- BGS sustained heavy damage to 17 buildings in the July flooding event.
- Still in the process of repairing buildings, many of which are running on temporary systems.
- Long and fluid process over the next 2-5 years with phases that have implications for the State's space needs.
- Need to work around the legislative session
- With the exception of the Department of Labor lot, parking lot availability will be affected




Overview

• 133 State Street took extensive damage in the basement levels, 20-25 feet below grade.

- Equipment removal will be a lengthy and complex process requiring large lay down areas, space for the crane, and a safety buffer.
 - Piece by piece crane removal
 - Further deconstruction of pieces once out of the basement
 - Processing for recycling and/or disposal
 - Removal from the site
- Upper parking lot: temporary HVAC equipment and generators powering 133 State Street.
- Performing the work during session is very difficult.











































Complex Parking
