6	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to extend the
7	time for the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to complete its work by 10
8	months; to establish a panel with authority to fill vacancies on the Commission
9	and to remove or reprimand commissioners for cause; to create certain
10	exemptions from the Open Meeting Law for meetings of the Commission and
11	to permit commissioners to confer with each other; and to create a duty of
12	confidentiality for participants in affinity groups organized by the
13	Commission.

15	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

5	include members of the populations and communities identified pursuant to
6	subdivisions 902(b)(1)(A) (D) of this chapter and who are diverse with respect
7	to socioeconomic status, work, education, geographic location, gender, and
8	sexual identity.
9	(3) Individuals selected pursuant to subdivision (1) of this subsection
10	who are not employees of the State of Vermont and who are not otherwise
11	compensated or reimbursed for their attendance shall be entitled to per diem
12	compensation and reimbursement of expenses pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 1010
13	for not more than two meetings. These payments shall be made from amounts
14	appropriated to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
15	(b)(1) The Selection Panel shall select and appoint the commissioners of
16	the Truth and Reconciliation Commission as provided pursuant to section 905
17	of this chapter.
18	(2) To enable it to carry out its duty to select and appoint the
19	commissioners of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission as provided
20	pursuant to section 905 of this chapter, the Panel may:

1	(A) adopt procedures as necessary to carry out the duties set forth in
2	section 905 of this chapter; and
3	(B) establish and maintain a principal office;
4	(C) meet and hold hearings at any place in this State; and
5	(D) hire temporary staff to provide administrative assistance during
6	the period from September 1, 2022 through January 15, 2023, provided that if
7	the Panel extends the time to select commissioners pursuant to subdivision
8	905(c)(1) of this chapter, it may retain staff to provide administrative
9	assistance through March 31, 2023.
10	(c) The term of each member of the Panel shall begin on the date of
11	appointment and end on January 15, 2023, except if the Panel extends the time
12	to select commissioners pursuant to subdivision 905(c)(1) of this chapter, the
13	term of the Panel members shall end on March 31, 2023 May 1, 2027.
14	(d) The Panel shall select a chair and a vice chair from among its members
15	(e)(1) Meetings shall be held at the call of the Chair or at the request of
16	four or more members of the Panel.
17	(2) A majority of the current membership of the Panel shall constitute a
18	quorum, and actions of the Panel may be authorized by a majority of the
19	members present and voting at a meeting of the Panel.
20	(f) Members of the Panel who are not otherwise compensated by the State
21	shall be entitled to per diem compensation and reimbursement of expenses

1	pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 1010 for not more than 20 meetings during fiscal year
2	2023 meetings to carry out the Panel's duties pursuant to this section and
3	sections 905 and 905a of this chapter. These payments shall be made from
4	amounts appropriated to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission.
5	(g) The Panel shall have the administrative and legal assistance of the Truth
6	and Reconciliation Commission.
7	(h)(1) A member of the Panel that is not serving ex officio may be removed
8	by the appropriate appointing authority for incompetence, failure to discharge
9	the member's duties, malfeasance, or illegal acts.
10	(2) A vacancy occurring on the Panel shall be filled by the appropriate
11	appointing authority for the remainder of the term.

6	the commissioner's duties, malfeasance, illegal acts, or other actions that the
7	Panel determines would substantially and materially harm the credibility of the
8	Truth and Reconciliation Commission or its ability to carry out its work
9	pursuant to the provisions of this chapter. Notwithstanding subdivision
10	904(e)(2) of this chapter, the reprimand or removal of a commissioner shall
11	only be authorized by a vote of the majority of the members of the Panel.

- (a) On or before January October 15, 2024, the Commission shall submit to the Governor and General Assembly an interim report on the Commission's progress to date, the committees established pursuant to subdivision 906(a)(1) of this chapter and the scope and objectives of their work, emerging themes and issues that the Commission has identified, and, if available, any preliminary findings and recommendations for legislative or other action that the Commission believes should be prioritized to address instances of institutional, structural, and systemic discrimination identified by the Commission.

9	Commission that is livestreamed and video recorded but that is otherwise
10	closed for purposes of physical or digital access and participation of the public.
11	(2) Upon a finding by the Commission that there are material threats to
12	the health or safety of the Commission, its staff, witnesses, or invitees, the
13	Commission may hold a closed meeting. The Commission may allow its staff,
14	counsel, and any persons who are subjects of the discussion or whose
15	information is needed to access the closed meeting.
16	(3) The Commission shall include in the agenda for a closed meeting
17	information that allows the public to directly access a livestream of the
18	meeting. The video recording of any closed meeting shall be posted and made
19	available for inspection or copying under the Public Records Act. The
20	Commission shall not be required to livestream or video record any portions of
21	a closed meeting that are held in executive session pursuant to 1 V.S.A. § 313.

1	(d) Notwithstanding any provision of chapter 5, subchapter 2 of this title,
2	the deliberations of a quorum or more of the members of the Commission shall
3	not be subject to the Vermont Open Meeting Law.

6	(a) The meetings and sessions of affinity groups established pursuant to
7	subdivision 906(b)(13) of this chapter shall be confidential and privileged.
8	Commission staff and participants in an affinity group session shall be subject
9	to a duty of confidentiality and shall keep confidential any information gained
10	during an affinity group session.
11	(b) A person who attended an affinity group session may bring a private
12	action in Civil Division of the Superior Court for damages resulting from a
13	breach of the duty of confidentiality covering affinity group sessions.
14	(c) This section shall not be construed to limit or otherwise affect the
15	application of the common law duty of confidentiality to affinity group
16	sessions and any action that may be brought based on a breach of that duty.
