15	(1) "Child" has the same meaning as in 33 V.S.A. § 5102(2).
16	(2) "Pre-charge diversion" means a referral of an individual to a
17	community-based restorative justice provider by a law enforcement officer or
18	prosecutor after the referring officer or prosecutor has determined that
19	probable cause exists that the individual has committed a criminal offense and
20	before the individual is criminally charged with the offense or before a petition
21	is filed in family court for the offense.

1	(3) "Youth" has the same meaning as in 33 V.S.A. § 5102(29).
2	§ 163. JUVENILE COURT DIVERSION PROJECT PROGRAM
3	(a) <u>Purpose.</u>
4	(1) The Attorney General shall develop and administer a juvenile court
5	diversion project program, for both pre-charge and post-charge referrals to
6	youth-appropriate community-based restorative justice providers, for the
7	purpose of assisting juveniles children or youth charged with delinquent acts.
8	In consultation with the diversion programs, the Attorney General shall adopt a
9	policies and procedures manual in compliance with this section.
10	(2) The program shall be designed to provide a restorative option for
11	children or youth alleged to have caused harm in violation of a criminal statute
12	or who have been charged with violating a criminal statute and subject to a
13	delinquency or youthful offender petition filed with the Family Division of the
14	Superior Court, as well as for victims or those acting on a victim's behalf who
15	have been allegedly harmed by the responsible party. The juvenile diversion
16	program can accept referrals to the program as follows:
17	(A) Pre-charge by law enforcement or prosecutors pursuant to a
18	policy adopted in accordance with subdivisions (c)(1)-(2) of this section.
19	(B) Post-charge by prosecutors for children or youth charged with a
20	first or a second misdemeanor or a first nonviolent felony, or other offenses as
21	the prosecutor deems appropriate, pursuant to subdivision (c)(3) of this section.

1	(b) The diversion program administered by the Attorney General shall
2	support the operation of diversion programs in local communities through
3	grants of financial assistance to, or by contracting for services with,
4	municipalities, private groups, or other local organizations. The Attorney
5	General may require local financial contributions as a condition of receipt of
6	project funding. Administration; report.
7	(1) The Attorney General shall support the operation of diversion
8	programs in each of the State's counties through grants of financial assistance
9	to, or contracts for services with, a single municipality or organization to
10	provide community-based restorative justice programs and services in each
11	county. Upon approval of the Attorney General, the single municipality or
12	organization receiving a grant pursuant to this section may issue subgrants to
13	diversion providers or execute subcontracts for diversion services.
14	(2) The Attorney General may require local financial contributions as a
15	condition of receipt of program funding.
16	(3) In consultation with community-based restorative justice providers,
17	the Office of the Attorney General shall develop program outcomes following
18	the designated State of Vermont performance accountability framework and, in
19	consultation with the Department of State's Attorneys and Sheriffs, the Office
20	of the Defender General, the Center for Crime Victim Services, the Judiciary,
21	and the Division of Racial Justice Statistics of the Office of Racial Equity,

1	report annually on or before December 1 to the General Assembly on services
2	provided and outcome indicators. As components of the report required by this
3	subsection, the Attorney General shall include data on the number of pre-
4	charge and post-charge diversion program referrals in each county; race,
5	gender, age, and other demographic variables, whenever possible; offenses
6	charged and crime types; successful completion rates; and possible causes of
7	any geographical disparities.
8	(3) The Attorney General is authorized to accept grants and gifts for the
9	purposes of this section, such acceptance being pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5.
10	(4) In consultation with community-based restorative justice providers,
11	the Center for Crime Victims Services, the Department of State's Attorneys
12	and Sheriffs' Victim Advocates, the Division for Racial Justice Statistics of the
13	Office of Racial Equity, and the State Archivist, the Attorney General shall
14	adopt a policies and procedures manual for community-based restorative
15	justice providers to promote a uniform system across the State in compliance
16	with this section. The manual shall include policies and procedures related to:
17	(A) informing victims of their rights and role in pre-charge and post-
18	charge diversion, including that such information is available in writing upon
19	<u>request;</u>
20	(B) the timely notification victims of a referral to pre- and post-
21	charge diversion;

1	(C) an invitation to victims to engage in the restorative process;
2	(D) how to share information with a victim concerning a restorative
3	agreement's conditions related to the victim and any progress made on such
4	conditions;
5	(E) best practices for collecting data from all parties that engage with
6	the pre-charge and post-charge diversion programs; and
7	(F) confidentiality expectations for all parties who engage in the
8	restorative process.
9	(c) All diversion projects receiving financial assistance from the Attorney
10	General shall adhere to the following provisions: Juvenile diversion program
11	policy and referral requirements.
12	(1) The diversion project shall only accept persons against whom
13	charges have been filed and the court has found probable cause but are not yet
14	adjudicated.
15	(2) Alleged offenders shall be informed of their right to the advice and
16	assistance of private counsel or the public defender at all stages of the
17	diversion process, including the initial decision to participate, and the decision
18	to accept the diversion contract, so that the candidate may give his or her
19	informed consent.
20	(3) The participant shall be informed that his or her selection of the
21	diversion contract is voluntary.

