1	TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES:
2	The Committee on Government Operations and Military Affairs to which
3	was referred House Bill No. 503 entitled "An act relating to approval of
4	amendments to the charter of the Town of St. Johnsbury" respectfully reports
5	that it has considered the same and recommends that the bill be amended by
6	striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the
7	following:
8	Sec. 1. CHARTER AMENDMENT APPROVAL
9	The General Assembly approves the amendments to the charter of the Town
10	of St. Johnsbury as set forth in this act. Voters approved the proposals of
11	amendment on November 8, 2022.
12	Sec. 2. 24 App. V.S.A. chapter 151 is amended to read:
13	CHAPTER 151. TOWN OF ST. JOHNSBURY
14	Subchapter 1. Powers of the Town
15	* * *
16	§ 2A. TAXATION FOR BONDS AND NOTES
17	Notwithstanding subsection 2(b) of this charter, all taxable property in the
18	Town of St. Johnsbury shall be subject to the levy of unlimited ad valorem
19	taxes to pay bonds and notes authorized by the voters of the Town for water
20	purposes.

§ 3. SETTLEMENT OF VILLAGE AFFAIRS

The officers of the Village of St. Johnsbury shall, prior to the date when 1957 Acts and Resolves No. 345, as amended, goes into effect, settle, so far as possible, the pecuniary affairs of the Village of St. Johnsbury, and shall, except as hereinafter provided, on said date turn over and deliver to the Clerk of the Town of St. Johnsbury, all the records, books, and documents of the Village of St. Johnsbury, and to the proper officers of the said Town all other property of the said Village.

§ 4. AUTHORITY; ANNUAL MEETING

(a) Said Town shall have and is hereby granted the authority to exercise all powers relating to municipal affairs and no enumeration of powers in this charter shall be deemed to limit or restrict the general grant of authority hereby conferred; but this grant of authority shall not be deemed to limit the authority of the Legislature to alter, amend, or repeal this charter; or to limit the right to hereafter pass general laws applicable alike to this and all other municipal corporations of the State; nor shall this grant of authority be deemed to limit the patronage or control of the State with respect to said Town.

(b) The Town shall start its annual meeting at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon of the day before the first Tuesday of March and may transact at that time any business not involving voting by Australian ballot or voting required by law to be by ballot and to be held on the first Tuesday of March. Discussion shall be

1	permitted at such meetings on all articles contained in the warning for the
2	annual meeting. A meeting so started shall be adjourned until the following
3	day.
4	§ 5. POWERS
5	Under the general grant of authority contained in and conferred upon the
6	town by section 4 of this charter, the Town of St. Johnsbury may exercise the
7	following powers and functions:
8	(1) To levy, assess, and collect taxes in order to carry out its powers to
9	appropriate and to borrow money within the limits prescribed by the general
10	laws, and to collect special assessments for benefits conferred.
11	(2) To furnish all local public services, including without limiting the
12	generality of the foregoing a water system, electric light and power system,
13	and a sewage system and disposal plant; to purchase, hire, construct, own,
14	maintain, and operate or lease local public utilities subject to chapter 411 of
15	V.S. 47; to acquire, by condemnation or otherwise, within or without the limits
16	of said Town, property necessary for any such purpose, subject to restrictions
17	imposed by the general law for the protection of other communities.
18	(3) To make local public improvements and to acquire, by condemnation
19	or otherwise, property within its corporate limits necessary for such
20	improvements; and also to acquire an excess over that needed for any such

improvement, and to sell or lease such excess property with restrictions, in order to protect and preserve the improvement.

(4) To acquire by gift or purchase, sell, convey, lease, assign, maintain, and service real and personal property as may be necessary or incidental to the

exercise of its municipal powers, duties, and functions and to exercise in

connection therewith any incidental powers as may be necessary to preserve

and maintain the value of any such property once lawfully acquired.

- (5) To issue and sell bonds on the security of any such property, or of any public utility owned by the Town, or of the revenues thereof, or of both, including in the case of a public utility, if deemed desirable by the Town, a franchise stating the terms upon which, in case of foreclosure, the purchaser may operate such utility.
- (6) To purchase or lease lands within or without the corporate limits of the Town, to lay out or widen streets, highways, lanes, commons, alleys, and walks, to provide places of healthy recreation in summer or in winter such as a skating rink, a swimming pool, a playing field, a public park; to provide for tourist camping sites, and aviation landing field, and a municipal forest reserve; and for any municipal purposes whatever.
- (7) To adopt and enforce within its limits local police, sanitary, zoning, Town planning, and other similar regulations, not in conflict with the laws of this State.

