House concurrent resolution congratulating Goodridge Lumber Inc. of Albany on its 50th anniversary

<u>Whereas</u>, Colleen Goodridge and her three sons, Doug, Mark, and Brian, are the proud owners of Goodridge Lumber, an anchor business in Albany, and their careful family management has made the company an important part of Vermont's forest product industry and economy, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the history of Goodridge Lumber coincides with the Goodridge family's history, starting in 1973, when the family's desire to build a log home led to the purchase of an old sawmill for \$500.00, and

<u>Whereas</u>, borrowing a neighboring farmer's tractor to pull trees from the woods, the Goodridges sold logs to pay for repairs to the saw, and they recognized a business opportunity, which continues to evolve, expand, and thrive, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Colleen Goodridge and her sons have deservedly earned a reputation for honesty, hard work, and a strong commitment to the success of the Vermont forest-based economy, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Goodridge Lumber epitomizes family teamwork, and there is a clear family succession plan in place: Colleen is the matriarch of not only the company but also of the Vermont forest industry; Doug, with his degree in civil engineering, oversees the sawing; Mark is responsible for planing and maintenance; Brian directs the lumber yard operation; and the grandchildren are responsible for cleaning and stacking the wood, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Goodridge Lumber utilizes naturally rot-and-disease resistant white cedar trees, a renewable natural resource harvested from within a 75-mile radius of the mill; and the company produces over one million board feet per year, primarily for home construction and fencing; but with each log's most profitable potential always the objective, and <u>Whereas</u>, as a former teacher, Colleen Goodridge places importance on educating future industry participants and the public, and she meets with students at the North Country Career Center, the company offers tours, and it has even helped publish a children's book on logging and sawmills, and

<u>Whereas</u>, she grew up in a difficult family environment, enmeshed in poverty and with a father who died of alcoholism, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Honoree Fleming far exceeded conventional expectations, receiving a doctorate in biophysics from the prestigious University of Chicago and becoming a cellular biology research associate at the Icahn School of Medicine in New York City, and

Whereas, in 1988, she accepted a biochemistry faculty position at Middlebury College, and she later taught at the former Trinity College in Burlington, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2002, Castleton State College appointed Honoree Fleming an associate dean, and, recognizing her special talent and superb pedagogic skills, subsequently named her the dean of education, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after retiring in 2012, Honoree Fleming resumed her scientific research, and, in 2023, she published a seminal cellular biology article in the journal *Advances in Bioscience and Biotechnology*, and

<u>Whereas</u>, her tragic death provoked enormous grief in the Castleton community, and over 150 persons attended a movingly emotional memorial service held on the school's campus at which her husband, Ron Powers, spoke of his late wife as "brilliant in science and brilliantly loving," and she is also survived by their son, now therefore be it

Whereas, Reuben Jackson's contributions to the annals of jazz were noteworthy, and

Whereas, Reuben Jackson was born in Georgia, spent his youth in the nation's capital, and, in 1975, arrived in Vermont to attend Goddard College, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in addition to studying writing at Goddard, Reuben Jackson inaugurated his broadcasting career working as a DJ at WGDR, the college's radio station, and discovering a love for the radio medium, and

Whereas, for two decades, Reuben Jackson was honored to work as the curator for the Duke Ellington Collection at the Smithsonian Institution, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his erudite jazz criticism appeared on the airwaves of *National Public Radio*; in the pages of the *Washington Post, JazzTimes*, and *DownBeat*; and on the All About Jazz website, and

<u>Whereas</u>, years later, Reuben Jackson returned to Vermont to teach English at Burlington High School, and, in 2012, he was reunited with his passion for radio, hosting Vermont Public (the former Vermont Public Radio)'s *Friday Night Jazz* program for six years (2012–2018), and recordings from the series are now in the collection of the American Archive of Public Broadcasting, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Reuben Jackson's mentoring at the Young Writers Project reflected both his deep passion for the written word and his life as a respected published poet, and

Whereas, much of his poetry focused on the challenges of the Black American experience, and his most recent volume, *Scattered Clouds*, was issued in 2019, and

<u>Whereas</u>, most recently, Reuben Jackson, who died on February 16, 2024 at 67 years of age and is survived by his partner, Jenae Michelle, had worked as a jazz archivist at the University of the District of Columbia and served as a radio host at WPFW-FM in Washington, DC, now therefore be it