1	(4) Each State's Attorney, in cooperation with the Attorney General and
2	the diversion program, shall develop clear criteria for deciding what types of
3	offenses and offenders will be eligible for diversion; however, the State's
4	Attorney shall retain final discretion over the referral of each case for
5	diversion. The provisions of 33 V.S.A. § 5225(c) and § 5280(e) shall apply.
6	(5) All information gathered in the course of the diversion process shall
7	be held strictly confidential and shall not be released without the participant's
8	prior consent (except that research and reports that do not require or establish
9	the identity of individual participants are allowed).
10	(6) Information related to the present offense that is divulged during the
11	diversion program shall not be used in the prosecutor's case. However, the
12	fact of participation and success, or reasons for failure may become part of the
13	prosecutor's records.
14	(7) The diversion project shall maintain sufficient records so that the
15	reasons for success or failure of the program in particular cases and overall can
16	be investigated by program staff.
17	(8) Diversion projects shall be set up to respect the rights of participants.
18	(9) Each participant shall pay a fee to the local juvenile court diversion
19	project. The amount of the fee shall be determined by project officers based
20	upon the financial capabilities of the participant. The fee shall not exceed
21	\$150.00. The fee shall be a debt due from the participant, and payment of such

1	shall be required for successful completion of the Program. Notwithstanding
2	32 V.S.A. § 502(a), fees collected under this subdivision shall be retained and
3	used solely for the purpose of the Court Diversion Program.
4	Juvenile pre-charge diversion policy required. In order for a county's
5	community-based restorative justice provider to be eligible to receive pre-
6	charge diversion referrals pursuant to this section, each State's Attorney's
7	office shall adopt a juvenile pre-charge diversion referral policy. To encourage
8	fair and consistent juvenile pre-charge diversion referral policies and methods
9	statewide, the Department of State's Attorneys and Sheriffs and the
10	Community Justice Unit shall publicly post the policies adopted by each
11	State's Attorney's office.
12	(2) Juvenile pre-charge diversion policy contents. A county's State's
13	Attorney's juvenile pre-charge diversion program policy shall include the
14	following:
15	(A) A list of offenses that presumptively qualify for juvenile pre-
16	charge diversion.
17	(B) Any additional criteria to determine whether a child or youth is
18	eligible to participate in juvenile pre-charge diversion.
19	(C) The appropriate documentation to accompany a referral to
20	juvenile pre-charge diversion, including the name and contact information of
21	the child or youth and the child or youth's parent or legal guardian; the name

1	and contact information of the victim or victims; and a factual statement or
2	affidavit of probable cause of the alleged incident.
3	(D) A procedure for returning a case to the law enforcement agency
4	or the prosecutor, including when:
5	(i) the prosecutor withdraws any juvenile pre-charge referral from
6	the juvenile pre-charge diversion program;
7	(ii) the community-based restorative justice provider determines
8	that the matter is not appropriate for juvenile pre-charge programming; and
9	(iii) when a child or youth does not successfully complete juvenile
10	pre-charge diversion programming.
11	(E) A statement reiterating that the State's Attorney retains final
12	discretion over the cases that are eligible for diversion and may deviate from
13	the adopted policy in accordance with such discretion.
14	(3) Juvenile post-charge diversion requirements. Each State's Attorney,
15	in cooperation with the Office of the Attorney General and the juvenile post-
16	charge diversion program, shall develop clear criteria for deciding what types
17	of offenses and offenders will be eligible for diversion; however, the State's
18	Attorney shall retain final discretion over the referral of each case for
19	diversion. All juvenile post-charge diversion programs receiving financial
20	assistance from the Attorney General shall adhere to the following:

1	(A) The juvenile post-charge diversion program for children or youth
2	shall only accept individuals against whom a petition has been filed and the
3	court has found probable cause, but are not adjudicated.
4	(B) A prosecutor may refer a child or youth to diversion either before
5	or after a preliminary hearing and shall notify in writing to the diversion
6	program and the court of the prosecutor's referral to diversion.
7	(C) If a child or youth is charged with a qualifying crime as defined
8	in 13 V.S.A. § 7601(4)(A) and the crime is a misdemeanor, the prosecutor
9	shall provide the child or youth with the opportunity to participate in the court
10	diversion program unless the prosecutor states on the record at the preliminary
11	hearing or a subsequent hearing why a referral to the post-charge program
12	would not serve the ends of justice. Factors considered in the ends-of-justice
13	determination include the child's or youth's delinquency record, the views of
14	the alleged victim or victims, and the need for probationary supervision.
15	(D) Notwithstanding this subsection (c), the diversion program may
16	accept cases pursuant to 33 V.S.A. §§ 5225(c) and 5280(e).
17	(d) The Attorney General is authorized to accept grants and gifts for the
18	purposes of this section, such acceptance being pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5.
19	Confidentiality.

1	(1) The matter shall become confidential when notice of a pre-charge
2	referral is provided to the juvenile diversion program, or when notice of a post-
3	charge referral is provided to the court.
4	(2) All information related to any offense gathered in the course of the
5	juvenile diversion process shall be held strictly confidential and shall not be
6	released without the participant's prior consent.
7	(3) Information related to any offense that a person divulges in
8	preparation for, during, or as a follow-up to the provision of the juvenile
9	diversion programming shall not be used against the person in any criminal,
10	civil, family, juvenile or administrative investigation, prosecution, or case for
11	any purpose, including impeachment or cross-examination. However, the fact
12	of participation and success, or reasons for failure, may become part of the
13	prosecutor's records. This subsection shall not be construed to prohibit the
14	limited disclosure or use of information to specific persons in the following
15	circumstances:
16	(A) Where there is a threat or statement of a plan that a person may
17	reasonably believe is likely to result in death or bodily injury to themselves or
18	others or damage to the property of another person.
19	(B) When disclosure is necessary to report bodily harm any party
20	causes another during restorative justice programming.

