



Charges & Convictions

- Felony charge (detained): 93%
 - Men: **321**
 - Women: 36
- Felony conviction (sentenced): 94%
 - Men: **748**
 - Women: 44
- Agg. assault, sexual assault, murder: ("Felony Serious"): 64%
 - Men: 67% detained / 64% sentenced
 - Women: 45% detained / 49% sentenced
- Violent crime:
 - Men: 79.5% (sentenced)
 - Women: 66% (sentenced)
- Drug crimes only: all felony crimes
 - Men: **2%** (sentenced)
 - Women: 15% (sentenced)


Sentenced Population: Violent Crime Categorization | N= 850







Highest and Lowest Female State Imprisonment Rates (per 100,000 U.S. Female Residents), 2021




Vermont's female incarceration rate ranks 45th nationally, one-third the national rate

CRCF Population by Legal Status



Vermont Female Incarcerated Population: 4 Months



Challenges Facing Female Population



Substance Use

- Individuals at CRCF receiving MOUD: 66%
- Higher percentage of women in Vermont convicted for drug offenses only
 - Research shows women are more than twice as likely in the United States to be incarcerated for a drug offense compared to men

Housing

- Individuals with lived experience and advocates point to lack of transitional and permanent housing as major impediment to successful community reintegration and reentry
- DOC granting JRI funds for women's re-entry and recovery services, including sober housing and intensive trauma-informed outpatient therapy for substance use disorder

Lack of Community Supports

- Reduced Vermont community capacity due to funding and staffing constraints, lack of statewide services
- Women have fewer familial supports than male counterparts while in custody

Inadequate Conditions at Chittenden Regional Correctional Facility

- Outdated and degraded physical infrastructure (50 years old)
 - Facility never designed for sentenced population or long-term habitation
- Issues with cleanliness and habitability and lack of programming space

















- Poor quality of lighting, does not respond to occupants' circadian rhythm
- Poor natural daylight with typical institutional bars on windows
- 3 Mildly therapeutic color scheme
- 4 Rooms are not fully ligature resistant
- 5 Hard institutional furnishings
- 6 Blind corners and inefficient use of space
- Upper bunks are dangerous and difficult to get up to
- 8 Inability to maintain thermal comfort







The female population averages 7.75% of the system ADP over the last 7 years. The percentage has been increasing over the last 3 years consecutively.

Continued Challenges



Staffing

• Vacancies, retention, state workforce demographics, overtime costs

Health & Wellness

- Health conditions of incarcerated individuals, particularly those detained awaiting trial
 - Individuals ingesting fentanyl/polysubstances prior to State custody
 - Sequelae of heavy substance use before arrest
 - 66% of incarcerated population receiving medication for opioid use disorder (MOUD)

DEI & Justice

- Remote hearings and court backlogs
- Paucity of community service providers, particularly for male-identifying individuals

Modernization

- Lack of transitional housing stock/availability
- Deteriorating physical infrastructure
- Antiquated and highly manual data systems (OMS)



Challenges



- Aged, inflexible, outdated infrastructure requiring frequent maintenance
- Six facilities scattered across state creates inefficiencies and high staffing needs
- Beds offline for unit maintenance, staffing vacancies, deferred maintenance, etc.
- Lack of additional capacity in event of emergencies/natural disasters (e.g., flooding)
- Housing gender-diverse individuals within a system designed and built for only two sexes
- Housing juveniles (PREA-mandated sight and sound separation)
- Not all beds residential/general population beds (i.e., booking, mental health, infirmary, restrictive housing/segregation)
- Housing special populations:
 - o SFI, mental health, geriatric, medical needs, honors unit, etc.
- Housing mixed populations:
 - Sentenced, detained, federal holds

Current Landscape




- Types of housing in Vermont correctional facilities:
 - Long-term housing: residential beds (general population or "GP")
 - Temporary housing: special housing (mental health, infirmary, booking),
 restrictive housing
- Average total male-identifying population (including out of state): 1232
 - Vermont average male residential bed capacity: 950
- American Correctional Association (ACA) recommends states not exceed
 85% of total capacity.
- Vermont currently at 127% capacity of male residential beds.

Current Landscape (cont.)



- In prior years, Vermont has relied on temporary measures for additional capacity
 (i.e., housing in gymnasiums) that do not comport with correctional best practices,
 Vermont standards, or DOC values.
- Vermont contracts with out of state correctional facilities to house a small portion of the sentenced population.
 - Contract partners must adhere to DOC Mission, Vision, and Values and policy.
- Historically, more than 700 individuals were housed out of state.
- Reduction in total incarcerated population by nearly 30% since 2015.
- Currently, 126 sentenced male individuals housed at Tallahatchie County
 Correctional Facility (TCCF).
