- **Cybersecurity Advisory Council:** A council created by <u>Act 71</u> "to advise on the State's cybersecurity infrastructure, best practices, communications protocols, standards, training, and safeguards."
 - Composed of 11 members.¹
 - Three primary goals:
 - 1. To develop a strategic plan for protecting the State's public sector and private sector information and systems from cybersecurity attacks
 - 2. Evaluate statewide cybersecurity readiness
 - 3. Conduct an inventory and review of cybersecurity standards and protocols for critical sector infrastructures.
 - Exempt from public records requirements if disclosing information would jeopardize cybersecurity.
- Progress:
 - Initiating the Council was delayed due to the July 2023 flood event and the departure of key staff throughout the year. Staffing issues have now been resolved.
 - The council has met once already and will meet at least 2 more times before June 30, 2024
 - Goals before June 2024
 - Review and approve this report.

 - □ Develop and administer a statewide cybersecurity preparedness survey, then develop a FY2025 plan based on its results.

Definition of "Essential Supply Chain" according to 20 V.S.A. § 4661.

"Essential supply chain" means supply chains for the production, in sufficient quantities, of the following articles:

(A) medical supplies, medicines, and personal protective equipment;

(B) articles essential to the operation, manufacture, supply, service, or maintenance of critical infrastructure;

(C) articles critical to infrastructure construction after a natural or manmade disaster;

(D) articles that are critical to the State's food systems, including food supplies for individuals and households and livestock feed; and

(E) articles that are critical to the State's thermal systems and fuels.