1	(C) Where there is a reasonable suspicion of abuse or neglect of a
2	child or vulnerable adult and a report is made pursuant to the provisions of
3	33 V.S.A. § 4914 or 33 V.S.A. § 6903 or to comply with any law.
4	(D) Where a court or administrative tribunal determines that the
5	materials were submitted by a participant in the program for the purpose of
6	avoiding discovery of the material in a court or administrative proceeding. If a
7	participant wishes to avail themselves of this provision, the participant may
8	disclose this information in camera to a judicial officer for the purposes of
9	seeking such a ruling.
10	(4)(A) Notwithstanding subdivision (2) of this subsection (d), if law
11	enforcement or the prosecutor refers a case to diversion, upon the victim's
12	request, the juvenile diversion program shall provide information relating to
13	the conditions of the diversion contract regarding the victim, progress made on
14	such conditions, and information that assists with obtaining the victim's
15	compensation.
16	(B) Victim information that is not part of the public record shall not
17	be released without the victim's prior consent.
18	(C) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a victim's
19	exercise of rights as otherwise provided by law.
20	(e) <u>Rights and responsibilities.</u>

1	(1) Within 30 days after the two-year anniversary of a successful
2	completion of juvenile diversion, the court shall provide notice to all parties of
3	record of the court's intention to order the expungement of all court files and
4	records, law enforcement records other than entries in the juvenile court
5	diversion program's centralized filing system, fingerprints, and photographs
6	applicable to the proceeding. However, the court shall not order expungement
7	if the participant does not satisfy each of subdivisions (A)-(D) of this
8	subdivision. The court shall give the State's Attorney an opportunity for a
9	hearing to contest the expungement of the records. The court shall expunge
10	the records if it finds:
11	(A) two years have elapsed since the successful completion of
12	juvenile diversion by the participant;
13	(B) the participant has not been convicted of a subsequent felony or
14	misdemeanor during the two-year period, and no proceedings are pending
15	seeking such conviction;
16	(C) rehabilitation of the participant has been attained to the
17	satisfaction of the court; and
18	(D) the participant does not owe restitution related to the case. Juvenile
19	court diversion programs shall be set up to respect the rights of participants.
20	(2) The court may expunge any records that were sealed pursuant to this
21	subsection prior to July 1, 2018 unless the State's Attorney's office that

1	prosecuted the case objects. Thirty days prior to expunging a record pursuant
2	to this subdivision, the court shall provide written notice of its intent to
3	expunge the record to the State's Attorney's office that prosecuted the case.
4	(A) Diversion candidates shall be informed of their right to the
5	advice, assistance, and access to private counsel or the public defender at all
6	stages of the diversion process, including the initial decision to participate and
7	the decision to accept the juvenile diversion contract, so that the candidate may
8	give informed consent.
9	(B) For the pre-charge diversion program, notwithstanding the
10	financial need determination pursuant to 13 V.S.A. § 5236, the diversion
11	program shall inform the candidate that a public defender is available for
12	consultation at public expense upon the request of the candidate.
13	(3)(A) The court shall keep a special index of cases that have been
14	expunged pursuant to this section together with the expungement order. The
15	index shall list only the name of the person convicted of the offense, his or her
16	date of birth, the docket number, and the criminal offense that was the subject
17	of the expungement.
18	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
19	(A) of this subdivision (3) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
20	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
21	limits access to authorized persons.

1	(C) Inspection of the expungement order and the certificate may be
2	permitted only upon petition by the person who is the subject of the case. The
3	Chief Superior Judge may permit special access to the index and the
4	documents for research purposes pursuant to the rules for public access to
5	<del>court records.</del>
6	(D) The Court Administrator shall establish policies for implementing
7	this subsection (e). Information related to the present offense that is divulged
8	during the juvenile diversion program shall not be used against the child or
9	youth in the child's or youth's case for any purpose, including impeachment or
10	cross-examination. However, the fact of participation and success, or reasons
11	for failure, may become part of the prosecutor's records.
12	(4) Any victims shall be notified of the victim's rights and role in the
13	pre-charge diversion process, including notification of a candidate's referral to
14	the pre-charge diversion program by the pre-charge diversion program.
15	(f) Except as otherwise provided in this section, upon the entry of an order
16	expunging files and records under this section, the proceedings in the matter
17	shall be considered never to have occurred, all index references thereto shall be
18	deleted, and the participant, the court, and law enforcement officers and
19	departments shall reply to any request for information that no record exists
20	with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies of the order shall

1	be sent to each agency or official named therein. Records; deletion and
2	expungement.
3	(1) Pre-charge diversion records deletion.
4	(A) Not later than 10 days after the successful completion of the pre-
5	charge diversion program, the juvenile diversion program shall notify the
6	victim, law enforcement agency, and the State's Attorney office of the
7	participant's successful completion. Payment of restitution is required for
8	successful completion.
9	(B) Two years after the diversion program notifies the State's
10	Attorney office of the participant's successful completion, the Attorney
11	General shall provide a certified notice that all records held by the diversion
12	program shall be deleted.
13	(C) Two years after the diversion program notifies the law
14	enforcement agency and the State's Attorney office of the participant's
15	successful completion, the Attorney General shall provide a certified notice
16	that all public records held by the law enforcement agency and the State's
17	Attorney office shall be deleted. Public records do not include the Valcour
18	database or other similar nonpublic law enforcement databases.
19	(2) Pre-charge diversion case index.
20	(A) The Community Justice Unit shall keep a special index of pre-
21	charge diversion cases that have been deleted pursuant to this section together

1	with the notice of deletion provided by the Attorney General. The index shall
2	list only the name of the diversion participant, the individual's date of birth, a
3	case number, date of case closure, location of programming, and the offense
4	that was the subject of the deletion.
5	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
6	(A) of this subdivision (2) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
7	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
8	limits access to authorized persons.
9	(C) Inspection of the certified notice may be permitted only upon
10	request by the person who is the subject of the case. The Attorney General
11	may permit special access to the index and the documents for research
12	purposes pursuant to subdivision (g)(2) of this section.
13	(D) The Community Justice Unit shall establish policies for
14	implementing subsections (1)-(4) of this subsection (f).
15	(3) Effect of Deletion. Except as otherwise provided in this section,
16	upon the certified notice to delete files and records under this section, the
17	matter shall be considered never to have occurred; all index references thereto
18	shall be deleted; and the participant, the Community Justice Unite, law
19	enforcement officers and departments, prosecutors, the referring entity, and the
20	diversion program shall reply to any request for information that no record

