Dear Chair Sheldon,

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in front of the House Committee on Environment & Energy on Wednesday, February 22. Vermont's 14 Natural Resources Conservation Districts respectfully submit this memo as follow-up to questions we were asked in your Committee regarding our FY24 Budget Request. As your Committee works on its budget memo to the House Appropriations Committee, we hope you will support including the full request of a \$3,000,000 base appropriation to the Natural Resources Conservation Council's line item within the Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets' budget. This funding is critical for Vermont's Conservation Districts to carry out our statutory obligations of protecting natural resources in the state of Vermont.

Below is information to help answer questions that came up during our testimony. Please do not hesitate to reach out with any questions or requests for further information.

Subdivision of Government Status and Elected Leadership

Vermont's 14 Natural Resources Conservation Districts are subdivisions of state government that were established by landowners through the petitioning process laid out in the <u>Soil Conservation Act</u> as a response to the Dust Bowl in the 1930s. Conservation Districts operate under the authority of the Vermont Natural Resources Conservation Council (NRCC) which is a designated "agency of the state" under 10 V.S.A. § 703. NRCC was established "to provide for the conservation, development, and use of the natural resources of this State" in a way that "protects and promotes the health, safety, and general welfare of its people." Each District has a Board of Supervisors who are all local residents elected by the public to that position. There are over 3000 Conservation Districts in the United States, and we have a historical partnership with the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service.

Conservations Districts' Role in Achieving State Natural Resources Conservation Goals

Conservation District staff members are non-regulatory government employees who live in the communities they serve. Our uniqueness lies in the neighbor-to-neighbor relationships we have with the landowners, land users and community members we provide services to. We are often the liaison that works directly with land stewards to identify and apply to the programs and grants that best meet their needs to implement conservation practices on their land. These programs and grants are often administered by the Agency of Agriculture, Food, & Markets, the Agency of Natural Resources, UVM Extension, the Vermont Housing & Conservation Board, and others; Conservation Districts act as local outreach and implementers. Below are just a few examples of this work:

- Pay for Performance Program Conservation Districts have a contract with VAAFM to implement the new Pay for Performance program at the local level, which is a natural continuation of our role of connecting the farmers in our communities to opportunities to reduce phosphorus.
- Stormwater Many of Vermont's Conservation Districts are stormwater project implementers. We use Stormwater Master Plans and our relationships with municipalities to help advance water quality initiatives in stormwater. Many Conservation Districts hold community forums to gather public input on town stormwater projects.

- Vermont Agricultural Water Quality Partnership the Vermont Association of Conservation Districts and all 14 Natural Resources Conservation Districts are part of the Vermont Agricultural Water Quality Partnership, which is a formal partnership with an MOU signed between ourselves, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, USDA Farm Service Agency, US Fish & Wildlife Service, UVM Extension, Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation, Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets, the Vermont Housing & Conservation Board, and the Lake Champlain Basin Program. That partnership has a framework at the state level and local level to collaborate and coordinate efforts, and Conservation Districts hold that framework at the local level as regional coordinators.
- Community Engagement Vermont's Conservation Districts represent community members and landowners in
 advising government agencies in the development of natural resources programs and policies through Local Work
 Groups. For example, the White River Conservation District is currently facilitating farmer-led Work Groups to
 inform the policies being developed around Payment for Ecosystem Services. Other Districts hold community
 forums to gather public input on all types of natural resources concerns and projects.

Other Core Services of Vermont's Natural Resources Conservation Districts

Vermont's 14 Conservation Districts fill different niches in different parts of the state. Our uniqueness lies in our structural model - we exist everywhere in Vermont, regardless of community resources, providing continuity and access across all regions. We provide a wide range of services to communities and work directly with landowners to implement water quality and conservation projects on the ground. It is important to note that Conservation Districts are program implementers - we are the boots on the ground taking soil samples, transporting manure samples, planting trees, planning nutrient applications, finding new projects, etc. Some niches that we fill include:

