adj. Sess.)

The goal of the DLS (Driving with License Suspended) Diversion program is to restore people's privilege to drive by helping people to determine requirements for driver relicensing and by providing alternative affordable means to satisfy those requirements whenever possible. People participate following a Court Diversion referral by a prosecutor or referred by another community provider, family member, or friend.