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(9) To establish and maintain a police department, to provide for the appointment of police officers, who shall be sworn and who shall have the same powers as constables in the service of civil and criminal process, and such further special authority as may be provided in the bylaws or ordinances of said Town enacted under authority of law. Such fire and police departments may be consolidated into one department if the Town shall so vote.

(10) To appropriate annually money for the maintenance, care, improvement, and support of Fairbanks Museum, so long as the same shall remain a nonprofit institution for the promotion of education.

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§ 7. BYLAWS

In meetings duly warned for the purpose, the Town of St. Johnsbury shall have power to make, alter, repeal, or amend bylaws that, together with the ordinances and regulations adopted by the Selectboard, shall regulate its affairs and shall carry into effect the provisions and intent of this charter.

§ 8. ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS

The Selectboard of the Town of St. Johnsbury, consistent with the

Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State, shall have the

power and authority to make, establish, impose, alter, amend, or repeal

ordinances and regulations and to enforce the same by fine, penalty, forfeiture,

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injunction, restraining order, or any proper remedy, with respect to the inspection, regulation, licensing, or suppression of the following affairs, establishments, employments, enterprises, uses, undertakings, and businesses, viz: (1) The sale and measurement of wood, coal, oil, and all other fuels; hay scales; markets dealing in meat, fish, and foodstuffs; slaughterhouses; groceries; restaurants, lunch carts, and other eating establishments; all places where beverages are manufactured, processed, bottled, or sold; manufacturing establishments; saloons; taverns; innkeepers; hotels; motels; rooming houses; junk businesses; advertising billboards; overhanging signs and awnings; billiard rooms; pool rooms; bowling alleys; public halls; dance halls; theaters; moving picture houses; all places where tobacco, cigars, and cigarettes are manufactured or sold; repair shops; brickyards; stone sheds; blacksmith shops; public garages; the transportation, storage, and sale of propane gas, naphtha, gasoline, kerosene, fuel oil, and other inflammable oils; the breeding, raising, and keeping of horses, cattle, swine, poultry, mink, foxes, furbearing, and other domestic animals; coal sheds; wood yards; creameries, dairies; dyeing establishments; garbage plants; gas works; livery stables; skating rinks; sewers;

cesspools; privies; cow stables, barns; wells; and public dumps; oil and

gasoline storage tanks, and gasoline filling stations.

1	(2) Processions, parades, traveling showmen, shows, circuses,
2	menageries, carnivals, clairvoyants, mendicants, fortune tellers, spiritualists,
3	mediums, itinerant vendors, peddlers, auctioneers, pawnbrokers, professional
4	and amateur sports.
5	(3) The use of streets and highways; the regulation of traffic, both
6	vehicular and pedestrian; taxicabs and all vehicles, exclusive of motor buses,
7	used in the conveyance for hire of persons or goods; the parking, operation,
8	and speed of vehicles; guide posts, street signs, and street safety devices; milk
9	and cream businesses and routes.
10	(4) Cruelty to animals; fast driving; the going at large of animals; and the
11	keeping of bees.
12	(5) The erection of poles, and the placing of wires, cables, and pipes,
13	subject to the provision of chapter 409 V.S. 47; the laying of water mains and
14	sewers; the excavating of streets; the disposal of refuse, filth, and animal
15	carcasses; the throwing or dumping of ashes, waste paper, handbills, circulars,
16	or rubbish of any sort; the planting, preservation, or destruction of shade trees.
17	(6) The transportation, manufacture, storage, and sale of gunpowder,
18	ashes, lime, matches, fireworks, explosives, acids, and other dangerous or
19	combustible materials.

1	(7) The cleaning of public sidewalks and gutters, and the removal
2	therefrom of snow, ice, litter, garbage, stands, tables, boxes, and other
3	materials encumbering or obstructing any public sidewalk, street, or way.
4	(8) A building code; the construction, repair, and alteration of chimneys,
5	flues, stovepipes, furnaces, fireplaces, and heating apparatus and plumbing
6	facilities of all kinds.
7	(9) Nuisances, bawdyhouses, gaming houses; racing pools; gambling
8	instruments of all kinds; noisome and offensive places and occupations;
9	loafing, obscenity, and ribaldry upon the Town streets and highways;
10	vagrancy; riots, disturbances, disorderly assemblies, and all breaches of the
11	peace; pollution of the public water supply.
12	§ 9. PUBLICATION OF BYLAWS AND ORDINANCES
13	The bylaw adopted by the Town and the ordinances and regulations passed
14	by the Selectboard, whether enacted under the authority of general or special
15	law, shall be published in a newspaper having general circulation in said Town
16	at least 20 days before the effective date thereof, and all such enactments shall
17	thereupon be recorded at length by the Town Clerk in a book kept for that
18	purpose in the office of the Town Clerk, and the Town Clerk's certificate that
19	such bylaws, ordinances, and regulations were duly adopted and passed at an
20	annual meeting of said Town or at a special meeting thereof lawfully called for
21	that purpose or were duly enacted and adopted by the Selectboard of the Town

