An act relating to miscellaneous subjects related to the Public Utility
Commission

It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

Sec. 1. 30 V.S.A. § 248 is amended to read:

§ 248. NEW GAS AND ELECTRIC PURCHASES, INVESTMENTS, AND
FACILITIES; CERTIFICATE OF PUBLIC GOOD

(a)(1) No company, as defined in section 201 of this title, may:

* * *

(4)(A) With respect to a facility located in the State, in response to a
request from one or more members of the public or a party, the Public Utility
Commission shall hold a nonevidentiary public hearing on a petition for such
finding and certificate. The public hearing shall either be remotely accessible
or held in at least one county in which any portion of the construction of the
facility is proposed to be located, or both. The Commission in its discretion
may hold a nonevidentiary public hearing in the absence of any request from a
member of the public or a party. From the comments made at a public hearing,
the Commission shall derive areas of inquiry that are relevant to the findings to
be made under this section and shall address each such area in its decision.
Prior to making findings, if the record does not contain evidence on such an
area, the Commission shall direct the parties to provide evidence on the area.

1 This subdivision does not require the Commission to respond to each
2 individual comment.

4 (i)(1) No company, as defined in sections 201 and 203 of this title, without
5 approval by the Commission, after giving notice of such investment, or filing a
6 copy of that contract, with the Commission and the Department at least 30
7 days prior to the proposed effective date of that contract or investment:

8 (A) may invest in a gas-production facility located outside this State;
9 or

10 (B) may execute a contract for the purchase of gas from outside the
11 State, for resale to firm-tariff customers, that:

12 (i) is for a period exceeding five years; or

13 (ii) represents more than 10 percent of that company's peak
14 demand for resale to firm-tariff customers.

15 (2) The Department and the Commission shall consider within 30 days
16 whether to investigate the proposed investment or contract.

17 (3) The Commission, upon its own motion, or upon the recommendation
18 of the Department, may determine to initiate an investigation. If the
19 Commission does not initiate an investigation within such 30-day period, the
20 contract or investment shall be deemed to be approved. If the Commission
21 determines to initiate an investigation, it shall give notice of that decision to

1 the company proposing the investment or contract, the Department, and such
2 other persons as the Commission determines are appropriate. The Commission
3 shall conclude its investigation within 120 days of issuance of its notice of
4 investigation, or within such shorter period as it deems appropriate, unless the
5 company consents to waive the 120-day requirement. ~~If~~ Except when the
6 company consents to waive the 120-day requirement, if the Commission fails
7 to issue a decision within that 120-day period, the contract or investment shall
8 be deemed to be approved. The Commission may hold informal, public, or
9 evidentiary hearings on the proposed investment or contract.

11 (u) For an energy storage facility, a certificate under this section shall only
12 be required for a stationary facility exporting to the grid that has a capacity of
13 100 kW or greater, unless the Commission establishes a larger threshold by
14 rule. The Commission shall establish a simplified application process for
15 energy storage facilities subject to this section with a capacity of up to 1 MW,
16 unless it establishes a larger threshold by rule. For facilities eligible for this
17 simplified application process, a certificate of public good will be issued by the
18 Commission by the forty-sixth day following filing of a complete application,
19 unless a substantive objection is timely filed with the Commission or the
20 Commission itself raises an issue. The Commission may require facilities
21 eligible for the simplified application process to include a letter from the

1 interconnecting utility indicating the absence or resolution of interconnection
2 issues as part of the application.

16 FACT

17 (a)(1) The forms, pleadings, and rules of practice and procedure before the
18 Commission shall be prescribed by it.

19 (2) With regard to the general procedural rules codified in Commission
20 Rule 2.000, notwithstanding the rulemaking provisions of the Vermont
21 Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission is empowered to prescribe and

1 amend from time to time general rules with respect to pleadings, practice,
2 evidence, procedure, and forms for all Commission proceedings.

3 (3) The rules prescribed or amended shall not abridge, enlarge, or
4 modify any substantive rights of any person provided by law.

