Whereas, Head Coach Alisa Kresge (the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference Division I Women's Basketball Coach of the Year), Associate

Head Coach Dominique Bryant, and assistant coaches Will Lanier and Nevena Markovic provided expert guidance to the team, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, following military service, he became chief pediatric therapist at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center, started as a physical therapy instructor at Columbia University in 1959, and in 1965, the Downstate Medical Center of the State University of New York appointed him chair of physical therapy, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1969, Sam Feitelberg established and then directed the physical therapy program at the University of Vermont, and from 1997 to 2011, he performed similar responsibilities at Clarkson University, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he held several senior leadership roles in the American Physical Therapy Association, and the organization repeatedly honored him, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Sam Feitelberg promoted cultural diversity and strove to create academic opportunities for students from marginalized backgrounds, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his innovative work with NASA benefited Parkinson's disease therapy, he was instrumental in Rotary International's establishment of a children's rehabilitation center in Honduras, and he played a key role in the construction of the Shelburne Veterans Memorial, and <u>Whereas</u>, Sam Feitelberg, a distinguished academic, caring community leader, and greatly admired human being died on March 16, 2023, at 93 years of age, and his survivors include Gail, his wife of nearly 70 years, and his children and grandchildren, now therefore be it

House concurrent resolution congratulating St. Peter Roman Catholic Church of Rutland on the 150th anniversary of the construction of its home

Offered by: Representatives Howard of Rutland City, Andriano of Orwell, Burditt of West Rutland, Canfield of Fair Haven, Clifford of Rutland City, Harrison of Chittenden, Jerome of Brandon, Maguire of Rutland City, McCoy of Poultney, Nicoll of Ludlow, Notte of Rutland City, Peterson of Clarendon, Sammis of Castleton, and Shaw of Pittsford

Offered by: Senators Collamore and Williams

<u>Whereas</u>, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Burlington was founded in 1853, and St. Peter Parish in Rutland, established in 1855, is the mother parish of the Roman Catholic community in the Rutland area, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the original St. Peter Church was built in 1855 on the south end of Meadow Street in Rutland and had, by the late 1860s, become too small due to the growing Roman Catholic population in the region, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1869, the Rev. Charles Boylan, the pastor of St. Peter, enlisted the services of ecclesiastical architect Patrick C. Keely of Brooklyn, NY, who designed over 600 churches during his career, to create a plan for a new building to serve the Rutland parishioners, and

Whereas, that same year, ground was broken at the ledge lot on the corner of Meadow and Mechanic Streets, the stone was quarried from the site, and the parishioners, many of whom were employed in the nearby quarries, personally completed much of the work, and

Whereas, the construction process required four years, and Father Boylan implemented the architectural plan meticulously, and

Whereas, on Easter Sunday 1873, Father Boylan joyfully celebrated the first mass in the new St. Peter Church, and the formal consecration of the building occurred on Sunday, June 30, 1873, the date that year of the Feast of Saints Peter and Paul, and the Rt. Rev. Louis DeGosbriand, the first Bishop of the Diocese of Burlington, performed the rites of consecration, and

Whereas, Father Boylan died in December of 1886 and was buried next to the church he built and loved, and

Whereas, major renovation and restoration work occurred under the direction of Bishop Robert F. Joyce (1950s), Rev. Msgr. Thomas H. Connor (1970s), and Rev. Wilfred Andre Houle (2000s), and

Whereas, for 150 years, St. Peter Church in Rutland, which since 2006 has been a Capuchin Franciscan ministry, has continued to serve as a physical monument to the faith and dedication of generations of Rutland-area Roman Catholics, now therefore be it

That the General Assembly congratulates St. Peter Roman Catholic Church of Rutland on the 150th anniversary of the construction of its home, and be it further

## H.C.R. 125

House concurrent resolution recognizing May 2023 as Jewish American Heritage Month in Vermont

Offered by: Senator Kitchel

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1654, after their expulsion from Recife, Brazil, six Jewish families sailed to the Dutch community of New Amsterdam, where, after initial official resistance, they started the first North American Jewish community, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1790, President George Washington sent a letter to the Hebrew Congregation of Newport, Rhode Island, in which he famously wrote, "For happily the Government of the United States gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens," and

<u>Whereas</u>, Joshua Vita Montefiore was the first known Jew to settle in Vermont, arriving in 1835, and by the 1840s, a scattering of individual Jews and Jewish families lived in northern Vermont, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the first Jewish community in Vermont was established in Poultney in the 1870s, where it remained until it relocated to Rutland in 1906, and

