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"There was one gentleman who had all his counseling sessions on the phone, and he sounded good on the phone. He wasn't, and things were not going well, and he was having all kinds of problems, but they didn't know it because they couldn't see him and talk to him and really understand what was happening. [We needed someone who could] see the person, be in their house, see what was going on. And you walk in the person's house, and every plug or crack was covered with tape. The toilet was closed and taped down, and the sinks were closed because this person was very paranoid. We would see it because we would go in."

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"I had a young woman where I used to work who gave away her piano. It's a little small one that you can lift, and I knew she loved it. And I was thinking on [it] and so I called her when I heard that, I said, 'hey, I heard you gave away your piano.' 'Well, I'm not going to need it anymore.' And I'm like, 'why is that?' Well, she was going to kill herself. That was the final answer. And so she was getting rid of the things that she liked, that she thought someone else would like. So I spent time with her. I called crisis, they were going to come. They didn't show up until 10pm that night. I called them around 9am in the morning. So I was doing crisis intervention with her from 9am 'til 10pm and helping her understand, helping her make a commitment not to hurt herself, helping her understand there were things we could do to help with the problems she was having."

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"We have a really wonderful group of people...many of them have been willing to step up. The outside service organizations] are running with such a short group of people that there's not enough [staff]. And so what we do is we have a couple of ladies who don't mind giving people a ride to the grocery store, to their doctors' appointments. They don't mind going and getting their groceries from them if they need that. They don't mind doing their laundry for them. The blind man I was telling you about, one of the ladies who lives in our complex actually does his cleaning for him and now his laundry. What we created was a community."
