4	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make
5	miscellaneous changes to education law.
6	An act relating to miscellaneous changes to education law
7	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
8	* * * State Board of Education * * *
9	Sec. 1. STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION STAFFING AND
10	COMPENSATION; STUDY COMMITTEE; REPORT
11	(a) Creation. There is created the State Board of Education Compensation
12	and Staffing Study Committee to examine, evaluate, and report on the
13	compensation and staffing needs of the State Board of Education.
14	(b) Membership. The Committee shall be composed of the following
15	members:
16	(1) one current member of the House of Representatives, who shall be
17	appointed by the Speaker of the House;
18	(2) one current member of the Senate, who shall be appointed by the
19	Committee on Committees;
20	(3) the Secretary of Education or designee, who shall serve as co-chair;

1	(4) the Chair of the State Board of Education or designee, who shall
2	serve as co-chair;
3	(5) the Executive Director of Racial Equity or designee;
4	(6) the Executive Director of the Vermont Principals' Association or
5	designee;
6	(7) the Executive Director of the Vermont Superintendents Association
7	or designee;
8	(8) the Executive Director of the Vermont School Board Association or
9	designee; and
10	(9) the Executive Director of the Vermont National Education
11	Association or designee.
12	(c) Powers and duties. The Committee shall evaluate the compensation and
13	staffing structure of the State Board of Education, including the following
14	issues:
15	(1) whether the State Board's current compensation and staffing
16	structure sufficiently enable the Board to carry out its duties and
17	responsibilities;
18	(2) staffing and compensation structures of Vermont State boards and
19	commissions with similar responsibilities to the State Board, including:
20	(A) appellate or quasijudicial duties;
21	(B) rulemaking authority;

1	(C) strategic planning and statewide policy development; and
2	(D) general governance and accountability oversight over a particular
3	subject matter or jurisdiction;
4	(3) whether the current compensation and staffing structure of the State
5	Board creates accessible opportunities for board membership to ensure the
6	makeup of the State Board reflects the diversity and experience of Vermont's
7	student population; and
8	(4) additional compensation and staffing structure options for the State
9	Board.
10	(d) Assistance. The Committee shall have the administrative, technical,
11	and legal assistance of the Agency of Education and the Agency of
12	Administration.
13	(e) Report. On or before January 15, 2024, the Committee shall submit a
14	written report to House and Senate Committees on Education with its findings
15	and any recommendations for legislative action.
16	(f) Meetings.
17	(1) The Chair of the State Board of Education shall call the first meeting
18	of the Committee to occur on or before August 15, 2023.
19	(2) A majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.
20	(3) The Committee shall cease to exist on July 1, 2024.
21	(g) Compensation and reimbursement.

1	(1) For attendance at meetings during adjournment of the General
2	Assembly, a legislative member of the Committee serving in the member's
3	capacity as a legislator shall be entitled to per diem compensation and
4	reimbursement of expenses pursuant to 2 V.S.A. § 23 for not more than 10
5	meetings. These payments shall be made from monies appropriated to the
6	General Assembly.
7	(2) Other members of the Committee shall be entitled to per diem
8	compensation and reimbursement of expenses as permitted under 32 V.S.A.
9	§ 1010 for not more than 10 meetings. These payments shall be made from
10	monies appropriated to the Agency of Education.
11	(h) Appropriation. The sum of \$ 1.00 is appropriated to the Agency of
12	Education from the General Fund in fiscal year 2024 for per diem
13	compensation and reimbursement of expenses for members of the Committee.
14	* * * Course Offerings and Academic Standards * * *
15	Sec. 2. STATEWIDE COURSE OFFERINGS IN GRADES
16	SIX THROUGH 12; REPORT
17	On or before July 1, 2024, the Agency of Education shall issue a written
18	report to the Senate and House Committees on Education detailing the breadth
19	of course offerings across the State for grades six through 12 in both public
20	and approved independent schools that are eligible to receive public tuition.
21	The report shall include differences between the offerings within each

1	supervisory union on a union-to-union basis as well as a district-to-district
2	basis if there are large differences in course offerings between districts within
3	the same supervisory union. Approved independent schools eligible to receive
4	public tuition shall be included under the supervisory union the school is
5	geographically located within.
6	Sec. 3. PROFICIENCY-BASED LEARNING; STUDY COMMITTEE
7	(a) Creation. There is created the Proficiency-Based Learning Study
8	Committee to study proficiency-based learning and proficiency-based
9	graduation requirements as they are used in Vermont, as required by the
10	Agency of Education, Education Quality Standards (CVR 22-000-003), and to
11	make recommendations for whether proficiency-based learning is the most
12	effective way to ensure Vermont students attain rigorous standards in high-
13	quality programs, or whether there are other systems of instruction,
14	assessment, grading, and academic reporting that would better serve Vermont
15	students.
16	(b) Membership. The Committee shall be composed of the following
17	members:
18	(1) the Secretary of Education or designee;
19	(2) the Chair of the State Board of Education or designee;
20	(3) the Executive Director of the Vermont Principals' Association or
21	designee;