1	exists with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies of the
2	certified notice shall be sent to each agency, entity, or official named therein.
3	(4) Deletion Applicability. The process of automatically deleting
4	records as provided in this section shall only apply to those persons who
5	completed pre-charge diversion on or after July 1, 2025. Any person who
6	completed pre-charge diversion prior to July 1, 2025 must apply to the court to
7	have the person's records deleted. Deletion shall occur if the requirements of
8	subdivisions (1)–(3) of this subsection (f) are met.
9	(5) Post-charge diversion records expungement. Within 30 days after
10	the two-year anniversary of a successful completion of juvenile post-charge
11	diversion, the court shall provide notice to all parties of record of the court's
12	intention to order the expungement of all court files and records, law
13	enforcement records, fingerprints, and photographs other than entries in the
14	court diversion program's centralized filing system applicable to the
15	proceeding. However, the court shall not order expungement if the participant
16	does not satisfy each of subdivisions (A)–(C) of this subdivision. The court
17	shall give the State's Attorney an opportunity for a hearing to contest the
18	expungement of the records. The court shall expunge the records if it finds:
19	(A) two years have elapsed since the successful completion of the
20	juvenile post-charge diversion program by the participant;

1	(B) the participant has not been convicted of a subsequent felony or
2	misdemeanor during the two-year period, and no proceedings are pending
3	seeking such conviction; and
4	(C) the participant does not owe restitution related to the case.
5	(6) Expungement of sealed records. The court may expunge any records
6	that were sealed pursuant to this subsection prior to July 1, 2018 unless the
7	State's Attorney's office that prosecuted the case objects. Thirty days prior to
8	expunging a record pursuant to this subdivision, the court shall provide written
9	notice of its intent to expunge the record to the State's Attorney's office that
10	prosecuted the case.
11	(7) Post-charge diversion case index.
12	(A) The court and the Office of the Attorney General shall keep a
13	special index of post-charge diversion cases that have been expunged pursuant
14	to this section together with the expungement order. The index shall list only
15	the name of the person convicted of the offense, the person's date of birth, the
16	docket number, date of case closure, the court of jurisdiction, and the offense
17	that was the subject of the expungement.
18	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
19	(A) of this subdivision (7) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
20	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
21	limits access to authorized persons.

1	(C) Inspection of the expungement order and the certificate may be
2	permitted only upon petition by the person who is the subject of the case. The
3	Chief Superior Judge may permit special access to the index and the
4	documents for research purposes pursuant to the rules for public access to
5	court records.
6	(D) The Court Administrator shall establish policies for
7	implementing subdivisions (5)-(9) of this subsection (f).
8	(8) Effect of Expungement. Except as otherwise provided in this
9	section, upon the entry of an order expunging files and records under this
10	section, the proceedings in the matter shall be considered never to have
11	occurred; all index references thereto shall be deleted; and the participant, the
12	court, law enforcement officers and departments, prosecutors, the referring
13	entity, and the diversion program shall reply to any request for information that
14	no record exists with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies
15	of the order shall be sent to each agency, entity, or official named therein.
16	(9) Expungement Applicability. The process of automatically
17	expunging records as provided in this section shall only apply to those persons
18	who completed diversion on or after July 1, 2002. Any person who completed
19	diversion prior to July 1, 2002 must apply to the court to have the person's
20	records expunged. Expungement shall occur if the requirements of
21	subdivisions (5)–(8) of this subsection (f) are met.

1	(g) The process of automatically expunging records as provided in this
2	section shall only apply to those persons who completed diversion on or after
3	July 1, 2002. Any person who completed diversion prior to July 1, 2002 must
4	apply to the court to have his or her records expunged. Expungement shall
5	occur if the requirements of subsection (e) of this section are met.
6	(h) Subject to the approval of the Attorney General, the Vermont
7	Association of Court Diversion Programs may develop and administer
8	programs to assist persons under this section charged with delinquent,
9	eriminal, and civil offenses
10	(i) Notwithstanding subdivision (c)(1) of this section, the diversion
11	program may accept cases from the Youth Substance Awareness Safety
12	Program pursuant to 7 V.S.A. § 656 or 18 V.S.A. § 4230b. The confidentiality
13	provisions of this section shall become effective when a notice of violation is
14	issued under 7 V.S.A. § 656(b) or 18 V.S.A. § 4230b(b) and shall remain in
15	effect unless the person fails to register with or complete the Youth Substance
16	Awareness Safety Program.
17	(j) Notwithstanding subdivision (c)(1) of this section, the diversion
18	program may accept cases pursuant to 33 V.S.A. §§ 5225–5280. Public
19	records act exemption.

1	(1) Except as otherwise provided by this section, any records or
2	information produced or acquired pursuant to this section shall be exempt from
3	public inspection or copying under Vermont's Public Records Act.
4	(2) Notwithstanding subdivision (1) of this subsection, a law
5	enforcement agency, State's Attorney office, court, or community-based
6	restorative justice provider may disclose information to colleges, universities,
7	public agencies of the State, and nonprofit research organizations that a
8	community-based restorative justice provider has agreements with for use in
9	connection with research projects of a public service nature, but no person
10	associated with those institutions or agencies may disclose that information in
11	any manner that would reveal the identity of an individual who provided the
12	information to the community-based restorative justice provider.
13	§ 164. ADULT COURT DIVERSION PROGRAM
14	(a) <u>Purpose.</u>
15	(1) The Attorney General shall develop and administer an adult court
16	diversion program, for both pre-charge and post-charge referrals, in all
17	counties. In consultation with diversion programs, the Attorney General shall
18	adopt a policies and procedures manual in compliance with this section.
19	(2) The program shall be designed to provide a restorative option for
20	persons alleged to have caused harm in violation of a criminal statute or who
21	have been charged with violating a criminal statute as well as for victims or

