ANR's FY24 Budget

- ANR's FY24 Budget: \$230.1 million
 - Increase of \$39.9 million (21%) above FY23
 - Driven largely by increased federal funds (ARPA; BIL)
 - Budget supports 650 full-time employees and ~400 seasonal workers
 - Almost 3/4s of the FY24 budget will be passed thru to municipalities, contractors, and partner organizations
 - Nearly 80% (\$180.7 million) is special and federal funds
 - Fully utilized projected revenue from special and federal funds
- ANR's FY25 Proposed Budget: \$292.1 million
 - Increase of \$62 million (26%) above FY24
 - Again, driven largely by increased federal funds (ARPA; BIL; IRA)
 - Represents ~35% increase (more than \$100 million) above FY23

ANR's FY24 Budget by Fund (\$ millions)





ANR's FY24 Budget by Fund (\$ millions)



ANR Fees

- Overall, fees represent about 1/3 of the Agency budget
 - Vary significantly across divisions and programs





ANR Fees

- Overall, fees represent about 1/3 of the Agency budget

- Take many different forms:
 - Permit application
 - Administrative
 - Technical review
 - Permit renewal
 - Permit amendment

- Licenses
- Leases
- Special use permits
- Surcharges

Number and Types of ANR Fees

ANR SO: 8 different fees

Largely related to review of Act 250 and Section 248 projects

FPR: 21 different fees

- Park prices
- Licenses and special use permit for state lands
- Ski leases

FWD: over 100 different fees

- Hunting & fishing licenses
- Conservation camp fees
- Collection permits

DEC: nearly 300 different fees

- Emissions
- Waste generation
- Drinking water, wastewater and stormwater
- Dams
- Rivers, wetlands and shorelands

Changes in ANR Fees

ANR SO

• Established in 2015; adjusted in 2017 following restructuring of PUC net metering rule

• FPR

 Park prices overhauled in Aug 2022 based on recommendations from benchmarking study completed by DFR

FWD

- Lifetime license prices adjusted in 2020
- Most other licenses adjusted in 2015/2016

• DEC

- Most permit fees adjusted in 2016
- Fees added as new (clean water) programs have come on-line
 - 3-acre and ½-acre Stormwater requirements
 - Municipal Roads General Permit

Key Takeaway

There is not an approach to adjusting ANR fees that is both simple and equitable
