The statute, 3 V.S.A. § 137, charges the Director of the Office of Professional Regulation with adopting rules "to assess the equivalence of an applicant's professional credentials earned outside the United States as compared to State licensing requirements for those professions attached to the Office that do not have laws addressing the verification and recognition of such credentials." The statute further provides, "the Director may rely upon third-party credential verification services. The cost of such services shall be paid by the applicant." These rules fulfill this statutory directive through the use of third-party credential verification services. The rules require the applicant to bear the cost of obtaining an assessment and report from the credentialing verification services.

The rules provide a process for an applicant, who pursued professional credentials outside of the United States, to obtain a determination regarding whether the

applicant's credentials fulfill the requirements for Vermont licensure in a profession. An applicant is required to get a report from a credential evaluation service that provides an assessment of the applicant's credentials. The Office of Professional Regulation will then use that report in determining whether the applicant is qualified for a professional license.

15. EXPLANATION OF WHY THE RULE IS NECESSARY:

The rules are necessary to provide a pathway to licensure for individuals who obtained professional credentials in a country outside of the United States. In a majority of professions, the Office of Professional Regulation is not equipped to evaluate education, supervision, work and other professional qualifications issued by the majority of countries other than the United States. Third-party credential verification services have the resources and expertise to provide this review and assessment. These rules provide a process of incorporating the credential verification services' reports into the Vermont professional licensure application process. In turn, applicants who obtained credentials in a country other than the United States will have a process for determining whether they meet the qualificiations for professional licensure in Vermont and the public safety of Vermonters will remain protected by ensuring minimal professional licensure qualifications are fulfilled.

16. EXPLANATION OF HOW THE RULE IS NOT ARBITRARY:

These rules will apply to all applicants who obtained professional credentials in a country other than the United States. The only exceptions will be for professions associated with the Office of Professional Regulation that already incorporate a process for verification and recognition of such credentials in the existing professional rules.

The public comment period remained open until June 18, 2021. Comments received were unanimously supportive of the Rules with only one commenter seeking a technical correction to the abbreviation of the Credential Evaluation Service.



Building on the framework established in Act 10 of 2019, the rules being promulgated by the Office of Professional Regulation are vital to ensuring the utilization of the skills, talents, and education of internationally trained immigrants and refugees in Vermont. Although the state's innovative use of Credential Evaluation Services (CES) will continue to evolve, these rules mark a significant step toward providing equitable workforce opportunities to the state's internationally trained immigrant and refugee workers.

Final Proposed Administrative Rules for the Assessment of Professional Credentials Obtained Outside the United States SUMMARY OF COMMENTS AND AGENCY RESPONSE

Comment: The representative from the Association of International Credential Evaluators, Inc., one of the standards organizations selected to approve Credential Evaluation Services ("CES") for use in the Vermont credential evaluation process, requested that the abbreviation "AICE" follow, in parentheses, the full name of the organization in Section 4-1 of the Rules.

Response: The Office accepted this change.

Comments: At the June 1, 2021 public hearing, three medical doctors educated outside the United States expressed frustration that they were unable to obtain a license to practice medicine in the United States.

Response: The Office sympathizes with the challenges these professionals are facing. Unfortunately, the Office does not have jurisdiction over the licensing of medical doctors and the proposed Rules do not apply to this profession. OPR referred the commenters to the Board of Medical Practice.

Comment: A director of a CES suggested that the Office, at the next public hearing, provide a list of professions that OPR does regulate to lessen confusion.

Response: The Office took this suggestion and opened the next public hearing with a list of the professions to which the proposed Rules would apply.

Comment: The Chairperson from NACES, one of the two CES standards organizations named in the proposed Rules, wrote to emphasize that the organization uses published standards to evaluate its members. This comment was in response to a comment made during a public hearing that seemed to imply that NACES did not have such standards for membership.

Response: The Office reviewed the membership standards for both of the CES standards organizations, NACES and AICE, named in the proposed Rules. Both organizations require a CES adhere to rigorous, comprehensive standards in order to be a member in the standards organization.

Comment: Three commenters wrote to express support for the proposed Rules and the purpose behind them.

Response: The Office thanked these commenters for their support.

Administrative Rules for Assessing Professional Credentials Obtained Outside of the United States

- 2-2 "Director" means the Director of the Vermont Office of Professional Regulation.
- 2-3 "Office" means the Vermont Office of Professional Regulation.
- 2-4 "Credential Evaluation Service (CES)" means a third-party entity that specializes in the review and evaluation of professional credentials, education, work experience, examinations and other professional qualifications earned in a country or jurisdiction other than United States, and that is capable of providing a determination regarding equivalency of those professional qualifications, as compared to Vermont qualification requirements for a license in the relevant profession.

2-5 "United States" for the purposes of these rules means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States.

of equivalency of that qualification as compared to the qualification requirements for licensure in the relevant profession in Vermont.