1	those acting on a victim's behalf who have been allegedly harmed by the
2	responsible party. The diversion program can accept referrals to the program
3	<u>as follows:</u>
4	(A) Pre-charge by law enforcement or prosecutors pursuant to a
5	policy adopted in accordance with subdivisions (c)(1)-(2) of this section.
6	(B) Post-charge by prosecutors for persons charged with a first or a
7	second misdemeanor or a first nonviolent felony, or other offenses as the
8	prosecutor deems appropriate, pursuant to subdivision (c)(3) of this section.
9	(C) Post-charge by prosecutors of persons who have been charged
10	with an offense and who have substance abuse or mental health treatment
11	needs regardless of the person's prior criminal history record, except a person
12	charged with a felony offense that is a crime listed in 13 V.S.A. § 5301(7) shall
13	not be eligible under this section. Persons who have attained 18 years of age

5	of the Defender General, the Center for Crime Victim Services, the Judiciary,
6	and the Division of Racial Justice Statistics of the Office of Racial Equity,
7	report annually on or before December 1 to the General Assembly on services
8	provided and outcome indicators. As components of the report required by this
9	subsection, the Attorney General shall include data on the number of pre-
10	charge and post-charge diversion program referrals in each county; race,
11	gender, age, and other demographic variables, whenever possible; offenses
12	charged and crime types; successful completion rates; and possible causes of
13	any geographical disparities.
14	(4) The Attorney General is authorized to accept grants and gifts for the
15	purposes of this section, such acceptance being pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5.
16	(5) In consultation with community-based restorative justice providers,
17	the Center for Crime Victims Services, the Department of State's Attorneys
18	and Sheriffs' Victim Advocates, the Division for Racial Justice Statistics of the
19	Office of Racial Equity, and the State Archivist, the Attorney General shall
20	adopt a policies and procedures manual for community-based restorative
21	justice providers to promote a uniform system across the State in compliance

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1	with this section. The manual shall include the following policies and
2	procedures related to:
3	(A) informing victims of their rights and role in pre-charge and post-
4	charge diversion, including that such information is available in writing upon
5	request;
6	(B) the timely notification victims of a referral to pre-charge and
7	post-charge diversion;
8	(C) an invitation to victims to engage in the restorative process;
9	(D) how to share information with a victim concerning a restorative
10	agreement's conditions related to the victim and any progress made on such
11	conditions;
12	(E) best practices for collecting data from all parties that engage with
13	the pre-charge and post-charge diversion programs; and
14	(F) confidentiality expectations for all parties who engage in the
15	restorative process.
16	(c) The program shall support the operation of diversion programs in
17	local communities through grants of financial assistance to, or contracts for
18	services with, municipalities, private groups, or other local organizations. The
19	Attorney General may require local financial contributions as a condition of
20	receipt of program funding. Adult diversion program policy and referral
21	requirements.

1	(1) Adult pre-charge diversion policy required. In order for a county's
2	community-based restorative justice provider to be eligible to receive referrals
3	pursuant to this section, each State's Attorney's office shall adopt an adult pre-
4	charge diversion referral policy. To encourage fair and consistent pre-charge
5	and post-charge diversion referral policies and methods statewide, the
6	Department of State's Attorneys and Sheriffs and the Community Justice Unit
7	shall publicly post the policies adopted by each State's Attorney's office.
8	(2) Adult pre-charge diversion policy contents. A county's State's
9	Attorney's pre-charge diversion program policy shall include the following:
10	(A) a list of offenses that presumptively qualify for pre-charge
11	diversion;
12	(B) additional criteria to determine whether a responsible party is
13	eligible to participate in pre-charge diversion;
14	(C) appropriate documentation to accompany a referral to pre-charge
15	diversion, including the name and contact information of the responsible party
16	the name and contact information of the victim or victims, and a factual
17	statement or affidavit of probable cause of the alleged offense;
18	(D) a procedure for returning a case to the law enforcement agency or
19	the prosecutor, including when:
20	(i) the prosecutor withdraws a pre-charge referral from the
21	diversion program;

1	(ii) the community-based restorative justice provider determines
2	that the matter is not appropriate for pre-charge programming; and
3	(iii) a person does not successfully complete pre-charge diversion
4	programming; and
5	(E) a statement reiterating that the State's Attorney retains final
6	discretion over the cases that are eligible for diversion and may deviate from
7	the adopted policy in accordance with such discretion.
8	(3) Adult post-charge diversion requirements. Each State's Attorney, in
9	cooperation with the Office of the Attorney General and the adult post-charge
10	diversion program, shall develop clear criteria for deciding what types of
11	offenses and offenders will be eligible for diversion; however, the State's
12	Attorney shall retain final discretion over the referral of each case for
13	diversion. All adult post-charge diversion programs receiving financial
14	assistance from the Attorney General shall adhere to the following:
15	(A) The post-charge diversion program for adults shall only accept
16	person against whom charges have been filed and the court has found probable
17	cause, but are not adjudicated.
18	(B) A prosecutor may refer a person to diversion either before or
19	after arraignment and shall notify in writing the diversion program and the
20	court of the prosecutor's of the referral to diversion.

1	(C) If a person is charged with a qualifying crime as defined in
2	13 V.S.A. § 7601(4)(A) and the crime is a misdemeanor, the prosecutor shall
3	provide the person with the opportunity to participate in the court diversion
4	program unless the prosecutor states on the record at arraignment or a
5	subsequent hearing why a referral to the post-charge program would not serve
6	the ends of justice. Factors considered in the ends-of-justice determination
7	include the person's criminal record, the views of any victims, or the need for
8	probationary supervision.
9	(D) Notwithstanding this subsection (c), the diversion program may
10	accept cases pursuant to 33 V.S.A. §§ 5225 and 5280.
11	(d) The Office of the Attorney General shall develop program outcomes
12	following the designated State of Vermont performance accountability
13	framework and, in consultation with the Department of State's Attorneys and
14	Sheriffs, the Office of the Defender General, the Center for Crime Victim
15	Services, and the Judiciary, report annually on or before December 1 to the
16	General Assembly on services provided and outcome indicators. As a
17	component of the report required by this subsection, the Attorney General shall
18	include data on diversion program referrals in each county and possible causes
19	of any geographical disparities. Confidentiality.
20	(1) The matter shall become confidential when notice of a pre-charge
21	referral is provided to the diversion program, or when notice of a post-charge