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under authority of law or under authority of a vote of the Town shall be prima facie evidence of such fact in any court in this State; and certified copies of said bylaws, ordinances, and regulations and the Clerk's certificates shall be received as evidence in all the courts of the State. § 10. PENALTIES (a) Fines, penalties, and forfeitures up to and including \$200.00, for each breach of an ordinance or bylaw, may be established by the Selectboard, or by a properly warned Town meeting. These fines, penalties, and forfeitures may be recovered in an action of tort brought in the name of the Town, and in any such action a general complaint relying on the ordinance or the bylaw shall be sufficient. The process may issue either against the body or the property of the defendant, and if the defendant is found guilty, and if it is found by the court that the cause of action arose from his or her willful or malicious act or neglect, it shall so adjudge, and may further adjudge that he or she be confined in close jail, and may issue execution against his or her body with a certificate of such findings endorsed thereon; and such execution with such certificate thereon shall have the same effect as an execution issued on a judgment founded upon tort having a like certificate endorsed thereon. (b) Any person refusing to comply with any Town ordinance or bylaw, relating to his or her business may be enjoined by a proper action in chancery

brought in the name of the Town, from continuing such business in violation of

1	such ordinance or bylaw, and in any such action a bill relying on the ordinance
2	or bylaw shall be sufficient.
3	(c) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the Town from
4	having and exercising such other powers as may be proper to enforce
5	obedience to its ordinances and bylaws and to punish violations thereof.
6	§ 11. PROSECUTION OF VIOLATIONS
7	All violations of ordinances or bylaws may be prosecuted in behalf of the
8	Town by its attorney, or police officers, or by any other duly authorized
9	prosecuting officer, before the Caledonia Municipal Court; and all fines,
10	penalties, or forfeitures recovered by the said Town for violations of such
11	ordinances or bylaws shall be paid into the Town Treasury.
12	§ 12. OFFICERS
13	The elective officers of the Town shall be those authorized by the general
14	laws of this State, except that notwithstanding the provisions of section 3509
15	of the Vermont Statutes, Revision of 1947, the listers shall be appointed
16	annually by the Selectboard, unless the Town at an annual or special meeting
17	duly warned for that purpose shall vote otherwise.
18	§ 12a. COMPENSATION AND FEES
19	(a) The Selectboard shall annually consider, and from time to time set, the
20	compensation of the following officers:
21	(1) Town Manager;

1	(2) Constable;
2	(3) members of the Board of Assessment.
3	(b) The Town Clerk and the Selectboard shall jointly set the compensation
4	of the Town Clerk each year. The Town Treasurer and the Selectboard shall
5	jointly set the compensation of the Town Treasurer each year. If the
6	Selectboard and the Town Clerk or Town Treasurer are unable to agree on the
7	amount of either officer's compensation, that officer's compensation shall be
8	set by vote of the Town and the Selectboard shall include an article or articles
9	in the annual meeting warning to that effect. The article or articles shall be
10	adopted or modified by the vote of the majority of those eligible to vote who
11	are present at the meeting. The article or articles shall not be voted on by
12	Australian ballot.
13	(c) The Town Manager, with the approval of the Selectboard, shall set the
14	compensation of all other town officers and employees.
15	* * *
16	§ 13. EXPIRATION OF TERMS OF SELECTBOARD MEMBERS UPON
17	MERGER
18	Upon such effective date of the merger of the Village of St. Johnsbury and
19	the Town of St. Johnsbury the Selectboard members shall continue in office for
20	the remainder of their respective terms and the other officers of the Town of St.
21	Johnsbury shall continue in office until the first Tuesday in March next

following, and their successors shall have been elected or appointed; and the
ordinances of the Village of St. Johnsbury then in force shall remain of full
force and effect, following the effective date of this act for a period of one year
only, so far as such ordinances shall continue to be applicable and appropriate,
except as repealed, amended, altered, or modified by the Selectboard of the
Town of St. Johnsbury, and as respects only that part of the Town of St.
Johnsbury comprised within the limits of the Village of St. Johnsbury, as
defined by 1927 Acts and Resolves No. 179.
§ 14. AUTHORITY TO MERGE; EXPIRATION
The authority granted by this charter to the Village of St. Johnsbury and the
Town of St. Johnsbury to merge shall expire 20 years from the date of the
passage and adoption of this charter unless all of the municipalities mentioned
herein shall have voted to adopt the provisions hereof within such period
* * *
§ 18. BOARD OF ASSESSMENT
(a) Creation. There is hereby created a Board of Assessment composed of
the three listers.
(b) Duties. The Board of Assessment shall exercise all powers and duties
with respect to grievances, otherwise imposed upon the listers or a board of
listers under the laws of the State of Vermont, except as otherwise provided in
this charter.

