4 Subject: Agriculture; agricultural fairs; food safety; apiaries; nurseries

5 Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make
6 multiple miscellaneous amendments to agricultural statutes. The bill would
7 establish criteria for the award of financial assistance to agricultural fairs and
8 field days. The bill would repeal the requirements for livestock brands. The
9 bill would amend multiple provisions related to the management of bees and
10 apiaries. The bill also would make multiple amendments to the requirements
11 for plant nurseries and plant pest detection.

12 An act relating to miscellaneous agricultural subjects

13 It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

14 * * * Agricultural Fairs * * *

15 Sec. 1. 6 V.S.A. chapter 219 is added to read:

16 CHAPTER 219. AGRICULTURAL FAIRS AND FIELD DAYS

17 § 5151. PURPOSE

18 It is the purpose of this chapter to recognize the importance of agricultural
19 fairs and field days to the State's farmers, food producers, rural communities,

1 and economy. It is State policy that agricultural fairs and field days benefit the
2 State and its citizens and that their continued successful operations should be
3 supported in every region of the State.

4 § 5152. DEFINITIONS

5 As used in this chapter:

6 (1) “Agricultural fair” or “field days” means an exhibition held at least
7 annually by an agricultural fair association that offers premiums for
8 competitive exhibits in at least five different categories.

9 (2) “Agricultural fair association” means an organization or association
10 incorporated under State law that is governed by an elected board of directors
11 that operate fairs and agricultural shows that promote or exhibit the work of
12 farmers and others who produce, process, market, or distribute farm and food
13 products, including livestock, poultry, fish, fruits, vegetables, fiber,
14 horticultural products, maple products, honey, Christmas trees, or other
15 agricultural products.

16 (3) “Competitive exhibit” means an open competition designed to
17 demonstrate the quality, improvements, or benefits of grains, fruits, vegetables,
18 cultivated flowers, livestock, poultry, fish, bees, maple products, honey, dairy
19 products, agricultural practices, or other agricultural crops or products. To
20 qualify as a competitive exhibit, there must be at least three entries per
21 category.

1 (4) “General operation” means the goods and services utilized to operate
2 a fair in the ordinary course of business that generate ordinary expenses,
3 excluding plant improvements.

4 (5) “Plant improvement” means an improvement of fixtures, machinery,
5 apparatus, equipment, display facilities, buildings, or other infrastructure used
6 for a fair.

7 (6) “Secretary” means the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets.

8 § 5153. APPLICATION OF CHAPTER

9 This chapter shall apply to the Secretary’s distribution of grants to
10 agricultural fair associations whenever funds are appropriated to the Agency of
11 Agriculture, Food and Markets for State fair or field days organizations
12 without distinct requirements that otherwise dictate how to allocate the funds.

13 § 5154. STATE AGRICULTURAL FAIRS AND FIELD DAYS GRANT
14 PROGRAM; ELIGIBILITY

15 (a) A grant program is established within the Agency of Agriculture, Food
16 and Markets to provide financial assistance from funds appropriated for this
17 purpose to eligible agricultural fair associations to support their agricultural
18 fairs or field days.

19 (b) An agricultural fair association shall be eligible to apply for grant funds
20 under this section if it meets all of the following:

1 (1) It operates an agricultural fair or field days that is open a minimum
2 of three consecutive eight-hour days each year or it operates a fair that
3 received grant funding through the previous State stipend fund for agricultural
4 fairs.

5 (2) It timely applies for a grant, submits a complete application, and
6 provides all requested information.

7 (3) It is in good standing with the Agency of Agriculture, Food and
8 Markets.

9 (4) It fully intends to continue operating an agricultural fair or field
10 days that is open a minimum of three consecutive eight-hour days during both
11 the current and next calendar year.

12 (c) The Secretary shall create an application form that agricultural fair
13 associations must utilize when applying for assistance. Agency of
14 Administration Bulletin 5.0 shall apply to all awarded grants, and applicants
15 shall certify that all information they provide is truthful and accurate to the
16 best of their knowledge, information, and belief.

