How We Got Here

There were two bills in 2022

- 1. S.201, a ban on leghold traps
- 2. S.281, a ban on coyote hounding

Both had tremendous support from the public, but they were not supported by the VT Fish & Wildlife Department.



How We Got Here

The Senate Committee on Natural Resources amended these bills to instead require that Vermont Fish & Wildlife promulgate rules to address (not complete list):

- 1. animal welfare concerns
- 2. reduce non-targeted animals getting trapped
- 3. violation of landowner rights by packs of hounds traversing posted land
- 4. public safety



The Working Group

- Department underrepresented data on non-targeted animals that were trapped and misrepresented our position in the minutes and on their website (see appendices B-G)
- Trapping interests were overrepresented 7 to 3 (*originally only 2 wildlife advocates; POW* was only invited after requests made by Senators and our colleagues) (see appendix A)
- Pertinent data was omitted in some of the Department's presentations, leading to distrust in the process (see appendices B-G)



Act 159 (Trapping)

Legislative mandate requires (*not full list*):


- improve animal welfare for both domestic and wild animals
- reduce non-target animals from being trapped
- 3. humane methods of killing trapped animals
- placement of traps <u>on any public location</u> where persons may reasonably be expected to recreate



Act 159 (Trapping)

This substantial change was never discussed in the working groups, public hearings or Board meetings.

If the Department wishes to make such a controversial change with far-reaching ramifications, it should be done in a transparent, democratic fashion, not attached to Act 159. 3.20 "Trapping" means to <u>hunt</u>, take or attempt to take fur-bearing animals with traps including the dispatching of such lawfully trapped fur-bearing animals.



Vermont Fish & Wildlife Failed Most Mandates

Legislative mandate:

Trapping techniques, including the appropriate size and type of a trap for target animals, use of lures or other attractants, trap safety, and methods to avoid non-target animals;

Wildlife Advocates Recommended:

Restrict body-crushing kill traps to underwater only

Vermont Fish & Wildlife Proposed:

Allowing kill traps on ground and above ground in a tree



BMPs Allow Unacceptable Levels of Harm

This is a "Padded" Leghold Trap

This severed paw was found in one of our member's back yards.

This is a **BMP approved** trap: an Oneida[™] Victor Softcatch, "padded" leghold trap.



Vermont Fish & Wildlife Failed Most Mandates

Legislative mandate:

Criteria for how live, captured animals should be released or dispatched

Wildlife Advocates Recommended:

Gunshot only

Vermont Fish & Wildlife Proposed:

Loophole waiting for Association of Fish & Wildlife Agencies' recommendations (that currently allow bludgeoning, stomping on trapped animal etc.)




Approved Method of Killing Trapped Animals per Association of Fish & Wildlife Agency (creator of BMPs)



Common Methods to Kill Used by Trappers:

- Beating an animal to death (clubbing)
- Stomping on the animal's chest to crush their heart and lungs (see photo)
- Drowning
- Strangling

Act 165 (Coyote Hounding)

This Act has very clear legislative intent that's been ignored by Vermont Fish & Wildlife:

The General Assembly intends that the rules required under this section support the **humane taking of coyote**, the **management of the population in concert with sound ecological principles**, and the **development of reasonable and effective means of control**.

Vermont Fish & Wildlife Failed Most Mandates

Legislative mandate:

Definition of control to minimize the risk that dogs pursuing coyote:

(A) enter onto land that is posted against hunting;

(B) enter onto land where pursuit of coyote with dogs is not authorized;

(C) harass or harm people or domestic animals; and

(D) cause other unintentional damages to people or property;

Wildlife Advocates Recommended:


Hounds must be under verbal and visual command at all times

Vermont Fish & Wildlife Proposed:

Considers hounds running at large, miles away, to be "in control" as long as they're wearing GPS and shock collars

Morey. Ms. could hear dogs barking in the distance from the South West of her location. Ms. didn't think anything of it and continued heading east. Appriximately 30 minutes had passed when Ms. looked back and saw a hound dog running toward her. Ms. was unsure what the dog was going to do, it was then joined by a second and third dog. Ms. said at that point she knew the dogs were coming after her and Ms. attempted to get and attacked him. Ms. away. The three hound dogs jumped on attempted to get the hound dogs off of , but was not able too. Ms. told me the only thing she could do was try to get away. Ms. told me is trained to stay at her side, so she pedaled her bike as fast as she broke free from the hounds and caught up to her. Ms. could. told me every time she would slow down briefly the hound dogs would jump on and attack him. Ms. advised this kept happening for approximately 2 said the hounds attacked miles. Ms. over 10 times. a Veterinarian and has been so for 22 years. Ms. told me it was her professional opinion that the hound dogs were trying to kill Ms. told me she thought was going to die. Ms. made it the Culver ke, she and fram up onto the porch of an unoccupied cabin. Outdoor Center located at the North end of Lake Morey. Ms. jumped off her bike, she and Ms. spent the next approximately 15 minutes yelling for help and trying to keep the hound dogs from coming up onto the porch. Ms. said she then noticed that there were 4 hound dogs all wearing GPS radio collars.

said she then saw a truck heading toward her, Ms. yelled and waived her arms. The truck pulled into the drive and a male subject got out. The male subject grabbed one of the dogs. Ms. said the truck had a dog box in the back and she realized the male subject was the owner of the hound dogs. Ms. was yelling at the male subject, stating that his dogs tried to kill her dog. Ms. said the male subject loaded the dogs into the dog said the male subject would not tell her his name. Ms. box. Ms. later said that she was very upset and was yelling at an elevated tone and possibly using profanities. The male subject then left with all 4 dogs. Ms. then went immediately home.



Vermont Fish & Wildlife Failed Most Mandates

A GPS and shock collar is not a method of control

- How will a hounder know if their hounds are pursuing someone's dog or a coyote or a deer?
- How can a hounder know when to inflict a correction to their hound when the hounder can't see what the hound is doing?
- The public, as well as landowners, deserve to feel safe on our shared public lands and on our own property.

Public record | Senate Natural Resources Committee, Feb 2022 "I encountered my first coyote hound hunting group in Addison County. I literally had to slam on my brakes to avoid hitting one of their hounds as it dashed out of the woods onto the road I was driving on. Minutes later, I rounded a corner in the road and saw a hound hunter with his truck parked in the road and standing in the road itself with a rifle watching the area the hound had entered. He was ready to shoot any coyote his hound might flush out of the woods I had seen the hound enter."



Vermont Fish & Wildlife Failed Most Mandates

Legislative mandate:


A limit on the number of dogs that may be used to pursue coyote

Wildlife Advocates Recommended:

One hound on one coyote

Vermont Fish & Wildlife Proposed:

Four hounds on one coyote, which is dog fighting





We ask the Committee to reject Fish & Wildlife's rules before you as it is our position that the proposed rule is:

- beyond the authority of the agency