1	* * *
2	§ 20. UNDESIGNATED RESERVE FUND
3	The Selectboard may annually reserve any surplus in the essential services
4	budget, not to exceed five percent of the budget, for the purpose of establishing
5	an undesignated reserve fund. The reserve fund shall be kept in a separate
6	account and invested as are other public funds and may be expended for
7	purposes as may be authorized by a majority of the voters present and voting at
8	an annual or special meeting duly warned.
9	§ 101. ADDITIONAL TOWN POWERS
10	In addition to powers otherwise conferred by law, the Town of St.
11	Johnsbury is authorized to adopt, amend, repeal, and enforce ordinances:
12	(1) relating to collection and removal of garbage, ashes, rubbish, refuse,
13	waste, and scrap by the Town and establishment of rates to be paid to the
14	Town for such service; and
15	(2) relating to construction and alteration of public and private buildings
16	and the use thereof, including establishment of minimum standards for
17	plumbing, heating, and wiring, so as to prevent hazardous and dangerous
18	conditions, fires, and explosions by precautionary regulations and inspection.
19	§ 102. INITIATIVE; ADVISORY VOTES
20	The voters of the Town have the power to petition for a nonbinding
21	advisory vote to reflect public sentiment. The petition shall be signed by at

1	least five percent of the voters of the Town and shall state that it is advisory
2	only. The Select Board, upon receipt of the petition, shall place the article on
3	the warning for the next Town meeting or any other Town election.
4	Subchapter 2. Town Officers
5	§ 201. ELECTIVE OFFICERS
6	(a) The elective officers of the Town shall be five Select Board members
7	elected from the Town at large at a duly warned annual town meeting; a Town
8	Clerk; a Treasurer; and a Moderator, unless by a majority vote of the Town the
9	Moderator becomes an appointed position.
10	(b) Select Board terms shall include three positions with a three-year term
11	and two positions with a one-year term. All other elective officers shall hold
12	office for a three-year term. The term shall expire the first day following the
13	annual Town meeting.
14	§ 202. APPOINTIVE OFFICERS
15	(a) The Select Board members shall annually appoint a Constable and other
16	officers required by law or this charter, the appointments to be made as
17	vacancies occur in the elected positions.
18	(b) The Select Board members may create appointive officers not provided
19	for by this charter or required by law as they deem to be in the best interests of
20	the Town.

1	§ 203. COMPENSATION
2	(a) Compensation paid to the Select Board members shall be set by the
3	voters at Town meeting.
4	(b) Subject to subsection (a) of this section, the Select Board shall fix the
5	compensation of all elective officers and of all officers appointed by the Select
6	Board.
7	(c) The Town Manager, under policies approved by the Select Board, shall
8	fix the compensation of all other officers and employees whose compensation
9	is not fixed by the Select Board pursuant to subsection (b) of this section.
10	Subchapter 3. Select Board
11	§ 301. SELECT BOARD; LEGISLATIVE BODY
12	The Select Board shall constitute the legislative body of the Town of and
13	shall have all powers and authority necessary for the performance of the
14	legislative function.
15	§ 302. ADDITIONAL POWERS OF THE SELECT BOARD
16	In addition to powers otherwise conferred by law, the Select Board is
17	authorized to adopt, amend, repeal, and enforce ordinances:
18	(1) regulating the parking and operation of motor vehicles; including, in
19	accordance with any other provisions of law, the establishment of speed zones
20	wherein the limit is less than 20 miles per hour, all as may be required by the
21	safety and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town;

1	(2) relating to regulation, licensing, and prohibition of the storage and
2	accumulation of junk cars, garbage, ashes, rubbish, refuse, waste, and scrap
3	and the collection, removal, and disposal of such materials; and
4	(3) relating to restraining the running at large of dogs, cats, and other
5	domestic animals, including any such animals as may be kept by residents of
6	the town, whether classified as domestic, exotic, or otherwise.
7	§ 303. FURTHER POWERS OF THE SELECT BOARD
8	In addition to powers otherwise conferred by law, the Select Board
9	members shall also have the power to:
10	(1) create, consolidate, or dissolve departments as necessary or relevant
11	for the performance of municipal services;
12	(2) create, consolidate, or dissolve commissions and committees as
13	necessary or relevant and appoint the commission and committee members;
14	(3) provide on an annual basis an independent audit of all Town
15	financial records by a certified public accountant;
16	(4) inquire into the conduct of any officer, commission, or department
17	and investigate any and all municipal affairs; and
18	(5) discharge all duties devolving on the Town Agent by general law
19	and hire attorneys on behalf of the Town.

