




Preliminary ELA (SBAC) 2022 Results




Preliminary Math (SBAC) 2022 Results




Preliminary Science (VTSA) 2022 Results




SBAC and VTSA Preliminary Results: All Subjects




Official 2022 NAEP Reading Results

Limitations

- SBAC and VTSA (state assessments)
 - Results are not yet matched to enrollment
 - Participation for all students and for categories of students is not known
 - Pandemic conditions likely impacted administration of assessments


Comparability of Results: SBAC and VTSA

- AOE does not recommend comparing 2021 results to any other year, including 2022
 - Difficulty of administering assessments during 2020-2021 school year
 - Lower and uneven participation rates
- The 2022 administration was influenced by pandemic-related challenges. We believe 2022 results should not be compared to previous years, especially to years prior to the pandemic.
 - Educator shortages
 - Atypical resource allocation
 - Suspected lower and uneven participation rates


Comparability of Results: NAEP

- Comparisons between 2019 and 2022 NAEP results have been published publicly
- Nationally, scores declined from 2019 to 2022
- Though scores in Vermont have declined since 2019, we cannot attribute this to the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Scores have been generally declining for over a decade

What can we learn?

- To interpret results accurately participation of all students is crucial and should be a key focus in upcoming administrations.
- Vermont has seen a decline in the percent of students achieving proficiency since before the pandemic, as evidenced by national assessment results.
- Our recovery efforts are focusing on building the education system that our students and communities need, rather than focusing on returning to pre-pandemic performance.