1	referral is provided to the court. However, persons who are subject to
2	conditions of release imposed pursuant to 13 V.S.A. § 7554 and who are
3	referred to diversion pursuant to subdivision (a)(2)(C) of this section, the
4	matter shall become confidential upon the successful completion of diversion.
5	(2) All information gathered in the course of the adult diversion process
6	shall be held strictly confidential and shall not be released without the
7	participant's prior consent.
8	(3) Information related to any offense that a person divulges in
9	preparation for, during, or as a follow-up to the provision of the adult diversion
10	programming shall not be used against the person in any criminal, civil, family,
11	juvenile or administrative investigation, prosecution, or case for any purpose,
12	including impeachment or cross-examination. However, the fact of
13	participation and success, or reasons for failure, may become part of the
14	prosecutor's records. This subsection shall not be construed to prohibit the
15	limited disclosure or use of information to specific persons in the following
16	circumstances:
17	(A) Where there is a threat or statement of a plan that a person may
18	reasonably believe is likely to result in death or bodily injury to themselves or
19	others or damage to the property of another person.
20	(B) when disclosure is necessary to report bodily harm any party
21	causes another during restorative justice programming.

1	(C) Where there is a reasonable suspicion of abuse or neglect of a
2	child or vulnerable adult and a report is made pursuant to the provisions of
3	33 V.S.A. § 4914 or 33 V.S.A. § 6903 or to comply with any law.
4	(D) Where a court or administrative tribunal determines that the
5	materials were submitted by a participant in the program for the purpose of
6	avoiding discovery of the material in a court or administrative proceeding. If a
7	participant wishes to avail themselves of this provision, the participant may
8	disclose this information in camera to a judicial officer for the purposes of
9	seeking such a ruling.
10	(4)(A) Notwithstanding subdivision (2) of this subsection (d), if law
11	enforcement or the prosecutor refers a case to diversion, upon the victim's
12	request, the adult diversion program shall provide information relating to the
13	conditions of the diversion contract regarding the victim, progress made on
14	such conditions, and information that assists with obtaining the victim's
15	compensation.
16	(B) Victim information that is not part of the public record shall not
17	be released without the victim's prior consent.
18	(C) Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a victim's
19	exercise of rights as otherwise provided by law.

1	(e) All adult court diversion programs receiving financial assistance from
2	the Attorney General shall adhere to the following provisions: Rights and
3	responsibilities.
4	(1) The diversion program shall accept only persons against whom
5	charges have been filed and the court has found probable cause, but are not yet
6	adjudicated. The prosecuting attorney may refer a person to diversion either
7	before or after arraignment and shall notify in writing the diversion program
8	and the court of his or her intention to refer the person to diversion. The matter
9	shall become confidential when notice is provided to the court, except that for
10	persons who are subject to conditions of release imposed pursuant to 13 V.S.A.
11	§ 7554 and who are referred to diversion pursuant to subdivision (b)(2) of this
12	section, the matter shall become confidential upon the successful completion of
13	diversion. If a person is charged with a qualifying crime as defined in
14	13 V.S.A. § 7601(4)(A) and the crime is a misdemeanor, the prosecutor shall
15	provide the person with the opportunity to participate in the court diversion
16	program unless the prosecutor states on the record at arraignment or a
17	subsequent hearing why a referral to the program would not serve the ends of
18	justice. If the prosecuting attorney prosecutor refers a case to diversion, the
19	prosecuting attorney prosecutor may release information to the victim upon a
20	showing of legitimate need and subject to an appropriate protective agreement
21	defining the purpose for which the information is being released and in all

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1	other respects maintaining the confidentiality of the information; otherwise,
2	files held by the court, the prosecuting attorney prosecutor, and the law
3	enforcement agency related to the charges shall be confidential and shall
4	remain confidential unless:
5	(A) the diversion program declines to accept the case;
6	(B) the person declines to participate in diversion;
7	(C) the diversion program accepts the case, but the person does not
8	successfully complete diversion; or
9	(D) the prosecuting attorney prosecutor recalls the referral to
10	diversion. Adult court diversion programs shall be set up to respect the rights
11	of participants.
12	(2) Alleged offenders shall be informed of their right to the advice and
13	assistance of private counsel or the public defender at all stages of the
14	diversion process, including the initial decision to participate, and the decision
15	to accept the adult diversion contract, so that the candidate may give informed
16	<del>consent.</del>
17	(A) Diversion candidates shall be informed of their right to the
18	advice, assistance, and access to private counsel or the public defender at all
19	stages of the diversion process, including the initial decision to participate and
20	the decision to accept the diversion contract, so that the candidate may give
21	informed consent.

1	(B) For the pre-charge diversion program, notwithstanding the
2	financial need determination pursuant to 13 V.S.A. § 5236, the diversion
3	program shall inform the candidate that a public defender is available for
4	consultation at public expense upon the request of the diversion candidate.
5	(3) The participant shall be informed that his or her selection of the adult
6	diversion contract is voluntary. The candidate shall be informed that
7	participation in the diversion program is voluntary.
8	(4) Each State's Attorney, in cooperation with the Office of the Attorney
9	General and the adult court diversion program, shall develop clear criteria for
10	deciding what types of offenses and offenders will be eligible for diversion;
11	however, the State's Attorney shall retain final discretion over the referral of
12	each case for diversion.
13	(5) All information gathered in the course of the adult diversion process
14	shall be held strictly confidential and shall not be released without the
15	participant's prior consent (except that research and reports that do not
16	establish the identity of individual participants are allowed).
17	(A) The pre-charge and post-charge diversion programs may charge
18	fees to its participants, which shall be paid to the local adult court diversion
19	program. If a fee is charged, it shall be determined by program officers or
20	employees based upon the financial capabilities of the participant. The fee