1	§ 304. ORGANIZATION OF THE SELECT BOARD
2	(a) Forthwith after the annual meeting of the town, the Select Board
3	members shall organize and elect a Chair and Vice Chair.
4	(b) The Chair of the Board, or in the Chair's absence, the Vice Chair, shall
5	preside at all meetings of the Board and the presiding officer shall be a voting
6	member of the Board.
7	(c) When a vacancy occurs on the Select Board, the remaining members
8	may fill the vacancy by appointment of a registered voter of the Town, such
9	appointment to be for the period until the next annual meeting, when the voters
10	of the Town shall fill the vacancy.
11	(d) The Board shall fix the time and place of its regular meetings to be held
12	at least twice a month.
13	(e) The presence of three members shall constitute a quorum.
14	Subchapter 4. Town Manager
15	§ 401. APPOINTED BY THE SELECT BOARD
16	The Select Board members shall appoint a Town Manager for an indefinite
17	term and upon such conditions as they may determine.
18	§ 402. TOWN MANAGER NONPARTISAN
19	(a) The Town's interests in preserving integrity and efficiency in the
20	execution and management of its government are best served by a Town

1	Manager who is prohibited from the fact and appearance of political
2	partisanship in the operation of the office.
3	(b) The Town Manager shall be chosen solely on the basis of the
4	individual's executive, administrative, and professional qualifications.
5	(c) The Town Manager shall not take part in the organization or direction
6	of a political party, serve as a member of a party committee, or be a candidate
7	for election to any partisan office.
8	§ 403. OATH AND BOND
9	Before entering upon the Manager's duties, the Town Manager shall be
10	sworn to the faithful performance of the Manager's duties by the Town Clerk
11	and shall be bonded in an amount and with sureties as the Select Board may
12	require.
13	§ 404. DUTIES FOR MANAGER
14	(a) The Town Manager shall be the Chief Executive Officer of the Town
15	and shall:
16	(1) Carry out the policies established by the Select Board, to whom the
17	Town Manager shall be accountable.
18	(2) Attend all meetings of the Select Board, except when the Manager's
19	compensation or removal is being considered; keep the Select Board informed
20	of the financial condition and future needs of the Town; and make any other

1	reports that may be required by law, requested by the Select Board, or deemed
2	by the Manager to be advisable.
3	(3) Perform all other duties prescribed by this charter or required by law
4	or by resolution of the Select Board.
5	(4) Be an ex-officio member of all standing committees except the
6	Development Review Board and shall not vote.
7	(5) Prepare an annual budget, submit it to the Select Board, and be
8	responsible for its administration after adoption.
9	(6) Compile for general distribution at the end of each fiscal year a
10	complete report on the finances and administrative activities of the Town for
11	the year.
12	(7) Provide to the Select Board a monthly financial statement, with a
13	copy to the Town Treasurer.
14	(8) Perform all duties now conferred by law on the Road Commissioner
15	within all areas of the Town, except within villages that vote not to surrender
16	their charters under this charter, notwithstanding the provisions of 24 V.S.A.
17	<u>§ 1236(5).</u>
18	(9) Perform all duties now conferred by law on the Collector of
19	Delinquent Taxes.
20	(10) Under policies approved by the Select Board, be the General
21	Purchasing Agent of the Town and purchase all equipment and supplies and

1	contract for services for every department pursuant to the purchasing and bid
2	policies approved by the Select Board.
3	(11) Be responsible for the system of accounts.
4	(12) Be responsible for the operation of all departments, including the
5	Police and Fire Departments.
6	(13) Under policies approved by the Select Board, have exclusive
7	authority to appoint, fix the salaries of, suspend, and remove, all officers and
8	employees except those who are elected or who are appointed by the Select
9	Board. When the Town Manager position is vacant, this authority shall be
10	exercised by the Select Board.
11	(b) The Town Manager may, when advisable or proper, delegate to
12	subordinate officers and employees of the Town any duties conferred upon the
13	Manager.
14	§ 405. COMPENSATION
15	The Town Manager shall receive such compensation as may be fixed by the
16	Select Board.
17	§ 406. APPOINTMENTS
18	Except for those appointments made by the Select Board as provided for in
19	this charter, the Town Manager shall appoint and remove all Town employees,
20	including Chief of the Fire Department, Chief of Police, Director of Public
21	Works, Assistant Town Manager, Finance Director, Zoning Administrator,