- Technical Assistance & Program Navigation to the Agricultural Community We provide a wide range of services to farm businesses our focus is not entirely on business and financial planning which is often the sole focus of other service providers. When working with a farm or landowner, we are primarily focused on the sustainability of that land and the health of the local ecosystem. We sample soils, collect and transport manure samples, remind folks about regulatory requirements, and help with Nutrient Management Planning.
- Tree Plantings to Strengthen and Protect Riparian Corridors Many Conservation Districts conduct tree planting operations to protect riparian corridors within their Districts. Riparian corridors are critical habitats for preventing soil erosion and protecting against flooding, and the trees and shrubs planted will make the riverbeds in these three towns more resilient to adverse climate impacts.
- **Invasive Species** Multiple Districts are working with the USDA-NRCS developing local funding pools to initiate grants to landowners to eradicate invasive species on their properties.
- **Energy Conservation** In 2023, the Orange and Windsor County Local Working Group, chaired by the White River NRCD, launched a \$30,000 local fund pool to conduct farm energy audits, via the NRCS EQIP program. Next year this funding pool may expand to include energy improvement implementation funding.
- River, Floodplain, and Lakeshore Restoration Projects Conservation Districts implement a wide range of river, floodplain, and lakeshore restoration projects such as culvert replacements, bridge and dam removals, gully erosion mitigation, and lakeshore bioengineering. These projects are often coupled with woody buffer plantings.
- Stormwater Runoff Projects District stormwater projects range from small rain gardens and school-parking lots to road improvements and major downtown remediation projects. Caledonia County Conservation District designed and implemented a \$456,000 stormwater project on North Main Street in downtown Hardwick that treated 31 acres of stormwater drainage with 9.3 acres of impervious surface. The system included underground pre-treatment units and underground infiltration units to store and infiltrate stormwater prior to discharge to the Lamoille River.
- **Community Outreach and Engagement** Tactical Basin Planning workshops and outreach to assist DEC Tactical Basin Planners engage with the public as they develop watershed-wide water quality plans
- Regional Water Quality Conservation Districts work in their local watersheds to improve local water quality.
 Most Districts serve on Basin Water Quality Councils, often serving as either Chair or Vice Chair of these
 Councils. The Poultney Mettowee Natural Resources Conservation District serves in partnership with the Rutland
 Regional Planning Commission as that region's Clean Water Service Provider. 10 Conservation Districts provide
 Lake Wise evaluations that lead to Lake Wise certification.

Please see the table in Appendix A to see which Districts offer which conservation programs.

Governor Scott's FY24 Budget vs. Our Funding Request

Sec. B.225.2 of the Governor's recommended FY24 Budget includes a base appropriation of \$362,000 in state general funds to NRCC to be dispersed to Vermont's 14 Conservation Districts. This results in approximately \$20,000 per District with the remaining funds staying at NRCC for oversight and capacity building.

Background on State Funding for Vermont's Natural Resources Conservation Council

Prior to last year, NRCC had been level funded at \$112,000 for over a decade. This resulted in systemic and consistent underfunding of Vermont's Natural Resources Conservation Districts, which led to our current budgetary situation of each District writing and managing many different grants just to sustain operations and programming. This funding model has been unsustainable and led to high staff turnover and burnout, reducing our capacity to meet our statutory obligations and expand conservation programming and implementation. Prior to the 2022 Legislative Session, VACD led a process of asking each District what they needed in order to continue operations in a more sustainable manner. That process led to our first specific request for increased base funding from the state last year, and we were successful in securing an additional \$250,000 in base funding which is represented in the Governor's FY24 Budget.

Request for \$3,000,000 Base Appropriation in FY24

While we acknowledge that the increase from \$362,000 to \$3,000,000 is significant, it represents real need. Because District activities are currently limited to the purposes of the various grants we piecemeal together, it has been a challenge to expand our services and programs to meet the increased demand that we are experiencing as a direct result of state policy and goals. With a \$3,000,000 base appropriation, District Managers could spend less time managing grants and more time implementing projects on the ground, which is where their expertise lies. We currently have the capacity to expand our work in protecting natural resources and promoting climate resiliency across the state and need additional funding to do so. You can see estimates for each category of funding included in this request in our FY24 Budget Request.

The \$3,000,000 requested would <u>not</u> replace the majority of grants Districts currently receive to implement projects on the ground. This funding would allow Conservation Districts and the NRCC to retain and recruit skilled staff, engage with their communities in a more meaningful way, provide the state mandated \$50 per diem to all Board members, make necessary facility upgrades, and build capacity. This funding is for management and administration, needs assessments, and community outreach and engagement, which is critical for successful operations and difficult to fund with project-based grant funding. In many states, Conservation Districts are funded through county government or property transfer taxes. We do not have these systems in place in Vermont, so we are relying on state funding as our primary avenue, which is the NRCC line within VAAFM's budget.
