8	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

10	Sec. A.100 SHORT TITLE
11	(a) This bill may be referred to as the BIG BILL – Fiscal Year 2025
12	Appropriations Act.
13	Sec. A.101 PURPOSE
14	(a) The purpose of this act is to provide appropriations for the operations of
15	State government and for capital appropriations not funded with bond proceeds
16	during fiscal year 2025. It is the express intent of the General Assembly that
17	activities of the various agencies, departments, divisions, boards, and
18	commissions be limited to those that can be supported by funds appropriated in
19	this act or other acts passed prior to June 30, 2024. Agency and department
20	heads are directed to implement staffing and service levels at the beginning of

1	fiscal year 2025 so as to meet this condition unless otherwise directed by
2	specific language in this act or other acts of the General Assembly.
3	Sec. A.102 APPROPRIATIONS
4	(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that this act serves as the
5	primary source and reference for appropriations for the operations of State
6	government and for capital appropriations not funded with bond proceeds for
7	fiscal year 2025.
8	(b) The sums herein stated are appropriated for the purposes specified in
9	the following sections of this act. When no time is expressly stated during
10	which any of the appropriations are to continue, the appropriations are single-
11	year appropriations and only for the purpose indicated and shall be paid from
12	funds shown as the source of funds. If in this act there is an error in either
13	addition or subtraction, the totals shall be adjusted accordingly. Apparent
14	errors in referring to section numbers of statutory titles within this act may be
15	disregarded by the Commissioner of Finance and Management.
16	(c) Unless codified or otherwise specified, all narrative portions of this act
17	apply only to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2025.
18	Sec. A.103 DEFINITIONS
19	(a) As used in this act:
20	(1) "Capital appropriation" means an appropriation for tangible capital
21	investments or expenses that are eligible to be funded from general obligation

1	debt financing and are allowed under federal laws governing the use of State
2	bond proceeds as described in 32 V.S.A. § 309.
3	(2) "Encumbrances" means a portion of an appropriation reserved for
4	the subsequent payment of existing purchase orders or contracts. The
5	Commissioner of Finance and Management shall make final decisions on the
6	appropriateness of encumbrances.
7	(3) "Grants" means subsidies, aid, or payments to local governments, to
8	community and quasi-public agencies for providing local services, and to
9	persons who are not wards of the State for services or supplies and means cash
10	or other direct assistance, including pension contributions.
11	(4) "Operating expenses" means property management; repair and
12	maintenance; rental expenses; insurance; postage; travel; energy and utilities;
13	office and other supplies; equipment, including motor vehicles, highway
14	materials, and construction; expenditures for the purchase of land and
15	construction of new buildings and permanent improvements; and similar items
16	(5) "Personal services" means wages and salaries, fringe benefits, per
17	diems, and contracted third-party services, and similar items.
18	Sec. A.104 RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING LAWS
19	(a) Except as specifically provided, this act shall not be construed in any
20	way to negate or impair the full force and effect of existing laws.

1	Sec. A.105 OFFSETTING APPROPRIATIONS
2	(a) In the absence of specific provisions to the contrary in this act, when
3	total appropriations are offset by estimated receipts, the State appropriations
4	shall control, notwithstanding receipts being greater or less than anticipated.
5	Sec. A.106 FEDERAL FUNDS
6	(a) In fiscal year 2025, the Governor, with the approval of the General
7	Assembly or the Joint Fiscal Committee if the General Assembly is not in
8	session, may accept federal funds available to the State of Vermont, including
9	block grants in lieu of, or in addition to, funds herein designated as federal.
10	The Governor, with the approval of the General Assembly or the Joint Fiscal
11	Committee if the General Assembly is not in session, may allocate all or any
12	portion of such federal funds for any purpose consistent with the purposes for
13	which the basic appropriations in this act have been made.
14	(b) If, during fiscal year 2025, federal funds available to the State of
15	Vermont and designated as federal in this and other acts of the 2024 session of
16	the Vermont General Assembly are converted into block grants or are
17	abolished under their current title in federal law and reestablished under a new
18	title in federal law, the Governor may continue to accept such federal funds for
19	any purpose consistent with the purposes for which the federal funds were
20	appropriated. The Governor may spend such funds for such purposes for not
21	more than 45 days prior to General Assembly or Joint Fiscal Committee

1	approval. Notice shall be given to the Joint Fiscal Committee without delay if		
2	the Governor intends to use the authority granted by this section, and the Joint		
3	Fiscal Committee shall meet in an expedited manner to review the Governor's		
4	request for approval.		
5	Sec. A.107 NEW POSITIONS		
6	(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of	law, the total number of	
7	authorized State positions, both classified and	exempt, excluding temporary	
8	positions as defined in 3 V.S.A. § 311(a)(11),	shall not be increased during	
9	fiscal year 2025 except for new positions author	orized by the 2024 session.	
10	Limited service positions approved pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5 shall not be		
11	subject to this restriction.