1	Assessor, Code Compliance Officer, Health Officer, Parks Director and Tree
2	Warden, Recreation Director, and all other officers and employees as may be
3	required by general law of the State, by this chapter, or by the Select Board.
4	§ 407. REMOVAL OF THE TOWN MANAGER
5	(a) The Town Manager may be removed from office for cause, by a
6	majority vote of the Select Board at a duly warned meeting for that purpose, as
7	provided by general law or employment contract. At least 30 days prior to the
8	effective date of the removal, the Select Board shall by majority vote of its
9	members adopt a resolution stating the reason for the removal and cause a copy
10	of such resolution to be given to the Manager. The Select Board may by such
11	resolution immediately suspend the Town Manager from active duty but shall
12	continue the Manager's salary until final dismissal, unless otherwise contracted
13	between the Select Board and the Town Manager.
14	(b) Town Manager appointments shall continue until removed by the Town
15	Manager. Removals by the Town Manager shall be in accordance with any
16	personnel policy or plan adopted.
17	Subchapter 5. Taxation
18	§ 501. TAXES
19	Taxes shall be assessed by the Town based on the fair market value of real
20	property, in accordance with State law.
21	§ 502. FAIR MARKET VALUE OF REAL ESTATE

1	(a) In the event that the fair market value of real estate is materially
2	changed because of total or partial destruction of or damage to the property or
3	because of alterations, additions, or other capital improvements, the taxpayer
4	may appeal as provided by law.
5	(b) When the fair market value of real estate is finally determined by appeal
6	to the Board of Civil Authority, then the value so fixed shall be the fair market
7	value of the real estate for the year in which the appeal is taken.
8	(c) When the fair market value of real estate is finally determined by the
9	Director of Property Valuation and Review (PVR) or by a court having
10	jurisdiction, then the value so fixed shall be the fair market value of the real
11	estate for the year for which such appeal is taken and for the ensuing two years
12	unless the taxpayer's property is altered materially; is damaged; or if the Town
13	in which it is located has undergone a complete revaluation of all taxable real
14	estate, in the event of which, such fair market value may be changed.
15	§ 503. SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS
16	Despite any contrary provision in general law, the Select Board may in its

21	§ 504. CREATION OF ST. JOHNSBURY DOWNTOWN DISTRICT

1	There is hereby created in the Town of St Johnsbury a special district to be
2	known as the St. Johnsbury Downtown Improvement District which shall be
3	that area set forth on a map approved by the voters of St. Johnsbury and filed
4	with the Town Clerk. The area of the District may be changed upon a majority
5	vote of the legal voters at an annual or special meeting duly warned.
6	§ 505. DOWNTOWN DISTRICT; PURPOSE AND POWERS
7	(a) The District is created for the general purpose of maintaining and
8	improving the economic, social, cultural, and environmental vitality and
9	quality of the Town of St. Johnsbury, in particular, the District created by
10	section 506 of this charter, to promote the Town and the District as a regional
11	retail, commercial, and service center and to serve as an advocate for the
12	orderly development of the District in order to encourage expansion of the
13	retail, commercial, and service base of the District and the Town by attracting
14	new business and investment.
15	(b) The rights, powers, and duties of the District shall be exercised by the
16	Select Board and shall be broadly construed to accomplish the purposes set
17	forth above and shall include the following:
18	(1) to advertise and promote the Improvement District;
19	(2) to represent the interests of the District;
20	(3) to receive and expend contributions, grants, and income;

1	(4) to expend funds as provided for in the budget or as otherwise
2	approved;
3	(5) to manage and maintain public spaces and to assume or supplement
4	the services and maintenance heretofore provided to the District by the Town
5	as recommended to and approved by the Select Board;
6	(6) to acquire and dispose of property on behalf of the Town;
7	(7) to install and make public improvements;
8	(8) to improve, manage, and regulate public parking facilities and
9	vehicular traffic within the District;
10	(9) to enter into contracts as may be necessary or convenient to carry out
11	the purpose of this charter;
12	(10) to regulate, lease, license, establish rules and fees, and otherwise
13	manage the use of public spaces within the District;
14	(11) to plan for the orderly development of the District in cooperation
15	with the Town Planning Commission;
16	(12) to do all other things necessary or convenient to carry out the
17	purposes for which this District was created; and
18	(13) to appropriate annually money for the maintenance, care,
19	improvement, and support of Fairbanks Museum, provided the same shall
20	remain a nonprofit institution for the promotion of education.
21	§ 506. DOWNTOWN DISTRICT; ANNUAL BUDGET

