MANDATORY COMPLETION OF LITERACY MODULES 18 (a) As used in this section, "professionally licensed" means a nonconditional, current license comparable to a level I or level II Vermont 19 20 educator license and does not include provisional, emergency, teaching intern, 21 or apprenticeship licenses or their equivalent in other states.

1	(b) On or before January 1, 2026, all professionally licensed Vermont		
2	teachers employed in a Vermont public or approved independent school shall
