3	entitled "An act relating to earned discharge from probation" respectfully
4	reports that it has considered the same and recommends that the bill be
5	amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu
6	thereof the following:
7	Sec. 1. 28 V.S.A. § 200 is added to read:
8	§ 200. PURPOSE OF PROBATION
9	It is the policy of this State that the purpose of probation is to rehabilitate
10	offenders, reduce the risk that they will commit a subsequent offense, and
11	thereby protect the safety of the victim and the community.
12	Sec. 2. 28 V.S.A. § 251 is amended to read:
13	§ 251. DURATION OF PROBATION
14	(a) The court placing a person on probation may terminate the period of
15	probation and discharge the person at any time if such termination is warranted
16	by the conduct of the offender and the ends of justice.
17	(b)(1) Upon the Commissioner's motion to discharge pursuant to
18	subsection 252(d) of this title, the sentencing court shall terminate the period of
19	probation and discharge the person at the midpoint of the probation term unless
20	the prosecutor seeks a continuation of probation and the court finds by a
21	preponderance of the evidence that:

1	(A) termination and discharge will present a risk of danger to the
2	victim of the offense or to the community; or
3	(B) the probationer is not substantially in compliance with the
4	conditions of probation that are related to the probationer's rehabilitation or to
5	victim or community safety.
6	(2) If the court grants the prosecutor's motion to continue probation, it
7	may continue probation for the full term or any portion thereof. The court
8	shall also review the conditions of probation and remove any conditions that
9	are no longer necessary for the remainder of the term.
10	(c) A probationer shall not be deemed ineligible for discharge or term
11	reduction due to unpaid restitution, fees, or surcharges.
12	Sec. 3. 28 V.S.A. § 252 is amended to read:
13	§ 252. CONDITIONS OF PROBATION AND MIDPOINT REVIEW
14	(a) Conditions, generally. The conditions of probation shall be such as the
15	court in its discretion deems reasonably necessary to ensure that the offender
16	will lead a law-abiding life or to assist the offender to do so. The court shall
17	provide as an explicit condition of every sentence to probation that if the
18	offender is convicted of another offense during the period for which the
19	sentence remains subject to revocation, then the court may impose revocation
20	of the offender's probation.

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1	(b) <u>Probation conditions.</u> When imposing a sentence of probation, the
2	court may, as a condition of probation, require that the offender:
3	(1) Work faithfully at a suitable employment or faithfully pursue a
4	course of study or of vocational training that will equip the offender for
5	suitable employment.
6	(2) Work faithfully for a prescribed number of hours at community
7	service activity acceptable to the court, or, if so ordered by the court,
8	acceptable to a probation officer.
9	(3) Undergo available medical or psychiatric treatment and remain at a
10	specified institution if required for that purpose.
11	(4) Attend or reside at a facility established for the instruction,
12	recreation, or residence of persons on probation.
13	(5) Support the offender's dependents and meet other family
14	responsibilities.
15	(6) Make restitution or reparation to the victim of his or her conduct, or
16	to the Victims' Compensation Fund to the extent it has made payment to or on
17	behalf of the victim in accordance with 13 V.S.A. chapter 167, for the damage
18	or injury which that was sustained. When restitution or reparation is a
19	condition of the sentence, the court, in accordance with 13 V.S.A. § 7043, shall

fix the amount thereof, which shall not exceed an amount the defendant can or

will be able to pay, and shall fix the manner of performance.

I	(7) Pay a fine authorized in accordance with law.
2	(8) Refrain from purchasing or possessing a firearm or ammunition
3	therefor, destructive device, or other dangerous weapon unless granted written
4	permission by the court or probation officer.
5	(9) Report to a probation officer at reasonable times as directed by the
6	court or the probation officer.
7	(10) Permit the probation officer to visit the offender at reasonable times
8	at his or her home or elsewhere.
9	(11) Remain within the jurisdiction of the court, unless granted
10	permission to leave by the court or the probation officer.
11	(12) Answer all reasonable inquiries by the probation officer and
12	promptly notify the probation officer of any change in address or employment.
13	(13) Not in any way harass the victim or the family of the victim.
14	(14) Not contact the victim, unless this condition is specifically waived
15	by the victim.
16	(15) Participate in the Restorative Justice Program conducted by a
17	community reparative board, pursuant to chapter 12 of this title. The court
18	may direct a reparative board to assist in determining restitution to the victim,
19	as provided by subdivision (6) of this subsection.

