### Superior Court Judge Positions

- Three Superior Judge Positions
  - Northern Float
  - Statewide Treatment Court Float
  - Statewide Juvenile Docket Float\*

\*in lieu of replacing Judicial Master; funded by Tobacco Settlement Monies

### Court Technology Fund Request

- "Tech Fund" created in 2007 for court tech needs
- Three administrative fees comprise revenue source
- Revenue source has declined significantly
- Court tech needs have increased significantly
- Tech Fund no longer a viable funding source for Judiciary's tech needs


#### Fifteen New Staff Positions

- Ten Judicial Assistants
- Two IT Help Desk Analysts
- Two Centralized Service Analysts
- One Database Administrator
- Potential for \$280,000 savings with new positions versus contracted positions

### Language Access Program

- Judiciary is required to provide court interpreters
- Increased demand for interpreters in recent years that is expected to continue
- Projected increase for interpreters and translation services for FY 25 totals \$120,000


# Active Cases Pending in Criminal Division: Pre-Pandemic and Now






# Active Cases Pending in Civil Division: Pre-Pandemic and Now

### Caseflow Management

- Judiciary has employed established caseflow management principles in addressing backlog
- Consultation with other jurisdictions and organizations
- Application of established principles of effective caseflow management



## Implementation of Principles in Vermont has included:

- Input from stakeholders
- State-wide and unit specific backlog plans
- Ongoing review of pending cases
- Next event set in each case
- Review of scheduling strategies



### Steps Taken to Address Backlog

- Maximizing use of remote technology
- Development of new data measures
- Generation and review of statistical reports
- Ongoing collaboration with stakeholders
- User surveys
- Jury draw and trial dates added



### S.17 Directed Judiciary to Address:

- Number of sheriff deputies needed.
- Recommendation regarding creation of classified position.
- Corresponding budget request.



#### Information Gathering:

- Courthouse visits.
- Stakeholder meetings.

### Factors impacting the Recommendations:

- Security personnel roles.
- Levels of security risk.
- Judicial discretion.



## Recommendation Regarding Security Positions and Roles:

- 47 armed and uniformed sheriff deputies –
   screeners, rovers and court officers in courtrooms.
- 33 Judiciary-employed and plain-clothed court officers in courtrooms.
- 5 Judiciary-employed and plain-clothed court officers available to be assigned state-wide.
- 3 Judiciary-employed supervisors state-wide.



## Recommendation Regarding New Classified Positions

- Judiciary-employed court officer in courtrooms.
- Expanded enforcement authority/ advanced training in non-lethal use of force.
- Ability to fulfill administrative duties if no hearings or trials in courthouse where assigned.
- Training and certification program unique to the position.