1	The Town Manager shall submit each year an operating budget of
2	anticipated expenditures and revenues to the Select Board for approval for the
3	next fiscal year. In the event the Select Board does not approve the budget as
4	submitted, the Select Board shall immediately return the budget to the Town
5	Manager with its recommendations for the Town Manager's reconsideration.
6	Appropriations other than from contributions, grants, and income shall be
7	raised solely through District taxes that shall be assessed and collected as a tax
8	on property as provided for in section 508 of this charter. The Select Board
9	may borrow money in anticipation of District taxes.
10	§ 507. DOWNTOWN DISTRICT; TAXES
11	(a) District taxes are charges levied upon the owners of taxable properties
12	located in the District, excepting properties used exclusively for residential
13	purposes, which taxes shall be used to defray the expenses incurred in
14	connection with the operation, maintenance, and repair of the District.
15	(b) The District tax for each property in the District subject to the tax shall
16	be based upon a rate on each \$100.00 of listed value of the property as adjusted
17	under subsection (c) of this section. The tax rate shall be determined by
18	dividing the amount to be raised by taxes by the total value of the taxable
19	properties on the grand list as adjusted located in the District that are subject to
20	the District tax under this subchapter.

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(c) The District tax shall be set by the Select Board upon approval of the budget by the Select Board and notice in writing thereof shall be given to owners of record as of April 1 of each year of property so assessed, or to their agents or attorneys, stating therein the amount of such District taxes, and such taxes shall be due and payable to the Town Treasurer when normal Town and school taxes are due. The Town Treasurer shall collect unpaid District taxes as provided for the collection of taxes in the charter. District taxes shall be a lien on the properties when assessed and until the tax is paid or the lien is otherwise discharged by operation of law. (d) In the case of any property used for both residential and nonresidential purposes within the District as of April 1, the Department of Assessment shall adjust the listed value for the purposes of determining the District tax under this section to exclude the value of that portion of the property used for residential purposes. The Department of Assessment shall determine the adjusted grand list value of the business portion of the property and give notice of the same as provided under 32 V.S.A. chapter 131. Any property owner may file a grievance with the Board and appeal the decision of the Board as provided for under 32 V.S.A. chapter 131; however, the filing of an appeal of the determination of the Board and pendency of the appeal shall not vacate the lien on the property assessed, and the District taxes must be paid and continue to be paid as they become due.

1	Subchapter 6. Water and Wastewater Systems
2	§ 601. TOWN POWERS
3	The Town may make, alter, and repeal ordinances relating to management,
4	operation, maintenance, replacement, and extension of a Town water and
5	wastewater systems and may fix, and from time to time alter, water and
6	wastewater rates.
7	Subchapter 7. Miscellaneous
8	§ 701. CHARTER REVIEW COMMITTEE
9	At least once every five years, the Select Board shall appoint a Charter
10	Review Committee of not fewer than five nor more than nine members from
11	among the residents of the Town. The Committee shall review the charter and
12	recommend any changes it finds necessary or advisable for the purpose of
13	improving the operation of Town government. The Committee shall prepare a
14	written report of its recommendations in time for those recommendations to be
15	submitted to the Select Board for review not later than one year after the
16	appointment of the Committee. At the discretion of the Select Board, the
17	recommendations may be warned for ballot vote at an annual or special Town
18	meeting to be held not later than one year after the submission of the report.
19	The Select Board shall provide in its budget for any year when a Charter
20	Review Committee is appointed funding for the Committee.

8	(e) A special district to be known as the St. Johnsbury Downtown
9	Improvement District (District) is created. The District shall be that area

12	Avenue and Pearl Street. The District is more precisely shown on the Plan "St.
13	Johnsbury Downtown Improvement District, Revised January 3, 1997" and

One member shall be a Selectboard member, or an employee of the Town of St. Johnsbury, who shall be appointed to serve for a term of one year commencing the first day of April and until the member's successor is appointed and qualified. The Commission shall have a Chair and Vice Chair elected by the Commission members. Any vacancy shall be filled by the appointing authority for the remainder of the unexpired term. Commissioners may be removed by unanimous vote of the Selectboard. (2) Purposes and Powers. The Commission is created for the general purpose of maintaining and improving the economic, cultural, and environmental vitality and quality of the Town of St. Johnsbury and, in particular, the District created by this subsection; to promote the Town and the District as a regional retail, commercial, and service center; and to serve as an advocate for orderly development of the District in order to encourage expansion of the retail, commercial, and service base of the District and the Town by attracting new business and investment.