- b) Applicants shall comply with the procedures required by the CES for obtaining a translation and evaluation report regarding educational equivalency or an equivalency determination for other licensure qualifications.
- c) The CES must send the education report and/or the determination of equivalency directly to the Office as part of the applicant's application for licensure in the relevant profession. Only original reports and equivalency determinations from a CES will be accepted by the Office as part of the applicant's application for licensure in the relevant profession in Vermont. No copies of reports or determinations of equivalence will be accepted from applicants.

- **i**-a) The cost of a third-party, credential-evaluation agency evaluation, report and determination shall be in addition to and separate from the license application fee assessed by the Office in the relevant profession.
- **ii.b)** The cost of a third-party, credential-evaluation agency evaluation, report and determination shall be paid by the applicant.

Part 5: Effect of Third-Party, Cr**edential**-Lyaluation Agency Determination Regarding Equivalency

5-1 Determination of Equivalence

- a) Upon a determination of equivalence of education or other qualifications from a CES, the Office shall accept the education or qualification obtained in a country or jurisdiction other than the United States as equivalent to and in substitution of the same education or qualification obtained in the United States.
- b) In addition to a determination of educational equivalence or qualifications equivalence from a CES, applicants shall pass the examinations required in relevant professional statutes and rules for licensure in that profession.

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5-2 Determination of Non-Equivalence

- a) Upon a determination from a CES that an applicant's education or qualifications are not equivalent to the educational or qualification requirements required for licensure in the relevant profession in Vermont, OPR shall preliminarily deny the applicant's application for the relevant professional license.
- b) The provisions relating to preliminary denials of applications for licensure set forth in 3 V.S.A. § 129(e) shall apply to a license application that is preliminarily denied for nonequivalence under this section.

5-3 Determination of Partial Equivalence

- Upon a determination from a CES that an applicant's education and/or qualifications in a profession that were obtained in a country or jurisdiction other than the United States fulfill some, but not all, of the education and/or qualifications requirements for licensure in the relevant profession in Vermont, the CES shall submit to the Office a report detailing which Vermont education and/or qualifications for licensure in the relevant profession remain unfulfilled.
- b) Upon completion of the unfulfilled education and/or qualifications and submission of documentation of completion of the education and/or qualifications to the Office, the applicant may be eligible for licensure in the relevant profession.
- 5-4 The Director may verify the accuracy and sufficiency of a CES's report and determinations regarding equivalency. If the Director finds that a CES report or determination regarding equivalency is inaccurate or insufficient, the Director may
 - a) Preliminarily deny the applicant's application for the relevant professional license in accordance with 3 V.S.A. § 129(e), or
 - b) Take the steps necessary to address and remedy the insufficiency or inaccuracy of the report or determination regarding equivalency with the CES responsible for the report. The Director may preliminarily deny the applicant's application for the relevant profession license, in accordance with 3 V.S.A. § 129(e), should the insufficient or inaccurate report or determination regarding equivalency not be able to be remedied.

Part 2: Definitions and Clarification of Terms

- 2-1 "Applicant" means an individual applying for a professional license in Vermont in a profession attached to the Office that does not have laws addressing the verification and recognition of credentials obtained in a country or jurisdiction outside of the United States.
- 2-2 "Director" means the Director of the Vermont Office of Professional Regulation.
- **2-3 "Office"** means the Vermont Office of Professional Regulation.
- 2-4 "Credential Evaluation Service (CES)" means a third-party entity that specializes in the review and evaluation of professional credentials, education, work experience, examinations and other professional qualifications earned in a country or jurisdiction other than United States, and that is capable of providing a determination regarding equivalency of those professional qualifications, as compared to Vermont qualification requirements for a license in the relevant profession.

2-5 "United States" for the purposes of these rules means a state of the United States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the United States.

Part 3: Waiver or Variance

3-1 The Director will not grant routine waivers or variances from any provisions of these rules without amending the rules. *See* 3 V.S.A. § 845. Where, in extraordinary circumstances, application of a rule would result in manifest unfairness, an absurd result, unjustifiable inefficiency, or an outcome otherwise inimical to the public health, safety, and welfare, the Director may, upon written request of an interested party, grant a waiver with or without particular conditions and limitations, and record the action and justification in a written memorandum. This rule shall not be construed as creating any hearing right or cause of action.

The Director may preliminarily deny the applicant's application for the relevant profession license, in accordance with 3 V.S.A. § 129(e), should the insufficient or inaccurate report or determination regarding equivalency not be able to be remedied.

§ 137. Uniform process for foreign credential verification

(a) The Director shall adopt rules that prescribe a process for the Director to assess the equivalence of an applicant's professional credentials earned outside the United States as compared to State licensing requirements for those professions attached to the Office that do not have laws addressing the verification and recognition of such credentials.

(b) Any determination of equivalence by the Director under this section shall be recorded in the applicant's licensing file and shall be binding upon the relevant State board or regulatory program.

(c) In administering this section, the Director may rely upon third-party credential verification services. The cost of such services shall be paid by the applicant.

(d) The provisions relating to preliminary license denials set forth in subsection 129(e) of this subchapter shall apply to a license application that is preliminarily denied for nonequivalence under this section. (Added 2019, No. 10, § 1, eff. April 30, 2019.)
