4 Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make  
5 miscellaneous changes to education laws.

6 An act relating to miscellaneous changes to education laws

7 It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

8 \* \* \* Community College of Vermont In-State Tuition for Refugees \* \* \*

9 Sec. 1. 16 V.S.A. § 2185 is amended to read:

10 § 2185. DETERMINATION OF RESIDENCY FOR TUITION PURPOSES

11 (a) The Board of Trustees shall adopt policies related to residency for  
12 tuition purposes, consistent with State and federal requirements.

13 (b) Any member of the U.S. Armed Forces on active duty who is  
14 transferred to Vermont for duty other than for the purpose of education shall,  
15 upon transfer and for the period of active duty served in Vermont, be  
16 considered a resident for in-state tuition purposes at the start of the next  
17 semester or academic period.

18 (c) For determination of residency for tuition purposes for the Community  
19 College of Vermont, a person who resides in Vermont and meets the definition  
20 of “refugee” under 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(42) shall, upon arrival in Vermont and

1 for the period of residency in Vermont, be considered a resident for in-state  
2 tuition purposes at the start of the next semester or academic period.

3 \* \* \* Suspension or Expulsion of Students \* \* \*

4 Sec. 2. 16 V.S.A. § 1162 is amended to read:

5 § 1162. SUSPENSION OR EXPULSION OF STUDENTS

6 (a) A superintendent or principal may, pursuant to policies adopted by the  
7 school board that are consistent with State Board rules, suspend a student for  
8 up to 10 school days or, with the approval of the board of the school district,  
9 expel a student for up to the remainder of the school year or up to 90 school  
10 days, whichever is longer, for misconduct:

11 (1) on school property, on a school bus, or at a school-sponsored activity  
12 when the misconduct makes the continued presence of the student harmful to  
13 the welfare of the school;

14 (2) not on school property, on a school bus, or at a school-sponsored  
15 activity where direct harm to the welfare of the school can be demonstrated; or

16 (3) not on school property, on a school bus, or at a school-sponsored  
17 activity where the misconduct can be shown to pose a clear and substantial  
18 interference with another student's equal access to educational programs.

19 (b) Nothing contained in this section shall prevent a superintendent or  
20 principal, subject to subsequent due process procedures, from removing  
21 immediately from a school a student who poses a continuing danger to persons

1 or property or an ongoing threat of disrupting the academic process of the  
2 school, or from expelling a student who brings a weapon to school pursuant to  
3 section 1166 of this title.

4 (c) Principals, superintendents, and school boards are authorized and  
5 encouraged to provide alternative education services or programs to students  
6 during any period of suspension or expulsion authorized under this section.

7 (d) Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this chapter, a student  
8 enrolled in a public school, approved independent school, or prequalified  
9 private prekindergarten program who is under eight years of age shall not be  
10 suspended or expelled from the school; provided, however, that the school may  
11 suspend or expel the student if the student poses an imminent threat of harm or  
12 danger to others in the school.

14 Sec. 3. REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS ON THE IMPACT OF  
15 STANDARDIZING THE ENTRANCE AGE THRESHOLD FOR  
16 PUBLIC SCHOOL KINDERGARTEN

17 On or before December 15, 2022, the Agency of Education shall issue a  
18 written report to the Senate and House Committees on Education on the impact  
19 of standardizing the entrance age threshold for public school kindergarten  
20 attendance. In preparing the report, the Agency of Education shall consult  
21 with the Vermont Department for Children and Families, the Vermont

1 Department of Health, the Vermont School Boards Association, the Vermont  
2 Principals' Association, the Vermont Superintendents Association, and the  
3 Vermont National Education Association. The report shall include any  
4 recommendations for legislative action.

6 Sec. 4. REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS FOR A STATEWIDE  
7 UNIFORM SCHOOL CALENDAR

8 On or before January 15, 2023, the Agency of Education shall issue a  
9 written report to the Senate and House Committees on Education on the impact  
10 of creating a statewide uniform school calendar that shall include student  
11 attendance days, periods of vacation, holidays, and teacher in-service  
12 education days. The report shall include any recommendations for legislative  
13 action.