1	The rights, powers, and duties of the Commission acting on its own
2	authority or acting through the Town of St. Johnsbury Selectboard, as set fort
3	in this section, shall be broadly construed to accomplish the purposes set forth
4	within the District and shall include the following:
5	(A) to prepare a budget (the "budget") for the District in accordance
6	with subdivision (1) of this subsection;
7	(B) to advertise and promote the District;
8	(C) to represent the interests of the District;
9	(D) to hire and remove personnel as provided for in the budget or as
10	otherwise approved by the Selectboard;
11	(E) to apply for available governmental grants in aid and economic

14	(G) to apply for an allocation of the State's private activity bond
15	volume cap under 26 U.S.C. § 141, as amended, when approved by the

17	(H) to expend funds as provided for in the budget or as otherwise

19	(I) to manage and maintain public spaces and to assume or
20	supplement the services and maintenance heretofore provided the District by
21	the Town as recommended to and approved by the Selectboard;

1	(J) to acquire and dispose of property as recommended to and
2	approved by the Selectboard;
3	(K) to install and make public improvements as recommended to and
4	approved by the Selectboard;
5	(L) to cooperate with the Town in the use, management, and
6	improvement of public parking facilities and to undertake such management or
7	improvements and to regulate vehicular traffic within the district as
8	recommended by the Selectboard;
9	(M) to enter into contracts;
10	(N) to regulate, lease, license, establish rules and fees, and otherwise

(3) Annual Budget. Annually the Commission shall submit to the Selectboard for approval for the next fiscal year a capital and operating budget of revenues and expenditures that shall be used exclusively to repay debt on capital improvements in the District and to defray the expenses incurred by the Commission in connection with the operation, maintenance, and repair of the District. In the event the Selectboard does not approve the budget as submitted, the Selectboard shall return the budget forthwith to the Commission with its recommendations for the Commission's reconsideration. Appropriations other than from contributions, grants, and income for the Commission shall be raised through common area fees that shall be assessed and collected as tax on property as provided for in this subsection. The Commission may, upon adoption of the annual budget and upon approval of the Selectboard, borrow money in anticipation of common area fees.

(4) Common Area Fees.

(A) Common area fees are charges levied upon the owners of taxable properties located in the District, excepting such portions of properties used for owner-occupied residential purposes.

1	(B)(i) The District shall have the authority to assess common area fees
2	for taxable real estate in the district based upon one of the following
3	assessment methods:
4	(I) A flat fee per taxable parcel identifiable on the grand list.
5	(II) A flat fee per taxable parcel plus a formula based on any
6	one, or combination thereof, of square footages of commercial space, number
7	of apartments, square footage of lot size, linear footage of frontage, number of
8	parking spaces provided, number of parking spaces that would be needed to
9	conform to the Town's existing zoning bylaws for new construction, or any
10	equation that raises fees adequate to meet an annual Commission budget with a
11	method that reasonably apportions costs to property owners in relation to the
12	benefit that accrues to them.
13	(ii) The Commission shall only raise common area fees sufficient
14	to meet the budget regardless of the assessment method.
15	(iii) The common area fees shall be established by the Commission
16	upon approval of the Commission budget by the Selectboard and shall be
17	assessed annually by the Selectboard to be collected at the same time and in
18	the same manner as the Town votes to have its taxes collected, and such
19	common area assessment shall be a lien thereon with the same priority as taxes
20	lawfully assessed thereon.

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(C) Consistent with the charter for the Town of St. Johnsbury and the laws of the United States and of this State, the Commission, with the approval of the Selectboard, may substitute any local option taxes permitted by law in lieu of common area fees that exist to meet the budget.

(D) Appeals. Persons aggrieved by any decision of the Commission involving the assessment or levy of common area fees may appeal the decision to the Selectboard by filing a written notice of appeal with the Town Clerk within 30 days of the date of such decision, and furnishing a copy of the notice of appeal to the Commission. The Selectboard shall set a date and place for a hearing on the appeal within 60 days of the filing of the notice of appeal. The Selectboard shall give the appellant and the Commission at least 15 days' notice prior to the hearing date. Any person entitled to take an appeal may appear and be heard in person or be represented by agent or attorney at such hearing. Any hearing held under this subsection may be adjourned by the Selectboard from time to time; provided, however, that the date and place of adjourned hearing shall be announced at that hearing or 15 days' notice thereof is furnished to the appellant and the Commission. The Selectboard shall render its decision, which shall include findings of fact, within 45 days after completing the hearing, and shall within that period send the appellant, and the Commission, by certified mail, a copy of the decision. An aggrieved person may appeal a decision of the Selectboard to the Caledonia County Superior
