Dear members of the Senate Judiciary Committee,

I am writing today, not in my official capacity as a member of the Office of the Defender General, but in my personal capacity as a practicing lawyer, in support of Dickson Corbett's nomination to the Superior Court bench.

I have worked with Dickson in a number of contexts — as opposing counsel in criminal cases, as the elected State's Attorney in sorting out managerial complications between our offices, and as a co-member of the Supreme Court advisory committees on Family Rules and Evidence Rules. In all of my dealings with Dickson, he has been consistently humble, thoughtful, considerate, and collegial.
