When I can sell directly to a school or to schools through local distributors, it helps my farm business connect with our local community and build long term relationships. The school system genuinely wants to support their local farms, but oftentimes there are just too many things preventing them from making it a regular occurrence. In our experience with selling to local schools, the students get excited to know that the beef that they're eating in their sloppy joe came from the farm down the road, or the apples they're eating on the side come from an orchard that they can go visit with their parents. The younger generation is the farthest removed from the farm of any generation so far and often make very little connection between the food that they eat, where it came from and how it was grown/raised. Keeping local food in our school system will help our kids to be mindful of what food they eat, where they buy it from and will hopefully be more likely to support their local farmers in the future.