<u>Whereas</u>, a more enduring Jewish community was established in Burlington in the 1880s, where, in 1885, it established Congregation Ohavi Zedek, the oldest Jewish congregation in the State, and <u>Whereas</u>, Jewish Americans in Vermont and throughout the nation, despite encountering numerous instances of discrimination, have played leading roles in many fields of endeavor, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2006, pursuant to a proclamation that President George W. Bush issued, Jewish American Heritage Month was established, and, in the wake of the sharply rising incidents of antisemitism in the United States which, according to the Anti-Defamation League, numbered in excess of 3,600 in 2022, the highest since the statistic was first monitored in 1979—an appreciation of the heritage and culture of Jewish Americans becomes especially timely, and

<u>Whereas</u>, President Joseph R. Biden has issued a 2023 proclamation in recognition of Jewish American Heritage Month, and various federal cultural institutions are commemorating this observance, now therefore be it

That the General Assembly recognizes May 2023 as Jewish American Heritage Month in Vermont, and be it further

House concurrent resolution in memory of clinical psychologist and social justice activist Dr. Ann Ellis Raynolds of Pomfret

<u>Whereas</u>, the extraordinary life journey of Dr. Ann Raynolds began with her birth in 1928, and she graduated from the Chapin School, the Westover School, Cornell University, and Goddard College, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1965, as a passionate advocate for social justice, she organized the Springfield Head Start Program; served as the co-director of the former Consumer Control Community Child Care Inc., which served Windham and Windsor Counties; and, based on these experiences, she decided to earn a doctorate in clinical psychology at the Massachusetts School of Professional Psychology (now known as William James College), and

Whereas, in Massachusetts, Ann Raynolds focused on bringing mental health services to the inner-city community of Boston, directing The Family

Project while coordinating with the Roxbury Comprehensive and Whittier Street Community Health Center, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Dr. Ann Raynolds subsequently assumed important roles in Boston as the clinical director of the former Boston City Hospital's Department of Child Psychiatry, in the Department of Child Psychiatry at Beth Israel Hospital (now the Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center), and as a lecturer at Boston University and at the Harvard University School of Medicine, and

<u>Whereas</u>, her deep commitment to civil rights, combined with her own work experiences, served her well as an advisor on the PBS civil rights documentary series *Eyes on the Prize* and as a volunteer with the Greater Boston Interfaith Project, and

Whereas, Dr. Ann Raynolds returned to Vermont, worked as a school psychologist, engaged in political advocacy, and saw private patients until shortly prior to her death at 94 years of age on February 28, 2023, and three of her children survive her, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly extends its sincere condolences to the family of Dr. Ann Ellis Raynolds, and be it further

## H.C.R. 127

House concurrent resolution recognizing May as Mental Health Awareness Month in Vermont

Offered by: All Members of the House

<u>Whereas</u>, one in five adults in the United States experiences mental illness each year, and 104,000 adults in Vermont live with a mental health condition, and

<u>Whereas</u>, according to the Vermont Department of Health, 142 Vermonters lost their lives to suicide in 2021, and the Vermont suicide rate of 20.3 percent was higher than the national suicide rate of 14 percent, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the police arrest one in four Americans with a serious mental illness at some point during the lifetime of those individuals, and, annually, over two million of these Americans are booked into jail, and

<u>Whereas</u>, nationally, two in five adults in jail or prison have a history of mental illness, and seven in ten youths in the juvenile justice system have a mental health condition, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in the United States, high school students with depression are more than twice as likely to drop out than are their peers, and

Whereas, 40.8 percent of Vermonters 12–17 years of age who have depression did not receive any care in the last year, and

Whereas, more than 1,000 persons in Vermont are homeless, and one in three of these persons lives with a serious mental illness, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the area where someone resides plays a significant role in that individual's overall health and well-being, and

<u>Whereas</u>, safe, stable, and healthy home conditions can establish the foundation for the achievement and maintenance of good mental health, and

Whereas, individuals with mental health conditions can lead full and productive lives, and

<u>Whereas</u>, every business, school, government agency, care provider, and Vermonter shares the burden of unmet mental health needs and has a responsibility to promote good mental health and wellness, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1949, Mental Health America (formerly known as the National Mental Health Association) designated May as Mental Health Awareness Month, and this occasion merits observance in Vermont, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly recognizes May as Mental Health Awareness Month in Vermont, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Secretary of State be directed to send a copy of this resolution to NAMI (the National Alliance for Mental Health) Vermont and to the Commissioner of Mental Health.