- (16) Submit to periodic polygraph testing if the offender is being placed on probation for a sex offense that requires registration pursuant to 13 V.S.A. chapter 167, subchapter 3.
- (17) If the probation officer has reasonable grounds to believe the offender has violated a probation condition, permit a probation officer or designee to monitor or examine the offender's activities, communications, and use of any computer or other digital or electronic media, including cell phone, smartphone, digital camera, digital video camera, digital music player or recorder, digital video player or recorder, personal digital assistant, portable electronic storage device, gaming system, or any other contemporary device capable of the storage of digital electronic communication or data storage or access to the Internet or other computer or digital network.
- (18) Satisfy any other conditions reasonably related to his or her rehabilitation. Such conditions may include prohibiting the use of alcohol, prohibiting having contact with minors, prohibiting or limiting the use of a computer or other electronic devices, and permitting a probation officer access to all computers or other digital or electronic media, mail covers, subscription services, and credit card statements. The court shall not impose a condition prohibiting the offender from engaging in any legal behavior unless the condition is reasonably related to the offender's rehabilitation or necessary to reduce risk to public safety.

1	(c) <u>Certificate.</u> When an offender is placed on probation, he or she shall be
2	given a certificate explicitly setting forth the conditions upon which he or she
3	is being released.
4	(d) Review and recommendation for discharge.
5	(1) The Commissioner shall review the record of each probationer
6	serving a specified term during the month prior to the midpoint of that
7	probationer's specified term and may shall file a motion requesting the
8	sentencing court to dismiss the probationer from probation or deduct a portion
9	of the specified term from the period of probation if the offender:
10	(A) has successfully completed a program or has attained a goal or
11	goals specified by the conditions of probation not been found by the court to
12	have violated the conditions of probation in the six months prior to the review;
13	(B) is not serving a sentence for committing a crime specified in 13
14	V.S.A. chapter 19, subchapters 6 and 7, 13 V.S.A. chapter 72, subchapter 1, or
15	13 V.S.A. § 2602; and
16	(C) has completed any rehabilitative or risk reduction programs, the
17	duration of which are set and knowable at the outset of probation, and that are
18	required as a condition of probation.
19	The Commissioner may include in the motion a request that the court
20	deduct a portion of the specified term for each condition completed or goal
21	attained. Any motion under this section shall be made pursuant to a rule

1	adopted by the Commissioner under 3 V.S.A. chapter 25 that shall provide that
2	the decision to make or refrain from making a motion shall be made at the sole
3	discretion of the Commissioner and shall not be subject to appeal.
4	(2) If the probationer does not meet the criteria set forth in subdivision
5	(1) of this subsection, or if the court denies the Commissioner's motion to
6	discharge, the Commissioner shall file a motion requesting the sentencing
7	court to discharge the probation term once the probationer meets the criteria set
8	forth in subdivision (1) of this subsection.
9	(3) The prosecutor shall make a reasonable effort to notify any victim of
10	record of a motion filed to reduce a probationer's term pursuant to this
11	subsection. "Reasonable effort" means attempting to contact the victim by
12	first-class mail at the victim's last known address and by telephone at the
13	victim's last known phone number.
14	Sec. 4. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS; PROBATION MIDPOINT
15	REVIEW; REPORT
16	(a) Beginning on July 1, 2021, the Department of Corrections shall collect
17	the following data regarding the probation midpoint review process:
18	(1) the number of probation discharge or probation term reduction
19	motions filed by the Department;
20	(2) the number of probation terms that were reduced or terminated
21	pursuant to this Act; and

1	(3) the amount of time reduced from probation terms as a result of
2	probation term reduction motions granted by the court.
3	(b) On or before August 1, 2022 and August 1, 2023, the Department shall
4	report to the Joint Legislative Justice Oversight Committee with the data
5	collected pursuant to this section and any recommendations for further
6	legislative action to improve the probation midpoint review process.
7	Sec. 5 SENTENCING COMMISSION; PROBATION TERMS FOR
8	MISDEMEANORS
9	During the 2021 legislative interim, the Vermont Sentencing Commission
10	shall review 28 V.S.A. § 205 and the December 3, 2020 report of the Pew
11	Charitable Trusts, "States Can Shorten Probation and Protect Public Safety,"
12	and consider whether Vermont should limit the duration of probation terms for
13	misdemeanor offenses to two years. On or before October 1, 2021, the
14	Commission shall issue its recommendation pursuant to this section to the
15	Joint Legislative Justice Oversight Committee.
16	Sec. 6. EFFECTIVE DATE
17	This act shall take effect on July 1, 2021.
