Thank you for considering ways to improve the opportunity for every Vermonter to have a safe and affordable home. Housing is a single economic ecosystem, likened by some to a cruel game of musical chairs. When there are not enough homes, the most vulnerable Vermonters are the ones who lose the game and find themselves homeless or living in homes that are not affordable or unsuitable for them in the long run. Despite significant public investment in permanently affordable housing, our housing ecosystem also needs the private market to house lower and middle-income Vermonters.


Please enact the improvements to municipal zoning and decision-making in the Housing Omnibus Bill introduced by Senator Ram-Hinsdale and in H.68 introduced by Representative Bongartz. Although I work at the Vermont Housing Finance Agency and am on the local housing committees in South Burlington and Winooski, I am writing this exclusively as a 25-year Vermont resident convinced of the urgent need to create more housing in my backyard.