<u>Whereas</u>, nationally, from 1999 to 2001, Kristi Huizenga merited U.S. National Team player pool membership, earned placement on the 2000 U-16 National Team roster, and she played in the 2002 U-17 championship, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as a University of Connecticut Husky, Kristi Huizenga's teams won two Big East titles, participated in four NCAA postseason tournaments, including the exciting 2003 championship contest, and, in 2005, she was named an All-New England player, and

<u>Whereas</u>, her University of Connecticut graduation hardly ended competitive soccer's presence in Kristi Huizenga's life, as she transitioned from playing to coaching the next generation of aspiring female players, and

<u>Whereas</u>, since 2010, Kristi Huizenga has imparted her wealth of experience to the University of Vermont Catamount women's soccer team in her role as head coach, and, in 2021, the squad was selected to play at the NCAA tournament, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in recognition of her outstanding soccer achievements and their strong Vermont connection, the Vermont Sports Hall of Fame has selected Kristi Huizenga as a 2024 inductee, now therefore be it

House concurrent resolution recognizing March as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month in Vermont

Offered by: Representative McCann of Montpelier

<u>Whereas</u>, colorectal cancer results from "a growth of cells that forms in the lower end of the digestive tract [, and] [m]ost of these cancers start as noncancerous growths called polyps," and their removal can prevent the development of cancer, and

<u>Whereas</u>, screening, as a prerequisite for possible removal of polyps, is recommended for persons who are at least 45 years of age, but one in three persons in the 50-to-75-year age range are not screened for colorectal cancer, and

<u>Whereas</u>, colorectal cancer is the second most common cause of cancer death in the United States, and the American Cancer Society estimated that, in 2023, colorectal cancer would be detected in 153,020 persons, and 52,550 deaths would be recorded, 3,750 of which would be individuals under 50 years of age, and

<u>Whereas</u>, medical experts project that by 2030, colorectal cancer will be the most frequent cause of death due to cancer among persons under 50 years of age, and

Whereas, the American Cancer Society has documented that Black Americans are approximately 20 percent more likely to be diagnosed with colorectal cancer and 40 percent more likely to die after being positively diagnosed; and that for male Hispanic Americans, colorectal cancer causes roughly 11 percent of cancer deaths; and for female Hispanic Americans the comparable figure is nine percent, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the American Cancer Society, through the National Colorectal Cancer Roundtable Campaign, is engaged in an important effort to raise the national colorectal cancer screening rates to 80 percent, an increase, that, if successful, could reduce the prevalence of colorectal cancer in this country, and <u>Whereas</u>, there is an urgency to educate Vermonters concerning the threat of colorectal cancer, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly recognizes March as Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month in Vermont, and be it further

<u>Whereas</u>, Pasqualena Delores Valente was born in Rutland on March 13, 1924, weighing a mere 2.5 pounds, but despite being told his new granddaughter was dead, her grandfather Bizzarro picked her up, felt her breath, and the family lore holds that a grandfather's love saved her life, and

Whereas, while a student at Mount St. Joseph Academy, from which she graduated in 1942, Pasqualena Valente met Quincy M. Baker Jr. at Fishman's soda fountain, and they began dating when she was in eleventh grade, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Quincy joined the U.S. Army Air Force shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack, and, after graduating from MJS, Pasqualena Valente worked locally, became a nurse's aide, and, at the Bardwell Hotel, she and her sister, Lucy, served refreshments to soldiers on home leave, and

<u>Whereas</u>, shortly before Quincy Baker was deployed to the South Pacific, the two were engaged, and they married on December 30, 1944, honeymooning in New York City and reveling in the New Year's Eve festivities in Times Square, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after living out of state, the couple returned home to Rutland, where Lena Baker, as she became known, worked as a Welcome Wagon hostess, and, later, at the former Central Vermont Public Service Corporation (CVPS), staffing the trouble desk during severe storms, and she was recognized with several awards for her faithful service, and

Whereas, after retiring from CVPS, Lena Baker worked for the Tapestry Program, an afterschool day care, where she loved associating with the children, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the marriage of Lena and Quincy Baker endured for 71 years, until his death in 2016, and he worked for the U.S. Post Office, was a talented drummer and trumpeter who played in the 40th Army Band of Vermont, and was elected a Rutland City Alderman, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Lena Baker wrote a cookbook relating her life's history and detailing the numerous Italian recipes she enjoyed cooking for her family of five children, 10 grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren, now therefore be it