1	shall not exceed \$300.00. Any fee charged shall be a debt due from the
2	participant.
3	(B) Notwithstanding 32 V.S.A. § 502(a), fees collected pursuant to
4	this subdivision (4) shall be retained and used solely for the purpose of the
5	adult court diversion program.
6	(6)(5) Information related to the present offense that is divulged during
7	the adult diversion program shall not be used against the person in the person's
8	criminal or juvenile case for any purpose, including impeachment or cross-
9	examination. However, the fact of participation and success, or reasons for
10	failure, may become part of the prosecutor's records. Any victims shall be
11	notified of the victim's rights and role in the pre-charge diversion process,
12	including notification of a candidate's referral to the pre-charge diversion
13	program by the pre-charge diversion program.
14	(7)(A) Irrespective of whether a record was expunged, the adult court
15	diversion program shall maintain sufficient records so that the reasons for
16	success or failure of the program in particular cases and overall can be
17	investigated by program staff. These records shall include a centralized
18	statewide filing system that will include the following information about
19	individuals who have successfully completed an adult court diversion program:
20	(i) name and date of birth;
21	(ii) offense charged and date of offense;

1	(iii) place of residence;
2	(iv) county where diversion process took place; and
3	(v) date of completion of diversion process.
4	(B) These records shall not be available to anyone other than the
5	participant and his or her attorney, State's Attorneys, the Attorney General,
6	and directors of adult court diversion programs.
7	(C) Notwithstanding subdivision (B) of this subdivision (e)(7), the
8	Attorney General shall, upon request, provide to a participant or his or her
9	attorney sufficient documentation to show that the participant successfully
10	completed diversion.
11	(8) Adult court diversion programs shall be set up to respect the rights of
12	participants.
13	(9) Each participant shall pay a fee to the local adult court diversion
14	program. The amount of the fee shall be determined by program officers or
15	employees based upon the financial capabilities of the participant. The fee
16	shall not exceed \$300.00. The fee shall be a debt due from the participant, and
17	payment of such shall be required for successful completion of the program.
18	Notwithstanding 32 V.S.A. § 502(a), fees collected under this subdivision shall
19	be retained and used solely for the purpose of the court diversion program.

1	(f) The Attorney General is authorized to accept grants and gifts for the
2	purposes of this section, such acceptance being pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5.
3	Records; deletion and expungement.
4	(1) Pre-charge diversion records deletion.
5	(A) Not later than 10 days after the successful completion of the pre-
6	charge diversion program, the juvenile diversion program shall notify the
7	victim, law enforcement agency, and the State's Attorney office of the
8	participant's successful completion. Payment of restitution is required for
9	successful completion.
10	(B) Two years after the diversion program notifies the State's
11	Attorney office of the participant's successful completion, the Attorney
12	General shall provide a certified notice that all records held by the diversion
13	program shall be deleted.
14	(C) Two years after the diversion program notifies the law
15	enforcement agency and the State's Attorney office of the participant's
16	successful completion, the Attorney General shall provide a certified notice
17	that all public records held by the law enforcement agency and the State's
18	Attorney office shall be deleted. Public records do not include the Valcour
19	database or other similar nonpublic law enforcement databases.
20	(2) Pre-charge diversion case index.

1	(A) The Community Justice Unit shall keep a special index of pre-
2	charge diversion cases that have been deleted pursuant to this section together
3	with the notice of deletion provided by the Attorney General. The index shall
4	list only the name of the diversion participant, the individual's date of birth, a
5	case number, date of case closure, location of programming, and the offense
6	that was the subject of the deletion.
7	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
8	(A) of this subdivision (2) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
9	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
10	limits access to authorized persons.
11	(C) Inspection of the certified notice may be permitted only upon
12	request by the person who is the subject of the case. The Attorney General
13	may permit special access to the index and the documents for research
14	purposes pursuant to subdivision $(g)(2)$ of this section.
15	(D) The Community Justice Unit shall establish policies for
16	implementing subsections (1)-(4) of this subsection (f).
17	(3) Effect of Deletion. Except as otherwise provided in this section,
18	upon the certified notice to delete files and records under this section, the
19	matter shall be considered never to have occurred; all index references thereto
20	shall be deleted; and the participant, the Community Justice Unit, law
21	enforcement officers and departments, prosecutors, the referring entity, and the

1	diversion program shall reply to any request for information that no record
2	exists with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies of the
3	certified notice shall be sent to each agency, entity, or official named therein.
4	(4) Deletion Applicability. The process of automatically deleting
5	records as provided in this section shall only apply to those persons who
6	completed pre-charge diversion on or after July 1, 2025. Any person who
7	completed pre-charge diversion prior to July 1, 2025 must apply to the court to
8	have the person's records deleted. Deletion shall occur if the requirements of
9	subdivisions (1)–(3) of this subsection (f) are met.
10	(5) Post-charge diversion records expungement. Within 30 days after
11	the two-year anniversary of a successful completion of adult post-charge
12	diversion, the court shall provide notice to all parties of record of the court's
13	intention to order the expungement of all court files and records, law
14	enforcement records, fingerprints, and photographs other than entries in the
15	adult court diversion program's centralized filing system applicable to the
16	proceeding. However, the court shall not order expungement if the participant
17	does not satisfy each of subdivisions (A)–(C) of this subdivision. The court
18	shall give the State's Attorney an opportunity for a hearing to contest the
19	expungement of the records. The court shall expunge the records if it finds:
20	(A) two years have elapsed since the successful completion of the
21	adult post-charge diversion program by the participant;

1	(B) the participant has not been convicted of a subsequent felony or
2	misdemeanor during the two-year period, and no proceedings are pending
3	seeking such conviction; and
4	(C) the participant does not owe restitution related to the case.
5	(6) Expungement of sealed records. The court may expunge any records
6	that were sealed pursuant to this subsection prior to July 1, 2018 unless the
7	State's Attorney's office that prosecuted the case objects. Thirty days prior to
8	expunging a record pursuant to this subdivision, the court shall provide written
9	notice of its intent to expunge the record to the State's Attorney's office that
10	prosecuted the case.
11	(7) Post-charge diversion case index.
12	(A) The court and the Office of the Attorney General shall keep a
13	special index of post-charge diversion cases that have been expunged pursuant
14	to this section together with the expungement order. The index shall list only
15	the name of the person convicted of the offense, the person's date of birth, the
16	docket number, date of case closure, location of programming, and the
17	criminal offense that was the subject of the expungement.
18	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
19	(A) of this subdivision (7) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
20	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
21	limits access to authorized persons.