17 (d) The Secretary shall have the discretion to solicit relevant information,
18 establish and enforce an application deadline, and establish a reasonable time
19 frame to distribute grant funds to eligible and qualified applicants. The
20 Secretary may require each applicant to:

1 (1) explain the basis for each request with an informative narrative and
2 pertinent financial data;

3 (2) explain how any awarded grant funds will be used, including
4 whether the funds will support general operations or plant improvement;

5 (3) provide accurate attendance numbers, the amount spent on
6 premiums for competitive exhibits, the amount spent on general operations,
7 and the amount spent on plant improvements for one or more of the most
8 recent fairs or field days;

9 (4) indicate how the requested grant will support continued operations
10 and promote agriculture in the State;

11 (5) explain how recently awarded program grants supported the
12 purposes of this chapter; and

13 (6) explain its goals for the next five years, how it plans to achieve the
14 goals, and the role of the requested grant funds in meeting its objectives.

15 (e) The Secretary shall have the discretion to issue grant awards to eligible
16 agricultural fair associations after the application deadline expires and the
17 Secretary evaluates all timely applications. The Secretary shall equitably
18 distribute the appropriated funds to qualified applicants and strive to support
19 fairs and field days in all areas of the State. When equitably distributing
20 available funds, the Secretary shall consider the following factors:

21 (1) the importance of the requested grant to the applicant;

1 (2) how the grant will help farmers, food producers, and promote
2 agriculture;

3 (3) how the grant will support the local community;

4 (4) each applicant's attendance numbers, the amount it spent on
5 premiums for competitive exhibits, the amount it spent on general operations,
6 and the amount it spent on plant improvements;

7 (5) each applicant's past success in productively utilizing grant funds;

8 (6) each applicant's plans to facilitate the purposes of this chapter; and

9 (7) the relative needs of all applicants and how the distribution of
10 available funds may best meet the purposes of the program.

11 (f)(1) The Secretary shall equitably distribute appropriated funds to eligible
12 qualified applicants. The Secretary shall determine each applicant's
13 percentage of total fair and field days activity through a formula that equally
14 measures each applicant's respective percentage of the total applicant:

15 (A) attendance;

16 (B) premium expenditures;

17 (C) general operations expenditures; and

18 (D) plant improvement expenditures for the most recent calendar
19 year.

20 (2) Generally, the Secretary shall award proportionate shares of
21 available grant funds based on each applicant's combined percentage of total

1 applicant activity. No applicant shall receive more than 10 percent of the total
2 appropriated funds unless fewer than 10 fair associations apply. In the
3 Secretary's sole discretion, the Secretary may consider the additional
4 enumerated factors in this section and use an alternate method to equitably
5 distribute available funds.

6 Sec. 2. TRANSITION; CONTINUED ELIGIBILITY

7 Notwithstanding the eligibility requirements of 6 V.S.A. § 5154, an
8 agricultural fair association that received financial assistance awards under the
9 Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets' previous State stipend shall be
10 eligible for a grant under 6 V.S.A. chapter 219.

13 (d) The annual fee for a license for a retail vendor is \$15.00 for vendors
14 without meat ~~cutting~~ processing operations, \$50.00 for vendors with meat
15 ~~cutting~~ processing space of less than 300 square feet or meat display space of
16 less than 20 linear feet, and \$100.00 for vendors with 300 or more square feet
17 of meat ~~cutting~~ processing space ~~and~~ or 20 or more linear feet of meat display

8 (b) No person shall operate a commercial weighing and measuring device
9 without first obtaining a license from the Secretary. Any person operating
10 commercial weighing and measuring devices at more than one location, or in
11 more than one motor vehicle, shall obtain a separate license for each location
12 or vehicle.

14 (e) The Secretary shall not issue a weighing and measuring device license
15 unless:

16 (1) the device to be operated has been inspected and approved by the
17 Agency of Agriculture, Food and Market's consumer assurance section within
18 12 months of the date of application or within a longer period as the Agency
19 determines appropriate for the specific device at issue, provided that the period
20 shall not extend more than 24 months from the date of application; and

Sec. 6. 6 V.S.A. § 3023 is amended to read:

§ 3023. REGISTRATION; REPORT

(a) Registration. A person who is the owner of any bees, apiary, colony, or hive in the State shall register with the Secretary in writing on a form provided by the Secretary.

(b) Report. Annually the owner of any bees, apiary, colony, or hive registered under subsection (a) of this section shall submit a report to the Secretary that includes all of the following information:

(1) The location of all apiaries and number of colonies that the person owns. The location of an apiary shall become its registered location, provided that the apiary is located in accordance with the requirements of section 3034 of this title.

~~(2) Whether the location of any apiary will change within two weeks of the date that the report is submitted unless the change of location is to provide pollination services and the colonies will be returned to a registered apiary.~~

1 Hives from a registered apiary may be moved to another registered apiary
2 without reregistering.

3 (3) Whether a disease was discovered within any hive or colony in a
4 registered apiary.

