History

St. Johnsbury Academy was founded in 1842 to educate the youth of St. Johnsbury and surrounding towns–and since then has expanded and evolved to serve students from 22 countries, 50 towns, and 17 US States. Since 1971, the Academy has provided a "comprehensive" education by integrating programs in Academics and Career and Technical Education. The Academy has from its founding been a "private" school, independently governed and administered, with a powerful public mission to serve the local rural population and a diverse student body with a superb secondary education.

Access and Equity

Institutional/planning measures

- Non-discriminatory, inclusive Admissions: we accept students regardless of disability, socioeconomic status, representation in a protected class; comply with non-discrimination laws as required by State of Vermont
- Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Faculty and staff Focus Group making recommendations to the Board of Trustees
- Having outside consultant fully assess our policies and practices with an equity lens
- Gender neutral dress code for all students as of 11/21

Addressing Poverty

- NEK and St Johnsbury School District rural, 28% of children in poverty (more than double Vermont average)
- 71 % from district on FRL, provide universal school meals
- Offer free breakfast, snacks, bagged meals for nights and weekends for high number of food insecure students

- Endowed funds for dental and eye care, clothing, computers, supplies, home internet access, international travel
- Obtained grants to support students struggling with housing insecurity to reside in dormitories

Addressing Learning loss post-Covid

- New Literacy Program: Reading and Writing Lab with 3 full-time staff
- New capacity for in-house neurodivergence and learning difference testing
- Expanded Special Services capacity with Orton Gillingham expertise, professional development available to local districts
- Integrating Multi-Tiered System of Support and universal accommodations for general education, training all teaching faculty to differentiate instruction (Jan/23)
- Summer Transition programs (HALO, Operation Creation) open to more students
- 9th grade seminar program focuses on transition to high school for all students
- 67 new 9th graders out of 200 are in remedial math–working with districts to help coordinate curricula

Addressing student and community mental health

- Five (5) full time mental Health counselors, three (3) full time nurses to address mental health crisis among adolescents
- EAP and PATH programs for employee wellness
- Educational program open to community addressing Anxiety and Depression
- The Advisor program provides each student with a faculty mentor and places each student in a supportive peer group of eight to ten other students
- Wellness programming at "RecFit" for community
