

1 TO THE HONORABLE SENATE:

2 The Committee on Government Operations to which was referred Senate
3 Bill No. 181 entitled “An act relating to authorizing miscellaneous regulatory
4 authority for municipal governments” respectfully reports that it has
5 considered the same and recommends that the bill be amended by striking out
6 all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

7 * * * Ordinance Authority Subject to Permissive Referendum * * *

8 Sec. 1. 24 V.S.A. § 2291 is amended to read:

9 § 2291. ENUMERATION OF POWERS

10 For the purpose of promoting the public health, safety, welfare, and
11 convenience, a town, city, or incorporated village shall have the following
12 powers:

13 (1) To set off portions of public highways of the municipality for
14 sidewalks and bicycle paths and to regulate their installation and use.

15 * * *

16 (4) To regulate the operation and use of vehicles of every kind including
17 the power: to erect traffic signs and signals; to regulate the speed of vehicles
18 subject to 23 V.S.A. chapter 13, subchapter 12; to implement traffic-calming
19 devices; to regulate or exclude the parking of all vehicles; and to provide for
20 waiver of the right of appearance and arraignment in court by persons charged

1 with parking violations by payment of specified fines within a stated period of
2 time.

3 * * *

4 (6) To regulate the location, installation, maintenance, repair, and
5 removal of utility poles, wires and conduits, water pipes or mains, storm
6 drains, or gas mains and sewers, upon, under, or above public highways or
7 public property of the municipality.

8 * * *

9 (13) To compel the cleaning or repair of any premises that in the
10 judgment of the legislative body is dangerous to the health or safety of the
11 public and to establish standards for the maintenance of all premises within the
12 municipality to protect the health and safety of the public or to prevent injury
13 to other properties in the vicinity.

14 * * *

15 (24) Upon the determination by a municipal building inspector, health
16 officer, or fire marshal that a building within the boundaries of the town, city,
17 or incorporated village is uninhabitable or blighted, to recover all expenses
18 incident to the maintenance of the uninhabitable or blighted building with the
19 expenses to constitute a lien on the property in the same manner and to the
20 same extent as taxes assessed on the grand list, and all procedures and
21 remedies for the collection of taxes shall apply to the collection of those

1 expenses; provided, however, that the town, city, or incorporated village has
2 adopted rules to determine the habitability of a building, including provisions
3 for notice in accordance with 32 V.S.A. § 5252(3) to the building's owner
4 prior to incurring expenses and including provisions for an administrative
5 appeals process.

11 (c) Abandonment of vessels prohibited.

12 (1) Civil violation. A person shall not abandon a vessel on public
13 waters or immediately adjacent land. A person who violates this subdivision
14 shall be subject to civil enforcement under chapters 201 and 211 of this title
15 and, in any such enforcement action, the Secretary or municipality may obtain
16 an order to recover costs specified in subdivision (d)(1) of this section incurred
17 by the Agency of Natural Resources.

19 (d)(1)(A) Removal of abandoned vessel. Upon request from a law
20 enforcement officer or at ~~his or her~~ the Secretary's own initiative, the Secretary
21 shall promptly cause the removal and safe storage of a vessel that is abandoned

1 as described in subdivision (a)(1) of this section, unless the vessel is to be
2 removed by a federal agency. If removal is requested by a law enforcement
3 officer, the Secretary shall make reasonable efforts to determine if the vessel
4 qualifies as abandoned. In addition, the Secretary shall have the authority to
5 take actions as may be necessary to eliminate risks to public health or safety
6 caused by the condition of the vessel.

7 (B) A municipality shall have the authority granted to the Secretary
8 in subdivision (A) of this subdivision (d)(1) and may remove a damaged and
9 leaking vessel from public waters, provided that:

10 (i) the municipality reports the presence of the abandoned vessel
11 to the Secretary; and

12 (ii) the municipality reports the presence of the abandoned vessel
13 to the owner of the vessel, if possible.

14 (C) A municipality shall have the authority to issue civil penalties
15 and impound a vessel when exercising the authority granted pursuant to
16 subdivision (B) of this subdivision (d)(1).

3 § 2645a. CHARTERED MUNICIPALITIES; VOTE TO SUSPEND

4 CHARTER AUTHORITY AND RELY ON GENERAL

5 MUNICIPAL LAW

6 (a) A municipality may propose to suspend specific authority granted by
7 charter for a period of X years and instead use later-enacted general municipal
8 authority granted to all Vermont municipalities by the General Assembly,
9 provided that the proposal is approved by the voters at any annual or special
10 meeting warned for that purpose according to the procedures established in this
11 section.

12 (b) The proposal may be made by the legislative body of the municipality
13 or by petition of five percent of the voters of the municipality. The proposal
14 shall specifically identify and contain the later-enacted general law that the
15 municipality proposes to use in lieu of the charter provision. The proposal
16 shall further identify whether the municipality requests that the General
17 Assembly repeal the charter provision identified in the proposal.