1	(4) the Executive Director of the Vermont Superintendents Association
2	or designee;
3	(5) the Executive Director of the Vermont School Board Association or
4	designee; and
5	(6) the Executive Director of the Vermont National Education
6	Association or designee.
7	(c) Powers and duties. The Committee shall study proficiency-based
8	learning and proficiency-based graduation requirements, including the
9	following issues:
10	(1) the statewide implementation of proficiency-based learning and
11	proficiency-based graduation requirements and to what extent there is
12	consistency in application across all supervisory unions;
13	(2) other states' experience with proficiency-based learning;
14	(3) alternatives to proficiency-based learning, including other systems of
15	instruction, assessment, grading, and academic reporting; and
16	(4) recommendations for Vermont assessment standards and the efforts
17	needed to ensure successful and substantially equal implementation across
18	Vermont.
19	(d) Assistance. The Committee shall have the administrative, technical,
20	and legal assistance of the Vermont Agency of Education.

1	(e) Report. On or before January 15, 2024, the Committee shall submit a
2	written report to House and Senate Committees on Education with its findings
3	and any recommendations for legislative action.
4	(f) Meetings.
5	(1) The Secretary of Education or designee shall call the first meeting of
6	the Committee to occur on or before August 15, 2023.
7	(2) The Committee shall select a chair from among its members at the
8	first meeting.
9	(3) A majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.
10	(4) The Committee shall cease to exist on January 16, 2024.
11	* * * Postsecondary School Marketing * * *
12	Sec. 4. VERMONT POSTSECONDARY SCHOOL MARKETING
13	The sum of \$1.00 is appropriated from the General Fund to the Agency of
14	Tourism and Marketing in fiscal year 2024 for the purpose of marketing
15	Vermont postsecondary schools.
16	* * * Prekindergarten Education and Out-of-State Prekindergarten Education
17	Programs * * *
18	Sec. 5. OUT OF STATE PREKINDERGARTEN EDUCATION; REPORT
19	In order to increase high-quality prekindergarten education opportunities for
20	students that live in school districts on the Vermont border, the Agency of
21	Education shall evaluate public and private prekindergarten education

1	standards and regulations in New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and New York
2	and determine if those standards and regulations are substantially aligned with
3	the Vermont Early Learning Standards. The Agency shall also evaluate other
4	Vermont prequalification standards that may prevent a public or private
5	prekindergarten education program in these states from prequalification in
6	Vermont and determine if state regulations and oversight in those areas are
7	also substantially aligned with Vermont regulations. On or before January 15,
8	2024, the Agency shall issue a written report to the Senate and House
9	Committees on Education with its findings, including any recommendations
10	for legislative action to increase high quality prekindergarten education
11	opportunities in school districts on the Vermont border.
12	Sec. 6. 2021 Acts and Resolves No. 66, Sec. 1 is amended to read:
13	Sec. 1. WORKING GROUP ON THE STATUS OF LIBRARIES IN
14	VERMONT; REPORT
15	(a) Creation. There is created the Working Group on the Status of
16	Libraries in Vermont to study and report on the statewide status of Vermont's
17	libraries. The Working Group is formed with the intent of strengthening and
18	supporting libraries of all sizes and improving library services for the public.
19	(b) Membership. The Working Group shall be composed of the following
20	members:
21	(1) the State Librarian;

l	(2) the President of the Vermont Library Association or designee;
2	(3) the Executive Director of the Vermont Humanities Council or
3	designee;
4	(4) three representatives of public libraries, who shall be from libraries
5	of different sizes and from different regions of the State, appointed by the State
6	Librarian;
7	(5) two representatives of public school libraries, who shall be from
8	schools of different sizes and from different regions of the State, appointed by
9	the Vermont School Library Association;
10	(6) two representatives of college and university libraries, appointed by
11	the President of the College and Special Libraries Section of the Vermont
12	Library Association; and
13	(7) one public library trustee, appointed by the President of the Friends
14	and Trustees Section of the Vermont Library Association.
15	(c) Powers and duties. The Working Group shall study:
16	(1) library services for specific segments of the Vermont population,
17	including senior citizens, individuals with disabilities, youths and children,
18	immigrant and migrant communities, and people living in poverty;
19	(2) the role that libraries play in emergency preparedness, cultural
20	diversity and inclusion, public health and safety, community identity and
21	resiliency, economic development, and access to public programs and services;

