<u>2023</u>

- Legislature authorizes one additional license type and a quality control laboratory
- Product registration and inventory tracking phases of licensing portal built
- Rules amended
- 550 cannabis establishment licenses and 863 employee ID cards issued
- Over 1,000 site visits conducted
- 3,808 unique products registered

- Medical cannabis program database contract extension (\$55,120)
- Fee for spaces (\$43,800)
 - Rent and utilities for larger office space to accommodate full team
 - Cannabis Quality Control Laboratory lease
- Additional cost of lab equipment (\$125,000)
- Phase II of licensing system development (\$250,000)
 - Enhancements to existing software to include complaint, investigation, and enforcement action tracking and appeals docketing
 - Medical cannabis program built-out
 - Development of public-facing licensing and product registration database

- Effective in FY24, 7 V.S.A. § 845 provides that the portion of the excise tax not allocated to prevention programming will first flow to the Cannabis Regulation Fund to cover the cost of administering the adult-use and medical cannabis programs. The remaining revenue is transferred to the General Fund.
- Total fees collected so far is approximately \$3.75M, which reflects just under 2 years of revenue collected from license fees and administrative penalties. This amount is close to our fee revenue projections for FY25, and reflects the strong market participation we've experienced so far.
- The total excise tax revenue the state collected in the first year of the cannabis market opening was \$13.9M, right in line with the CCB's initial projections.