18 (c) The legislative body of the municipality shall hold at least two public
19 hearings prior to the meeting to vote on the charter proposal. Notice of each
20 public hearing and of the annual or special meeting shall be given in
21 accordance with section 2641 of this chapter.

1 (d) The proposal shall be filed as a public record in the office of the clerk
2 of the municipality at least 10 days before the first public hearing and be
3 available for public inspection or copying upon request.

4 (e) Voting on a proposal shall be by Australian ballot.

5 (f) If the proposal is approved by a majority of voters at an annual or
6 special meeting warned for that purpose, then the municipal clerk shall certify
7 the results of the vote and send the following documents to the House and
8 Senate Committees on Government Operations:

9 (1) a copy of the proposal filed with the clerk pursuant to subsection (d)
10 of this section;

11 (2) a copy of the ballot and the results of the vote; and

12 (3) copies of the warnings and published notices for each of the public
13 hearings held pursuant to subsection (c) of this section.

3 the members of the municipal bodies shall be residents of the municipality.

5 meeting warned for that purpose.

6 (b) The proposal may be made by the legislative body of the municipality

§ 312a. MEETINGS OF PUBLIC BODIES; STATE OF EMERGENCY

(a) As used in this section:

(1) “Affected public body” means a public body:

(A) whose regular meeting location is located in an area affected by a hazard; and

(B) that cannot meet in a designated physical meeting location due to a declared state of emergency pursuant to 20 V.S.A. chapter 1.

(2) “Hazard” means an “all-hazards” as defined in 20 V.S.A. § 2(1).

(b) Notwithstanding subdivisions 312(a)(2)(D) and (c)(2) of this title, during a declared state of emergency under 20 V.S.A. chapter 1:

(1) A quorum or more of an affected public body may attend a regular, special, or emergency meeting by electronic or other means without designating a physical meeting location where the public may attend.

(2) The members and staff of an affected public body shall not be required to be physically present at a designated meeting location.

(3) An affected public body of a municipality may post any meeting agenda or notice of a special meeting in two publicly accessible designated electronic locations in lieu of the two designated public places in the

1 municipality, or in a combination of a designated electronic location and a
2 designated public place.

3 (c) When an affected public body meets electronically under subsection (b)
4 of this section, the affected public body shall:

5 (1) use technology that permits the attendance and participation of the
6 public through electronic or other means;

7 (2) whenever feasible, allow the public to access the meeting by
8 telephone; and

9 (3) post information that enables the public to directly access and
10 participate in meetings electronically and shall include this information in the
11 published agenda for each meeting.

12 (d) Unless unusual circumstances make it impossible for them to do so, the
13 legislative body of each municipality and each school board shall record any
14 meetings held pursuant to this section.

15 (e) An affected public body of a municipality shall continue to post notices
16 and agendas in or near the municipal clerk's office pursuant to

8 a homestead has been declared with respect to the property for the year in
9 which the appeal is taken. The hearing officer or court shall take into account

16 (a) Notwithstanding this chapter or any provision of law to the contrary, a
17 municipality; a person who is permitted as a public water system pursuant to
18 10 V.S.A. chapter 56 and who provides another person water as a part of the
19 operation of that public water system; or a company engaged in the collecting,
20 sale, and distribution of water for domestic, industrial, business, or fire
21 protection purposes that is regulated by the Public Utility Commission under

1 30 V.S.A. § 203(3) shall be prohibited from disconnecting any person from
2 services during a declared state of emergency under 20 V.S.A. chapter 1,
3 provided that:

4 (1) the state of emergency is declared in response to an all-hazards event
5 that will cause financial hardship and the inability of ratepayers to pay for
6 water or sewer services; and

7 (2) the all-hazards event does not require the water or sewer service
8 provider to disconnect services to protect the health and safety of the public.

11 chapter 56 may be enforced by the Agency of Natural Resources pursuant to

14 in the collecting, sale, and distribution of water for domestic, industrial,
15 business, or fire protection purposes that is regulated by the Public Utility
16 Commission under 30 V.S.A. § 203(3) may be enforced by the Public Utility
17 Commission pursuant to 30 V.S.A. § 30.

18 (c) A ratepayer shall remain obligated for any amounts due to a water or
19 sewer service provider subject to this section. The ratepayer shall have a
20 minimum of 90 days after the end of the declared state of emergency to pay the
21 amounts due.

2 § 47. MUNICIPAL DEADLINES, PLANS, AND LICENSES; EXTENSION

3 (a) During a state of emergency declared under this chapter, a municipal
4 corporation may:

5 (1) extend any statutory deadline applicable to municipal corporations,
6 provided that the deadline does not relate to a license, permit, program, or plan
7 issued or administered by the State or federal government; and

8 (2) extend or waive deadlines applicable to licenses, permits, programs,
9 or plans that are issued by the municipal corporation.

10 (b) During a state of emergency declared under this chapter, any expiring
