Vermont Clean Water Act (Act 64 of 2015) "All-in for Clean Water"

Reasonable assurances to meet nonpoint source targets:

- Water quality regulations
- Clean Water Board and Fund*
- Tracking, accounting, and reporting requirements
- *Requested a report with recommendations on long term sufficient funding source

2017 Office of the State Treasurer's Report on Clean Water

- Comprehensive stakeholder process
- Estimated total clean water funding need, existing funding sources, and gap (~\$62.4 million)
 - ~\$25.3 million/year funding gap for regulatory developed lands
- Provided recommendations on long term funding sources



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

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The 3-Acre Permit Obtainment Assistance Program has \$12.4 million of American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds to help 3-acre site owners manage their stormwater runoff.

Roughly 700 sites in Vermont are 3-acre sites that may need to do more to control stormwater runoff from their lands to support the Vermont Clean Water Act. Examples of how

Up to \$49,999 per site is now available for most 3-acre sites in the Lake Memphremagog,

3-acre sites have three or more impervious acres that have never had an operational stormwater permit or were permitted to standards in place prior to the 2002 Stormwater Management Manual.

Program Overview: Phase 1 design and permitting assistance

for all eligible three-acre sites

Structure: Beneficiary program

Amount: Up to \$49,999 split across two categories

- Up to \$30,000 for engineering expenses
- Up to \$19,999 for permit review fees

Timeline:

Strongly encouraged to apply before September 30, 2024

Must obtain permit before August 2026

After ARPA?

- Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund
- Coordination with Vermont's Congressional Delegation to find federal dollars to help meet these costs
- Clean Water Board budget recommendations out of the Capital Bill and Clean Water Fund to support Municipal Stormwater and Developed Lands Implementation Grants (Priority tiers are defined in 10 V.S.A. § 1389)

Tier 2 (Medium Priority)

Repair riparian conditions for flood resiliency

Education and outreach for Acceptable Management Practices (AMPs) for Maintaining Water Quality on Logging Jobs

Municipal Stormwater Implementation Grants

Innovative/alternative technologies or practices

Purchase agricultural land

Tier 3 (Low Priority)

Developed Lands Implementation Grants



Key Takeaways

- Stormwater regulations out of Act 64 are a foundational piece of Vermont's reasonable assurances to the EPA that we will make adequate progress on the Lake Champlain TMDL
- Vermont has made long-term commitments to fund the Clean Water Initiative to support clean water priorities including offsetting the cost of compliance for regulated communities and landowners
- ARPA has presented a unique opportunity to ramp up progress towards stormwater improvements
- DEC is managing multiple funding initiatives to support regulated three-acre sites through design, permit authorization, and construction while targeting funds towards highest need and readiness.