1	(C) Inspection of the expungement order and the certificate may be
2	permitted only upon petition by the person who is the subject of the case. The
3	Chief Superior Judge may permit special access to the index and the
4	documents for research purposes pursuant to the rules for public access to
5	court records.
6	(D) The Court Administrator shall establish policies for
7	implementing subdivisions (5)-(9) of this subsection (f).
8	(8) Effect of Expungement. Except as otherwise provided in this
9	section, upon the entry of an order expunging files and records under this
10	section, the proceedings in the matter shall be considered never to have
11	occurred; all index references thereto shall be deleted; and the participant, the
12	court, law enforcement officers and departments, prosecutors, the referring
13	entity, and the diversion program shall reply to any request for information that
14	no record exists with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies
15	of the order shall be sent to each agency, entity, or official named therein.
16	(9) Expungement Applicability. The process of automatically
17	expunging records as provided in this section shall only apply to those persons
18	who completed diversion on or after July 1, 2002. Any person who completed
19	diversion prior to July 1, 2002 must apply to the court to have the person's
20	records expunged. Expungement shall occur if the requirements of this
21	subsection (f) are met.

1	(g) <u>Public records act exemption.</u>
2	(1) Within 30 days after the two-year anniversary of a successful
3	completion of adult diversion, the court shall provide notice to all parties of
4	record of the court's intention to order the expungement of all court files and
5	records, law enforcement records other than entries in the adult court diversion
6	program's centralized filing system, fingerprints, and photographs applicable
7	to the proceeding. However, the court shall not order expungement if the
8	participant does not satisfy each of subdivisions (A) (D) of this subdivision.
9	The court shall give the State's Attorney an opportunity for a hearing to contest
10	the expungement of the records. The court shall expunge the records if it
11	<del>finds:</del>
12	(A) two years have elapsed since the successful completion of the
13	adult diversion program by the participant;
14	(B) the participant has not been convicted of a subsequent felony or
15	misdemeanor during the two-year period, and no proceedings are pending
16	seeking such conviction;
17	(C) rehabilitation of the participant has been attained to the
18	satisfaction of the court; and
19	(D) the participant does not owe restitution related to the case.
20	Except as otherwise provided in this section, any records or information
21	produced or acquired pursuant to this section shall be exempt from public

1	inspection or copying under Vermont's Public Records Act and shall be kept
2	confidential.
3	(2) The court may expunge any records that were sealed pursuant to this
4	subsection prior to July 1, 2018 unless the State's Attorney's office that
5	prosecuted the case objects. Thirty days prior to expunging a record pursuant
6	to this subdivision, the court shall provide written notice of its intent to
7	expunge the record to the State's Attorney's office that prosecuted the case.
8	Notwithstanding subdivision (1) of this subsection, a law enforcement agency,
9	State's Attorney office, court, or community-based restorative justice provider
10	may disclose information to colleges, universities, public agencies of the State,
11	and nonprofit research organizations that a community-based restorative
12	justice provider has agreements with for use in connection with research
13	projects of a public service nature, but no person associated with those
14	institutions or agencies may disclose that information in any manner that
15	would reveal the identity of an individual who provided the information to the
16	community-based restorative justice provider.
17	(3)(A) The court shall keep a special index of cases that have been
18	expunged pursuant to this section together with the expungement order. The
19	index shall list only the name of the person convicted of the offense, his or her
20	date of birth, the docket number, and the criminal offense that was the subject
21	of the expungement.

1	(B) The special index and related documents specified in subdivision
2	(A) of this subdivision (3) shall be confidential and shall be physically and
3	electronically segregated in a manner that ensures confidentiality and that
4	limits access to authorized persons.
5	(C) Inspection of the expungement order and the certificate may be
6	permitted only upon petition by the person who is the subject of the case. The
7	Chief Superior Judge may permit special access to the index and the
8	documents for research purposes pursuant to the rules for public access to
9	<del>court records.</del>
10	(D) The Court Administrator shall establish policies for
11	implementing this subsection (g).
12	(h) Except as otherwise provided in this section, upon the entry of an order
13	expunging files and records under this section, the proceedings in the matter
14	shall be considered never to have occurred, all index references thereto shall be
15	deleted, and the participant, the court, and law enforcement officers and
16	departments shall reply to any request for information that no record exists
17	with respect to such participant inquiry in any matter. Copies of the order shall
18	be sent to each agency or official named therein.
19	(i) [Repealed.]
20	(j) The process of automatically expunging records as provided in this
21	section shall only apply to those persons who completed diversion on or after

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1	July 1, 2002. Any person who completed diversion prior to July 1, 2002 must
2	apply to the court to have his or her records expunged. Expungement shall
3	occur if the requirements of subsection (g) of this section are met.
4	(k) The Attorney General, in consultation with the Vermont Association of
5	Court Diversion Programs, may develop and administer programs to assist
6	persons under this section charged with delinquent, criminal, and civil
7	offenses.
8	(1) Notwithstanding subdivision (e)(1) of this section, the diversion
9	program may accept cases from the Youth Substance Awareness Safety