5 (4)(3) Whether the owner transported into the State any colonies or used
6 equipment, except as authorized under subsection 3032(c) of this title.

7 (5)(4) Whether the owner is engaged in the rearing of queen bees or any
8 other bees for sale.

9 (6)(5) A current varroa mite and pest mitigation plan for each registered
10 apiary.

11 (c) Notification of Secretary. The owner of any bees, apiary, colony, or
12 hive registered under subsection (a) of this section shall notify the Secretary as
13 soon as practicable of the detection within an apiary or hive of American
14 foulbrood disease or other disease designated by the Secretary.

16 § 3024. APIARY INSPECTION; OWNERS TO CONTROL OR

17 ERADICATE BEE DISEASES

18 The Secretary, or his or her ~~or~~ the Secretary's inspectors, may examine all
19 apiaries as necessary and ascertain whether any disease ~~which~~ that is injurious
20 to bees is present. If any such disease is found, the Secretary shall give the
21 owners or caretakers of the diseased apiaries written orders to treat, destroy, or

1 otherwise handle the colonies in order to prevent the spread or dissemination
2 of the disease.

3 Sec. 8. 6 V.S.A. § 3025 is amended to read:

4 § 3025. SECOND INSPECTION OF DISEASED COLONIES;

5 DESTRUCTION

6 The Secretary or ~~his or her~~ the Secretary's inspectors shall inspect all
7 diseased apiaries a second time ~~no~~ not less than 10 days after the first
8 inspection. If the existence of disease within the apiary has been confirmed by
9 a laboratory approved by the Secretary, the inspector may destroy any colonies
10 of bees if ~~he or she~~ the inspector finds them not cured of such disease, or not
11 treated or handled according to ~~his or her~~ the inspector's instructions, together
12 with honey combs, hives, or other equipment, without recompense to the

19 The owner of any apiary in which a disease exists shall not knowingly sell,
20 barter, give away, or move any diseased bees, colonies, honey, hives, combs,
21 or equipment ~~unless he or she has~~ without the written consent of the Secretary;

1 such person shall not in any way expose other bees to the danger of the
2 disease.

3 Sec. 10. 6 V.S.A. § 3027 is amended to read:

4 § 3027. ABANDONED APIARIES AND EQUIPMENT

5 Any diseased hive or hives found by the Secretary or ~~his or her~~ the
6 Secretary's inspector in an abandoned apiary shall be destroyed. Any
7 abandoned diseased beekeeping equipment may be destroyed.

9 § 3028. TRAFFIC IN BEES; INSPECTION; CERTIFICATION

10 A person engaged in the rearing of bees for sale shall have ~~his or her~~ the
11 person's apiary inspected by the Secretary within 45 days prior to any sale at
12 ~~least once each summer season~~ and, if any disease is found ~~which~~ that is
13 injurious to bees, shall at once cease to ship bees from such diseased apiary

2 constructed with removable frames, the Secretary or ~~his or her~~ the Secretary's
3 inspector may:

4 (1) order the owner to immediately transfer the bees to a hive with

1 (a) Only sound, healthy nursery stock that will maintain its vigor shall be
2 offered for sale. Offering for sale stock that is diseased or infested with
3 injurious pests is a violation of this chapter. Whenever the Secretary has
4 reason to believe that any nursery, nursery grower, or nursery dealer in the
5 State has produced, introduced, installed, sold, or offered for sale diseased or
6 infested nursery stock, the Secretary shall inspect that nursery. If, upon
7 inspection, the Secretary finds any diseased or infested stock, ~~he or she~~ the
8 Secretary may order the plants, either individually or in blocks, to be:

- 9 (1) put on stop-sale;
10 (2) treated in a particular manner; or
11 (3) destroyed according to the Secretary's instructions.

12 (b) Plants ordered destroyed or placed on stop-sale must be clearly
13 separable from noninfested stock. Any order ~~must be confirmed to destroy or~~
14 place plants on stop-sale may be made verbally and shall be issued in writing
15 within seven days or as soon as practicable. The ~~writing~~ written order shall
16 include the reason for action, a description of the nursery stock affected, ~~and~~
17 instructions to separate and tag all nursery stock subject to the order, any

20 written permission of the Secretary or upon suitable disposal of the infested
21 plants as determined by the Secretary.

4 grounds and designate the plants affected.

8 The Secretary may issue ~~cease and desist~~ appropriate orders and institute
