Whereas, for over a century, Rebecca Ballard made the Town of Georgia her home, first as a child growing up on her family's farm on Robert Newton Road, and later, as an adult, when she continued her family's farming tradition, marrying a neighboring farmer, and moving to his family's farm, which predates Vermont's statehood and is located on Ballard Road, and

<u>Whereas</u>, her education began in one-room schools in the Town of Georgia and continued at the University of Vermont from which she graduated, and

<u>Whereas</u>, she was constantly engaged in town, church, and family events, and was a faithful attendee at the Georgia Town Meeting, and

Whereas, ever the willing volunteer at her church, Rebecca Ballard served as a Sunday school teacher, fundraiser, and member of the congregation's board of deacons, and its Helping Hands Society, providing fresh flowers from her garden for church events, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in the broader community, Rebecca Ballard was a respected instructor in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Extension Service's Georgia Home Demonstration Club, and served on the Franklin County Extension Service Board and as a Georgia Public Library trustee, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as a talented sewer, knitter, quilter, and rug braider, Rebecca Ballard created blankets, hats, mittens, and rugs for her family and as donations to charitable organizations, and

<u>Whereas</u>, she regularly participated in the activities of the Vermont Retired Educators' Association and the Georgia Historical Society, and

Whereas, after a fulfilling life, Rebecca N. Ballard died at 101 years of age on April 1, 2022, and her survivors include her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

<u>Whereas</u>, an early involvement with the Girl Scouts resulted in her serving in Girl Scout leadership roles and engendered a love for the outdoors and hiking the Long Trail, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Anna Neville earned a bachelor's degree from Middlebury College, and during World War II she served in the WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service), and later graduated from Columbia University Teachers College with a master's degree in intercultural and international education, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as an admired social worker for the State of Vermont, she rose to a supervising role for Franklin, Grand Isle, and Lamoille Counties and always placed a child's needs first and the bureaucratic rules second, and

Whereas, she was a co-founder of what is now Northwestern Counseling and Support Services, coordinated numerous international student exchanges, actively engaged in the culture of her Scottish heritage, and served as a deacon of the First Congregational Church in St. Albans and as an inspiring director of the St. Albans Museum, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on June 2, 2022, Anna Neville died at 98 years of age on the farm on the Georgia Shore Road that has been her family's since 1926, and her survivors include her daughter, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren, now therefore be it

Whereas, Jim McNamara was a loving husband, father, and grandfather, a dedicated public servant, and an enthusiastic golfer, skier, and singer of sacred and secular music, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after serving in the U.S. Navy during World War II and graduating from the College of the Holy Cross and Cornell Law School, he worked as an assistant Burlington City Attorney, as a private practitioner with his father, and then with the law firm of McNamara, Fitzpatrick, and McCormick, and

Whereas, for more than 30 years he served as a Burlington Justice of the Peace, and in advance of the 1994 session, Governor Howard Dean appointed Jim McNamara to a vacant seat in the House of Representatives, where he served honorably until 2000 as a member of the Committee on Transportation, and

Whereas, in the 1970s, Governor Thomas Salmon nominated Jim McNamara to the District 4 Act 250 Environmental Commission, and, following Jim's legislative service, Governors Dean, Douglas, Shumlin, and Scott returned Jim McNamara to the Commission as an alternate, where his active participation as commissioner reflected his intelligence, reasonableness, thorough preparation, and engaging wit, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Jim McNamara died on November 27, 2022, leaving his children and grandchildren, his wife of 44 years, Ellie, having predeceased him in 2004, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, Tunbridge native Bob Murray first demonstrated his athletic prowess as a catcher on the South Royalton High School baseball team, and he served in the U.S. Army as a high-speed radio operator stationed in Okinawa, and

<u>Whereas</u>, upon his return to Vermont, Bob Murray married Barbara Mobus, who became his life's loving partner for 64 years, and he graduated from Lyndon State College, where he, not surprisingly, captained the baseball team, and

<u>Whereas</u>, for two years he taught math at the Tunbridge Elementary School; transitioned to the Newton School in South Strafford, where he began a 28-year career as its teaching principal and where his wife served as school secretary; and, after retiring from the Newton School, he worked for a decade at the Thetford Academy Learning Center, and

Whereas, during Bob Murray's 55 years residing in Strafford, he was truly a pillar of the community, serving as lifetime volunteer firefighter, an active cemetery association volunteer, and as a volunteer on many civic projects, and regularly coaching his children's sports teams, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in recognition of his community contributions, the town named its recreation field in his honor, and he was designated a Lions Club Citizen of the Year, and

Whereas, on December 17, 2022, Bob Murray died at 87 years of age, and his survivors include his wife, children, and grandchildren, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

#### H.C.R. 21.

House concurrent resolution honoring the organizations and individuals working to resolve Vermont's rural broadband access crisis

Offered by: All Members of the House

<u>Whereas</u>, the State of Vermont is committed to solving the rural broadband access crisis, and to achieve this goal, the General Assembly has enacted 2015 Acts and Resolves No. 41, recognizing multi-municipality Communications Union Districts (CUDs,) for broadband implementation and management;

2019 Acts and Resolves No. 79, providing new State funding, a Department of Public Service (DPS) position, and the establishment of the Broadband Innovation Grant Program at DPS; and 2021 Acts and Resolves No. 71, creating the Vermont Community Broadband Board (VCBB) to oversee and manage the newly established Vermont Community Broadband Fund, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the CUDs have organized the Vermont Communications Union Districts Association (VCUDA) to assist the CUDS and represent their interests before the General Assembly and other organizations, and

Whereas, since 2007, Vermont's first CUD, ECFiber, under its operator, ValleyNet, has pioneered the development, with public and private funding, including the bonding of universal broadband access in its jurisdiction, and serving over 7,500 customers via a nearly 1,700-mile network encompassing 31 towns, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2023, the 10 CUDs—Chittenden County CUD, CVFiber, DVFiber, ECFiber, Lamoille FiberNet, Maple Broadband, Northwest FiberworX, NEK Broadband, Otter Creek CUD, and Southern Vermont CUD—are currently providing or developing broadband service for customers in over 200 municipalities, facilitating access to educational, economic development, healthcare, and governmental services, as well as family entertainment, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly recognizes the central importance of CUDs to the establishment of statewide universal high-speed broadband access and congratulates the CUDs, the VCUDA, and the VCBB in this essential endeavor, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Secretary of State be directed to send a copy of this resolution to each of the CUDs, the VCUDA, and the VCBB.
