- Administrative expenses of grant recipients
- Up to \$1.5M for operational expenses of Board and Department
- § 8084. Management of the Fund
 - Vermont Community Broadband Board
 - Within the Department of Public Service
 - Has approval authority with respect to budget development, program design, grant awards, and all other funding allocations
 - Consists of 3 members
 - One Governor appointee not a State employee, expertise in finance, serves as Chair
 - One House appointee not a legislator, expertise in broadband deployment in rural, high-cost areas
 - One Senate appointee not a legislator, expertise in communications and electric utility law and policy
 - Member may not be owner/employee, etc. of CUD or ISP
 - 3-year terms; may be reappointed; removal only for cause
 - Per diem of \$250/day and reasonable expenses
 - Powers include:
 - Coordinate and facilitate community broadband efforts
 - Provide technical and administrative support to CUDs
 - Provide preconstruction and construction grants
 - Facilitate partnerships between CUDs and potential partners
 - Promote a strong communications workforce
 - Promote access to affordable broadband service
 - Consult with VEDA and VT Municipal Bond Bank regarding financing opportunities
 - Identify other broadband funding opportunities
 - Provide input to Department on the 10-year Telecom Plan
 - Do any and all things necessary to carry out purposes of chapter
 - Department provides administrative support for the Board
 - Subject to Open Meeting Law and Public Records Act (trade secrets are exempt from disclosure)
 - o Executive Director
 - Appointed by Governor with advice and consent of Senate
 - Employee of Department, overseen and managed by Board
 - Serves as Board's chief administrative officer
 - Among other things:
 - Works with Board on developing and implementing the programs established by this chapter
 - Makes grant recommendations to the Board
 - May retain or employ additional personnel
 - Authorized to hire up to 3 FTEs (classified service)
 - Oversees and manages Rural Broadband Technical Assistance Specialist upon appointment

- Department administers the Fund and can make decisions except those decisions committed specifically to the Board
- \$1M Northern Border Regional Commission grant to support CUDs, including the position funded by the grant, overseen and managed by Board

• § 8085. Broadband Preconstruction Grant Program

- o Grants to CUDs for preconstruction costs related to broadband projects that are part of a "universal service plan"
- Such costs include feasibility studies, business planning, pole data surveys, engineering and design, and make-ready work

• § 8086. Broadband Construction Grant Program

- O Grants to "eligible providers" to fund broadband projects that are part of a "universal service plan"
- o Priority given to projects that:
 - Leverage existing private resources and assets, with a high priority given to partnerships between a CUD and a distribution utility
 - Demonstrate project readiness
 - Provide service that complies with net neutrality standards
 - Support low-income or disadvantaged communities
 - Promote geographic diversity of fund allocations
 - Provide customers with affordable service options
 - Include public assets that can be shared by multiple service providers and that can support a variety of public purposes
- o Board establishes policies and standard grant terms and conditions that:
 - Reflect payment schedules that ensure maximum accountability
 - Adopt an industry-accepted engineering standard that promotes network reliability, resiliency, and interoperability
 - Establish standards for recouping grant funds and transferring ownership of grant-funded network assets to the State if a grantee materially fails to comply with grant terms and conditions
 - Prohibit the sale or transfer of grant-funded network assets without the prior written approval of the Board
 - Ensure project completion within a reasonable period of time and consistent with applicable federal law and guidance
 - Comply with Administrative Bulletins 5 (policy for grant issuance and monitoring) and 3.5 (policy for procurement and contracting procedures), and any other requirements of federal law and guidance
- Before awarding a grant, Board shall determine applicant has produced a viable business plan (engineering and design; labor needs and availability, supply-chain contingencies, make-ready work, etc.)
- o Before awarding a grant to a provider who is *not* a CUD, Board shall make a reasonable effort to determine that the provider's universal service plan does not conflict with or undermine a CUD's deployment plans
- Overbuilds allowed if the project is the most cost-effective method for providing service to nearby unserved and underserved locations and Board considers known or probable service extensions or upgrades

- O Any ISP may apply for a grant for a project that is not part of a universal service plan, such as a line extension, if it provides at least 25/3 Mbps on or before December 31, 2021 and is not in the geographic area of a CUD
- Legislative intent projects funded under this Program demonstrate an
 economically sustainable business model that ultimately will be eligible for
 financing in the private or municipal bond market

• § 8087. Centralized Resources for CUDs

- Resources/technical/admin support for planning, development, and implementation of CUD broadband projects
- o Board shall:
 - Develop standardized forms, contracts, models, templates
 - Assist with identifying and negotiating with potential partners
 - Apply for loans, grants, permits, etc. on behalf of or jointly with a CUD when so authorized
 - Assist with fiber route identification and obtaining pole surveys and pole attachments
 - Assist with grant and loan applications from other funding sources
 - Assist with obtaining access to fiber owned by the State or by an electric transmission or distribution utility, where appropriate

• § 8088. Interagency Cooperation and Assistance

- Other departments/agencies assist/cooperate share relevant data
- o Secretary of Administration establishes protocols and agreements

• § 8089. Annual Report

- o Report to legislative committees
- o Description of start-up CUD progress towards achieving long-term financial sustainability not dependent on public funding
- o Progress towards meeting State goal (100 Mbps by end of year 2024)
- o First annual report, due January 15, 2022, shall include:
 - Recommendations for legislation, generally, and also with regard to increased access to State or electric-utility owned fiber
 - Recommendations with regard to expanding Fund expenditures for:
 - DOL FiberConnect Network
 - Wi-Fi installations at multi-unit affordable housing
 - Digital inclusion initiatives (affordability; digital literacy)
 - Co-worker spaces
 - Communications workforce development initiatives
 - Any other broadband programs and initiatives

• § 8089a. Sunset; Transfer Plan

- o Fund and Board sunset July 1, 2029
- Final annual report to General Assembly shall include a transfer plan and may include a recommendation for continued existence of Board

Sec. 3 **Organizational Meeting; Space Allocation**

- Within 60 days, Board holds initial organizational meeting and Governor appoints Executive Director
- Within 60 days, BGS allocates office space for Board