1	(3) the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on library operations and
2	services; <del>and</del>
3	(4) whether current law provides adequate protections for libraries from
4	firearm violence; and
5	(4)(5) the current overall status of Vermont libraries, which may include
6	information related to programming, collections, facilities, technology, and
7	staffing.
8	(A) Programming. The Working Group may study the types and
9	frequency of library programs, attendance at library programs, and whether
10	library programs are meeting community needs. The study of programming
11	may include an assessment of public engagement and outreach surrounding
12	library programming as well as the opportunities for nonlibrary programs and
13	groups to access Vermont libraries.
14	(B) Collections. The Working Group may study the size and
15	diversity of library holdings and assess the strengths and gaps in materials
16	available to Vermonters. The study of collections may include an assessment
17	of how libraries may best share resources across differing libraries and
18	communities, whether libraries offer community-specific resources, and
19	whether libraries maintain special collections or historical artifacts.
20	(C) Facilities. The Working Group may study whether library
21	facilities and buildings could be improved with regard to energy efficiency,

accessibility, flexibility, human health and safety, historic preservation, and
 intergenerational needs.
 (D) Technology. The Working Group may study whether Vermont

- (D) Technology. The Working Group may study whether Vermont libraries have sufficient access to basic technological resources, eyber-security cybersecurity resources, high-speed Internet, electronic catalogs, interlibrary loan and other interoperable systems, and appropriate hardware and software.
- (E) Staff. The Working Group may study staffing levels at Vermont libraries, whether staffing levels are sufficient to meet community needs, whether library staff compensation and benefits are sufficient, how libraries rely on volunteers, and what resources are available for workforce development and training of library staff.
- (d) Public input. As part of the study and report, the Working Group shall solicit feedback from the general public and library users around the State.

  The Working Group may examine models for library management and organization in other states, including the formation of statewide service networks.
- (e) Data to be used. The data used in the analysis of library services and operations may be from 2019, prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.Postpandemic data may also be used to assess the status of library services and

20 operations.

1	(f) Consultation with the Board of Libraries. The Working Group may
2	solicit feedback from the Board of Libraries.
3	(g) Assistance. The Working Group shall have the administrative,
4	technical, and legal assistance of the Department of Libraries.
5	(h) Report. On or before November 1, 2023, the Working Group shall
6	submit a report to the House and Senate Committees on Education. The report
7	shall contain:
8	(1) specific and detailed findings and proposals concerning the issues set
9	forth in subsection (c) of this section, including recommendations for
10	legislative action regarding firearm and weapon safety on library property;
11	(2) recommendations for updating the statutes, rules, standards, and the
12	governance structures of Vermont libraries to ensure equitable access for
13	Vermont residents, efficient use of resources, and quality in the provision of
14	services;
15	(3) recommendations related to the funding needs of Vermont libraries,
16	including capital, ongoing, and special funding; and
17	(4) any other information or recommendations that the Working Group
18	may deem necessary.
19	(i) Meetings.
20	(1) The State Librarian shall be the Chair of the Working Group.

1	(2) The Chair shall call the first meeting of the Working Group to occur
2	within 45 days after the effective date of this act.
3	(3) A majority of the membership shall constitute a quorum.
4	(4) The Working Group shall cease to exist on December 1, 2023.
5	(j) Compensation and reimbursement. Members of the Working Group
6	shall be entitled to per diem compensation and reimbursement of expenses as
7	permitted under 32 V.S.A. § 1010 for not more than 12 meetings. These
8	payments shall be made from monies appropriated to the Department of
9	Libraries.
10	(k) Appropriation. The sum of \$12,000.00 is appropriated to the
11	Department of Libraries from the General Fund in fiscal year 2022 for per
12	diem compensation and reimbursement of expenses for members of the
13	Working Group.

15	Sec. 7. REGIONAL STUDENT DRIVER EDUCATION CLINICS; PILOT
16	PROJECT; APPROPRIATION
17	(a) Model program. On or before October 1, 2023, the Agency of
18	Education and the Department of Motor Vehicles, in partnership with
19	interested school districts, shall establish a model regional student driver clinic
20	program to provide the required minimum 6 hours of behind-the-wheel

1	instruction by a certified driver education instructor as required by State Board
2	of Education rule.
3	(1) The Agency and Department shall appoint one or more certified
4	driver education instructors who shall assist in the development of the model
5	program.
6	(2) The model program shall be designed to be implemented on a
7	regional level, with an adequate number of programs provided to meet the
8	reasonably anticipated needs of all public and approved independent schools
9	located within the region. The Agency and Department shall partner with
10	interested school districts to define regions.
11	(3) The model program shall meet all legal requirements of student
12	driver education and training programs.
13	(b) Implementation. Regional pilot programs developed in accordance
14	with the model program created under subsection (a) of this section shall begin
15	offering student driver clinics on or before July 15, 2024.
16	(c) Appropriation. The sum of \$200,000.00 is appropriated from the
17	Transportation Fund to the Agency of Education in fiscal year 2024 for the
18	purpose of developing a model regional student driver clinic program.

20	Sec. 8. EFFECTIVE DATE
21	This act shall take effect on July 1, 2023.