5 (4) The rules, when initially prescribed or any amendments to them,
6 including any repeal, modification, or addition, shall take effect on the date
7 provided by the Commission in its order of promulgation unless objected to by
8 the Legislative Committee on Judicial Rules as provided in 12 V.S.A. chapter

6 (a) Established. The Legislative Working Group on Renewable Energy
7 Standard Reform is created to draft legislation to be considered by the General
8 Assembly during the 2024 Legislative session.

9 (b) Membership.

10 (1) The Legislative Working Group on Renewable Energy Standard
11 Reform will be convened by two members from the House appointed by the
12 Speaker of the House and two members of the Senate appointed by the
13 Committee on Committees. One member from the House and one member
14 from the Senate shall be the co-chairs of the Work Group.

15 (2) The Working Group shall also be made up of one representative
16 from each of the following: Green Mountain Power, Burlington Electric
17 Department, Vermont Public Power Supply Authority, Washington Electric
18 Coop, Vermont Electric Coop, Vermont Public Interest Research Group,
19 Renewable Energy Vermont, Conservation Law Foundation, Vermont Electric
20 Power Company, Vermont Housing Finance Agency, Vermont Natural
21 Resources Council, GlobalFoundries, Associated Industries of Vermont, and

1 the Sierra Club. Stowe Electric and Hyde Park Electric may each name a
2 representative to the Working Group if they choose.

3 (c) Duties. In addition to submitting draft legislation, the Working Group
4 shall report on the following:

5 (1) whether any changes to Vermont's existing renewable energy
6 requirements, or other energy policies, are needed to increase grid stability,
7 resiliency, modernization, and reliability;

8 (2) identifying any barriers to moving to a 100 percent renewable
9 standard for all electrical utilities by 2030;

10 (3) recommending cost effective procurement policies to increase new
11 renewable energy, storage, and flexible load management to offset increasing
12 in-State load, improve grid stability and resiliency, and that consider integrated
13 resource planning electric load growth projections;

14 (4) whether increasing the requirement for out-of-state renewable
15 procurements within or delivered into the ISO-New England territory can
16 ensure affordable electric rates;

17 (5) evaluating the impact legislative recommendations may have on Tier
18 III implementation;

19 (6) evaluating the impact recommended legislative changes to
20 procurement programs will have on Vermont jobs and the Vermont economy;

1 (7) how current programs impact environmental justice focus
2 populations, households with low income, and households with moderate
3 income and how a revised Renewable Energy Standard can ensure that benefits
4 and burdens are distributed equitably; and

5 (8) how any changes to the Renewable Energy Standard will address the
6 inequity of distribution of benefits of renewables between different residential
7 properties.

8 (d) Assistance.

9 (1) The Working Group shall have legal assistance from the Office of
10 Legislative Council and administrative assistance from the Office of
11 Legislative Operations.

12 (2) On or before July 15, 2023, the Joint Fiscal Office may retain the
13 services of one or more independent third parties to provide facilitation and
14 mediation services to the Working Group, and data analysis recommendations
15 at the direction of the legislative members.

16 (3) The Department of Public Service shall be invited to advise the
17 Working Group on the results of its ongoing public process to review the
18 Renewable Energy Standard and any other items as needed.

19 (e) Compensation and reimbursement.

20 (1) For attendance at meetings during adjournment of the General
21 Assembly, a legislative member of the Working Group serving in the

1 legislator's capacity as a legislator shall be entitled to per diem compensation
2 and reimbursement of expenses pursuant to 2 V.S.A. § 23 for not more than
3 eight meetings.

4 (2) Other members of the Working Group who are not otherwise
5 compensated by their employer shall be entitled to per diem compensation and
6 reimbursement of expenses as permitted under 32 V.S.A. § 1010 for not more
7 than eight meetings.

8 (3) The payments under this subsection (e) shall be made from monies
9 appropriated by the General Assembly.

10 (f) Report. The Working Group shall submit draft legislation and a report
11 on its deliberations and findings to the House Committee on Environment and
12 Energy and Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Energy by December
13 1, 2023. Working Group members may submit minority opinions that shall be
14 included with the report containing the draft legislation.

15 (g) Appropriation. In fiscal year 2024, it is the intent of the General
16 Assembly to appropriate funds if available from the General Fund to the Joint
17 Fiscal Office to hire the consultants pursuant to this section.
